## The Labour Force

Employment increased to an estimated 8.87 mittion persons in April from 8.73 million in March and 8.53 million a year earlier.

Unemployment deelined to 568,000 last month from 599,000 in March and was down from 570,000 in April 1973.

The total labour force numbered 9.44 million in the latest month compared with 9.10 million a year earlier.

Seasonally adjusted, Canada's unemployment rate dipped to 5.3 in April from the previous month's level of 5.4 ( 5.5 in April 1973). Regionally, the unemployment rate decreased for the Atlantic region, the Prairie region and Ontario and rose slightly in Quebec and British Columbia. April rates, with March in Drackers: Atlantic region 9.2 (9.3); Quebec 7.4 (7.3); British Columbia 5.7 (5.5); Ontario 3.6 (4.2); and the Prairie region 2.9 (3.0).

On a seasonally-adjusted basis, employment increased for the seventh consecutive month, reaching a level of 9.09 million in April, an increase of 27,000 from March.

## Department Store Sales by Regions

Department store sales in March at $\$ 345.9$ million showed a rise of $13.9 \%$ from a year earlier. Increases were recorded in all regions.

## Consumer Price Index (CPI)

(1961=100)
The consumer price index for Canada rose $0.7 \%$ to 161.9 in April from 160.8 in March.

Though all major components registered increases, the food index edged up by only $0.1 \%$ while the price level of all items other than food increased $0.9 \%$.

Main contributors to the latest month's advance were the clothing and the transportation elements which rose $0.9 \%$ and $1.2 \%$, respectively. Other index increases included: housing ( $0.4 \%$ ); recreation, education and reading ( $1.5 \%$ ); health and personal care ( $2.0 \%$ ); and tobacco and alcohol (1.6\%).

Between April 1973 and April 1974, the all-items consumer price index rose $9.9 \%$.

During this period, the following index increases were recorded:

- Food, up $15.7 \%$; clothing $9.6 \%$; transportation $9.0 \%$; health and personal care $8.2 \%$; housing $7.5 \%$; recreation, education and reading $6.9 \%$; and tobac$\infty$ and alcohol 4.2\%.

Federal Government Finance, 1972-73
Canada's federal government had gross general revenue receipts of $\$ 21.4$ billion for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1973.

Gross general expenditure amounted to $\$ 20.9$ billion, leaving a surplus for the year of $\$ 514$ million.

## Gold Production

Gold production decreased to 148,711 troy ounces in March from 166,699 troy ounces a year earlier.

Production for the first three months of 1974 at 436,926 troy ounces was down $11.1 \%$ from 491,235 troy ounces in the corresponding period in 1973.

## Telephone Industry Statistics

Canadian telephone systems reported net operating revenue of $\$ 64.1$ million in March, an increase of $11.1 \%$ from March 1973.

Gross operating revenues of the thirteen major telephone companies rose $13.1 \%$ to $\$ 190.2$ million in the latest month; operating expenses were up $14.3 \%$ to $\$ 126.2$ million.

Construction expenditures increased $37.9 \%$ to $\$ 115.6$ million from $\$ 83.8$ million a year earlier.

A total of 11.4 million telephones were reported in service at the end of March, of which $70.4 \%$ were residential and $29.6 \%$ business telephones.

## Motor Vehicle Production

Canadian production of motor vehicles totalled 143,376 units in April, a drop of $2.2 \%$ from a year earlier.

Passenger car production decreased $3.3 \%$ to 110,872 units; production commercial vehicles increased $1.8 \%$ is 32,504 units.

For the first four months of 1974 , motor vehicle production totalled 578,892 units, down $1.1 \%$ from the corresponding period in 1973.

## International Travel

Preliminary statistics for March show that 1.7 million United States travellers entered Canada during the month (5.2\% fewer than in March 1973), while the number of Canadian resident travellers to the United States declined by $8.7 \%$ to 2.1 million.

