Farm Equipment Sales

Sales of farm implements and equipment totalled \$545.6 million in 1973, up 29.8% from \$420.3 million in 1972.

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment increased 26.0% to \$110.8 million in 1973.

Motor Vehicle Production

Canadian production of motor vehicles reached 154,543 units in January, an increase of 6.2% from a year earlier.

Passenger car production rose 5.5% to 118,850 units in the latest month; production of commercial vehicles advanced 8.7% to 35,693 units.

The Wheat Review

Latest available estimates indicate that supplies of wheat remaining (at January 1, 1974) in the four major exporting countries, for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years, amounted to 1,708.4 million bushels, down 17% from a year earlier. (The newly-harvested 1973-74 wheat crops in the Argentine and Australia are taken into consideration in these totals).


Supplies on hand in these countries were as follows (in millions of bushels and with last year's comparable figures in

• United States, 642.8 (1,110.3); Canada, 637.1 (659.2); Australia, 306.9 (148.7); Argentina, 121.6 (149.5).

Canadian exports of wheat (and flour in terms of wheat equivalent) during the August-December period of the current crop year amounted to 187.1 million bushels, some 34% less than the 282.8 million bushels exported during the corresponding period the previous year.

Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in December were estimated at \$2.87 billion, up 24.6% from a year earlier.

The "motor vehicles" component in the consumer goods trades showed an advance of 28.3%.

The most notable change in the industrial goods trades was a 31.1% gain in the "other construction materials and supplies including lumber" category.

Wholesale inventories were valued at \$4.58 billion in the latest month, an increase of 17.7% from December 1972.

Total wholesale trade reached \$34.08 billion in 1973, up 21.0% from the 1972 figure.


Consumer Credit


Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly totalled \$13.82 billion at the end of December, up 18.9% from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to 8.88 billion in the latest month, an increase of 24.3% from December 1972.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held \$1.13 billion balances of retail instalment sales paper (an increase of 10.1% from a year earlier) and had \$1.42 billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up 15.0%).

Unemployment Insurance Claims

Benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act rose to \$142 million in December, up 10% from \$129 million in November but 11% less than the \$159 million disbursed in December 1972.

The average weekly payment to claimants advanced 3% to \$71.19 in December from the previous month's average of \$68.99 and was 10% more than the year-earlier payment of \$64.99.

Initial and renewal claims for unemployment insurance totalled 256,000 in the latest month, an increase of 4% from the November count of 247,000 but 7% less than the 275,000 received in December 1972.

Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities and city combinations in January with increases ranging from 0.1% in St. John's to 1.1% in Toronto.

Food indexes increased in all cities. Higher quotations were registered in most centres for dairy, bakery and cereal products, beef cuts, fresh produce, processed fruits and vegetables, sugar and food eaten away from home. However, pork and poultry prices were generally lower across the country.

Housing components advanced in all cities except St. John's, Newfoundland, reflecting increased shelter costs and higher prices for furniture, and household supplies.

Transportation indexes rose in all cities and city-combinations in response to advances in the train and plane fares indexes together with higher prices for new cars and motor oil. Taxi fares were also higher in several cities.


Over the twelve months from January 1973, the greatest increase in the Consumer Price Index was recorded in St. John's (10.9%).

Gas Utiltiies

Canadian consumers purchased 134.7 billion cubic feet of natural gas in December, an increase of 7.2% from a year earlier. Exports of natural gas dropped 3.4% to 88.1 billion cubic feet.

Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' new orders in December, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at \$6.27 billion, up 2.0% from \$6.15 billion (revised) in November. New orders for non-durable goods rose 5.2%; those for durable goods dropped 1.2%.

Unfilled orders were estimated at \$7.85 billion in December, up 4.2% from

the previous month.

Total inventory owned was 2.0% higher at an estimated \$10.50 billion.

The ratio of total inventory owned to shipments was 1.76 in December, up from 1.75 (revised) a month earlier. The finished products - to shipments ratio was 0.58, unchanged from November.

Manufacturers' shipments in December were estimated at \$5.96 billion, an increase of 1.5% from the revised November estimate of \$5.87 billion.

Unadjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in December were estimated at \$5.54 billion, an increase of 19.3% from a year earlier. Cumulatively, shipments in 1973 totalled \$65.27 billion, up 18.0% from the 1972 value of \$55.33 billion.

Canadian refineries produced 54.9 million barrels of refined petroleum products in December, up 6% from a year earlier.

Quarterly Report on Job Vacancies

Full-time job vacancies in Canada numbered 77,400 in the fourth quarter of 1973, a decrease of 13,3% from the previous quarter, but up 10.3% from the corresponding quarter in 1972.

All economic regions showed quarterto-quarter decreases in the number of vacancies for full-time jobs. In the yearto-year increases - shared by all regions the Pacific region led (up 2,500), followed by Quebec (up 1,800) and Ontario (up 1.500).

The over-all decrease in full-time vacancies from the previous quarter was mainly due to reduced job opportunities in blue-collar occupations (down 10,600 or 89% of the total decrease).

However, in a year-to-year comparison, blue-collar jobs accounted for 61% of the total increase of 7,200 full-time vacancies.

Canadian Balance of International Payments

Advance estimates for the fourth quarter of 1973 show an increase of \$100 million from the previous quarter in the seasonally-adjusted current account deficit to \$171 million. The increase in the deficit resulted from an expansion in the deficit on non-merchandise transactions which more than offset a rise of 14% in the merchandise trade surplus to \$502 million.


Merchandise exports grew at about 12% to \$6.92 billion; merchandise imports went up by over 11% to \$6.42 billion.

Non-merchandise transactions produced a seasonally-adjusted deficit of \$673 million, up 32% from the third quarter. Receipts increased marginally to \$1.55 billion, but payments rose by over 9% to \$2.22 billion.

Without seasonal adjustment, the current account was practically in balance in the fourth quarter with a deficit of \$15 million.

With exports amounting to \$7.24 billion and imports to \$6.56 billion, merchandise trade gave rise to a surplus of \$679 million. Total receipts on "invisibles" were \$1.49 billion while payments were \$2.19 billion, to give a net deficit of \$694 million.
