The Labour Force

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate for Canada declined to 5.4 in October from 5.8 a month earlier. It was 5.6 in October 1973.

The rate decreased last month in all provinces except British Columbia, where it increased by 0.2. Provincial unemployment rates for October, with September in brackets: Newfoundland, 15.0 (16.8); New Brunswick, 9.0 (9.1); Nova Scotia, 7.0 (7.3); Quebec, 6.9 (7.3); British Columbia, 6.7 (6.5); Ontario, 4.2 (4.5); Saskatchewan, 2.7 (3.1); Manitoba, 2.6 (3.1); and Alberta, 2.2 (2.4).

Seasonally adjusted, employment showed a rise of 29,000 in October after declining the month before. Increases occurred for women 25 years of age and over (up 28,000) and for persons 14 to 24 (up 13,000), but employment among men 25 and over dropped by 19,000.

On an actual basis, the number of persons employed increased to 9.27 million in October from 9.22 million in September and 8.88 million in October 1973.

The actual unemployment total was 430,000, or 4.4% of the 9.70 million in the labour force last month.

Motor Vehicle Production

Canadian production of motor vehicles in September totalled 114,151 units, a decrease of 6.2% from a year earlier.

Passenger car production dropped 5.7% to 87,915 units and production of commercial vehicles fell 7.8% to 26,236


Motor vehicle production for the first nine months of 1974 totalled 1,139,937 units, down 3.5% from January-September 1973.

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Housing Starts

New residential construction declined in September with housing starts in Canadian centres of 10,000 population and over showing a 31.4% drop to 13,628 units from 19,879 a year earlier.

Housing starts recorded in the latest month, with September 1973 starts in brackets: Ontario, 5,245 (9,112); Quebec, 3,704 (4,188); British Columbia, 2,100 (2,291); Alberta, 1,046 (1,418); Saskatchewan, 514 (369); Nova Scotia, 346 (492); Manitoba, 299 (1,096); New Brunswick, 225 (465); Newfoundland, 137 (428); and Prince Edward Island, 12 (20).

For the first nine months of 1974, housing starts in urban centres totalled 135,596 units, down 12.0% from January-September 1973.



Crude Petroleum and Natural Gas Production

Crude petroleum production for July amounted to 1.82 million barrels per day, down 7.7% from a year earlier.

Natural gas production averaged 8.50 billion cubic feet per day in the latest month, a decrease of 0.8% from July 1973.

Canada's Foreign Trade

with the European Economic Community Canadian exports to the nine countries of the EEC rose to \$2.54 billion in the first eight months of 1974, up 36% from \$1.86 billion in January-August 1973. Imports grew at a lesser 18% rate to \$1.95 billion in the latest period, increasing Canada's surplus to \$585 million from \$215 million. Trade with the United Kingdom contributed \$510 million to this surplus.

Allowing for price change, almost all gains were nominal.

Shipments of wheat, the leading export commodity, totalled \$291 million in the first eight months of 1974, up 124% in value but only 14% in volume over the corresponding period in 1973, with the United Kingdom and Italy as the major customers. Sales of wood pulp, mainly to Germany and the United Kingdom, advanced 56% in value to \$268 million, but this largely reflected higher prices. Shipments of copper were valued at \$233 million, nickel at \$130 million and zinc at \$100 million. Again, prices increases accounted for most of the gains in copper and zinc. In contrast, shipments of softwood lumber, mainly to Britain, jumped 113% to \$135 million, and were accompanied by only moderate price rises.

Leading imports in the latest period were transportation equipment at \$280 million and industrial machinery at \$247 million, although little or no growth was shown over the first eight months of 1973. Strong gains were recorded for fabricated iron and steel products, up 84% to \$144 million, and chemicals, up 46% to \$145 million, with West Germany and the United Kingdom the major suppliers.

Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1971=100)

The residential building construction input price index for Canada decreased 0.8% in September to 136.7 from 137.0 in August, but stood 8.8% above the September 1973 level of 125.6.

Prices of building materials used in residential construction rose 8.1% over the twelve months from September 1973; labour costs moved up 10.4%.

During this period, residential building construction input price indexes advanced in all regions, with increases as follows:

• Atlantic Provinces, 11.6%; Prairie Provinces, 11.2%; British Columbia, 10.1%; Ontario, 8.1; Quebec, 7.5%.

Iron Ore Shipments

Canadian mines shipped 4.46 million tons of iron ore in September, down 13.7% from a year earlier.

Output for the first nine months of 1974 totalled 35.84 million tons compared with 37.48 million tons shipped in January-September 1973.

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Ownership and Control of Capital **Employed in Non-Financial Industries**

In 1971, for the second year in succession. Canadian-controlled capital declined as a proportion of all long-term investment in the petroleum and natural gas industry, while Canadian-owned investment increased. At the end of the year, Canadians owned 41% and controlled 23% of total long-term capital employed, compared with corresponding ratios of 37% and 26% in 1969. Almost two-thirds of net new long-term capital invested in this industry in 1971 was sourced in Canada.

In manufacturing, foreign-controlled enterprises reduced their share of total capital employed in 1971 by three percentage points, to 58% of the total. Foreign-owned investment remained unchanged at 53%.

Canadian-owned investment as a proportion of total long-term capital employed in Canada in non-financial enterprises rose in 1971 to 66%, some 1% higher than at the end of 1970. Capital invested by both Canadians and nonresidents in Canadian-controlled firms remained steady at 64% of total longterm capital investment in all nonfinancial industries.

Campus Book Stores, 1973-74

Retail sales of campus book stores rose to \$50.0 million in 1973-74, up 13.2% from the previous year. Text books accounted for 67% of total sales, trade books 11% and stationery and supplies 15%.


Advertising Agencies, 1973

Advertising agencies reported gross billings of \$586.2 million in 1973, an increase of 9.5% over the 1972 figure of \$535.1 million. Gross revenue rose 12.6%, to \$103.7 million from \$92.1 million.

Salaries and wages totalling \$59.6 million were paid in 1973 to the industry's 4,866 employees.

Electric Power Statistics

Net generation rose 6.6% in September to 21.0 billion kilowatt hours from 19.7 billion kwh. a year earlier.

Net generation was up in ten regions in the latest month but decreased in New Brunswick (-28.5%) and Saskatchewan (-8.2%). The largest increases were recorded in Newfoundland (36.6%) and Manitoba (23.0%).

Hydro generation increased 11.6%; thermal production dropped 4.6%.