In contrast, travellers from countries other than the United States numbered 45,000 (an increase of $22.7 \%$ from a yets earlier), and Canadian resident travellers re-entering from countries other than the U.S. numbered 190,000 (up $22.9 \%$ ).

## Printing, Publishing and

Allied Industries, 1972
Printing, publishing and allied industries shipped $\$ 1.85$ billion worth of products of own manufacture in 1972, an increase of $12.1 \%$ from a year earlier. Total value added was $12.4 \%$ higher at $\$ 1.27$ billion.

Salaries and wages paid by these industries at $\$ 712$ million in 1972 were up $9.7 \%$ from the 1971 total. The number of employees increased $2.3 \%$ to 86,051 in the latest year.

## Index Numbers of Farm Prices of Agricultural Products

(1901=100)
The March index number of farm prices agricultural products for Canada at 11.0 showed a drop of $2.0 \%$ from 215.2 (eevised) in February.

The February index was upwardlyrevised by $13.4 \%$ to reflect adjusted initial prices for wheat and barley in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta (retroactive to August 1973).

Over the twelve months from March 1973, the index has registered an advance of $28.0 \%$.

## Income After Tax,

## Distributions by Size in Canada, 1971

Average after-tax income of Canadian families in 1971 was $\$ 8,783$ compared with the average pre-tax income of \$10,368.

For unattached individuals, income tax payments reduced the pre-tax average of $\$ 4,346$ to $\$ 3,710$.
(These estimates were derived from the survey of consumer finances conducted in the spring of 1972 . While other published reports based on this survey present distributions of total money income (before income tax deductions), a new report is being compiled which will rovide similar distributions but based on fte:-tax income concept).

The report, Income A fler Tax. Distributions by Size in Canada, 1971 ( $13-210$ ) is scheduled for early release.

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## Restaurant Statistics

Canadian restaurants had total estimated receipts of $\$ 141.1$ million in March, an increase of $7.4 \%$ from a year earlier.

Restaurant sales were up in all provinces in the latest month, with gains recorded as follows:

- Prince Edward Island, 20.7\%; Newfoundland, $17.4 \%$; British Columbia,
$8.9 \%$; New Brunswick, 8.5\%; Ontario, $8.5 \%$; Nova Scotia, $8.0 \%$; Saskatche(tan, $7.0 \%$; Quebec, $6.5 \%$; Alberta, $4.1 \%$; and Manitoba, $4.1 \%$.
Cumulatively, restaurant receipts for the first three months of 1974 totalled an estimated $\$ 391.3$ million, up $11.0 \%$ from the January-March period in 1973.

Major Appliance Sales
Sales of television sets and freezers were down in March, but Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales of other major appliances ran well above year-earlicr levels.

Major appliance sales recorded by these manufacturers during the latest month, with percentage changes from March 1973:

- Refrigerators - 61,373 units (up $19.0 \%$ ); home and farm freezers 20,165 units ( $-0.9 \%$ ).
- Stoves and ranges - 56,452 units (up $12.3 \%$ ).
- Automatic washing machines $-37,610$ units (up $28.7 \%$ ); electric clothes dryers $-31,631$ units (up $38.2 \%$ ).
- Television sets - 53,253 units (-15.7\%).
Manufacturers' March sales of 43,146 Canadian-made colour television sets reflected a decrease of $2.1 \%$ from a year earlier; black-and-white set sales dropped $47.1 \%$ to 10,107 units.

## Federal Government Employment, Fourth Quarter 1973

Canada's federal government had 433,726 employees on December 31, 1973, an increase of 20,657 from a year earlier.

Fourth-quarter gross payrolls rose $13.7 \%$ to $\$ 1.1$ billion in 1974 from $\$ 972$ million in 1973.

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 3.1 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in February, an increase of $1.4 \%$ from a year earlier.

Net receipts of domestic oils increased $4.7 \%$ to 2.6 million $B / D$ in the latest month; imported oils decreased $14.5 \%$ to .5 million B/D.
