## Labour Income

Total labour income for May was estimated at $\$ 6.12$ billion, up $15.0 \%$ from a year earlier.

Adjusted for seasonal variations, the May estimate of $\$ 6.04$ billion showed an increase of $1.1 \%$ from the April level. Wages and salaries in the goods-producing industries recorded virtually no change, while those in the service-producing industries advanced by $1.6 \%$.

## Index of Industrial Production

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production dipped $0.6 \%$ in May to 221.2 from the revised level of 222.6 in April.

Output of mining and utility industries increased but manufacturing was lower for the second consecutive month. The index for non-durable manufacturing moved $2.0 \%$ lower and that for durables eased $0.6 \%$. The index for electric power, gas and water utilities advanced $1.8 \%$ and mines, quarries and oil wells moved up $1.1 \%$.

## Gas Utilities

Canadian consumers purchased 97.8 billion cubic feet of natural gas in May, an increase of $2.5 \%$ from a year earlier.

Exports of natural gas decreased $6.9 \%$ to 79.7 billion cubic feet in the latest month.

## Real Domestic Product

The seasonally-adjusted index of real domestic product $(1961=100)$ rose $0.8 \%$ in May to 207.3 from the revised April level of 205.5 .

Service industries provided the main thrust for the advance. Wholesale trade rose $6.9 \%$. Transportation, storage and communication gained $3.5 \%$. Strike recoveries led to strong advances for air and water transport and post office operations.

There were declines in manufacturing ( $-1.3 \%$ ) and agriculture ( $-1.6 \%$ ) in May. Labour disputes affected meat product manufacturers, rubber industries and several manufacturers in the paper and chemical and cement sectors. In agriculture, a decrease in grain production and vegetable sales outweighed an increase in livestock production.

## Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in May were estimated at $\$ 6.81$ hillion, up $6.9 \%$ from the April level. New orders for durable goods rose $10.7 \%$ to 53.34 billion, while those for non-durable goods were up $3.5 \%$ to $\$ 3.47$ billion.

The backlog of unfilled orders for all manufacturing industries, seasonally aijusted, increased $4.1 \%$ to $\$ 8,96$ billion.

The estimated total value of inventory owned by manufacturers, seasonally atjusted, increased $2.0 \%$ to $\$ 12.12$ biltion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total iriventory owned - to shipments dropped back to 1.88 in May after climbing to 1.90 in April from 1.82 in March. The finished products - to shipments ratio declined to 0.62 from 0.63 .

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 6.46$ billion, up $3.4 \%$ from the April level.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in May at an estimated $\$ 6.82$ billion showed an increase of $21.8 \%$ from a year earlier. Shipments for the first five months of 1974 totalled \$31.37 billion, up $20.8 \%$ from January-May 1973.

## Major Appliances

Stove sales were up in May, but Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales of other major appliances ran below yearearlier levels.

Major appliance sales recorded by these manufacturers in the latest month, with percentage changes from May 1973:

- Refrigerators - 52,042 units (down $2.7 \%$ ); home and farm freezers 25,097 units (down 12.6\%).
- Stoves and ranges - 57,420 units (up 7.6\%).
- Automatic washing machines $-26,497$ units (down $11.1 \%$ ); electric clothes dryers - 22,275 units (down 0.4\%).
- Television sets - 41,992 units (down $3.9 \%$ ).
Manufacturers' sales in May of 33,270 Canadian-made colour television sets reflected an increase of $12.4 \%$ from a year earlier; black-and-white set sales dropped $38.1 \%$ to 8,722 units.

## Residential Building Construction Input Price Index <br> (1971=100)

The residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 136.4 in June, an increase of $0.1 \%$ from the previous month's level and up $10.3 \%$ from a year earlier.

Over the twelve months from June 1973, prices of building materials used in residential construction increased $10.3 \%$; labour costs moved up $9.9 \%$.

During this period, residential building construction input price indexes advanced in all regions, with increases recorded as follows:

- Atlantic provinces, $14.8 \%$; Prairie provinces, $10.8 \%$; Ontario, $10.5 \%$; British Columbia, $8.8 \%$; and Quebec, 8.5\%.

## The Wheat Review

Total exports of wheat (including flour in terms of wheat) from the four traditional major exporters during the August-May period of the current crop year amounted to $1,509.3$ million bushels, a $14 \%$ decrease from the corresponding period a year earlier.

Exports from these countries were as follows, in millions of bushels and with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 972.6 (994.6): Canada, 330.4 (464.3); Australia, 167.7 (175.8); and Argentina, 38.6 (113.3).

Wheat sipplies held by the four traditional majo exporters at June 1, 1974 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to $1,101.2$ million bushels, down $6 \%$ from a year earlier.

Supplies were held as follows, in millions of bushels and with last year's comparable figures in brackets: Canada, 498.8 (477.7); United States, 281.6 (563.1); Australia, 201.8 (68.6); and Argentina, 119.0 (65.8).

## Farm Input Price Index

(1961=100)
The farm input price index for Canada rose $1.9 \%$ in the second quarter of 1974 , moving to 189.6 from a revised firstquarter level of 186.1 . Indexes for both Eastern and Western Canada also moved up $1.9 \%$ in the latest quarter.

Higher prices of hired labour, building replacement, machinery replacement, motor vehicle operation, fertilizer and tools and supplies caused most of the upward movement in the indexes.

Over the twelve months from the second quarter of 1973, the Canada index has risen $17.3 \%$. During this period, costs have increased $18.2 \%$ for farmers in Eastern Canada and $16.2 \%$ for western farmers.

Telephone Industry Statistics
Canadian telephone systems repotted net operating revenue of $\$ 66.7$ million in Miry, an increase of $15.2 \%$ from May 1973.

Gross operating revenues of the thirteen major telephone companies rose $17.9 \%$ to $\$ 202.1$ million in the latest month; operating expenses were up $19.3 \%$ to $\$ 135.4$ million.

Construction expenditures of the firms increased $49.9 \%$ from a year earlier to $\$ 124.9$ million in May.

These systems reported a total of 86,603 employees, up 6,677 from the corresponding month in 1973.

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## Employment, Earnings and Hours

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at $\$ 174.92$ in May were up $10.2 \%$ from $\$ 158.75$ a year earlier.

First estimates show that average weekly earnings were highest in British Columbia (\$197.64), followed by Ontario ( $\$ 179.67$ ), Alberta ( $\$ 175.10$ ), Quebec (\$170.41), Manitoba (\$161.24), Saskatchewan (\$158.85), and the Atlantic region ( $\$ 150.99$ ).

Average weekly earnings in May (by industry division) were as follows: mining ( $\$ 233.45$ ); transportation, communication and other utilities ( $\$ 199.79$ ); manufacturing ( $\$ 181.70$ ); finance, insurance and real estate ( $\$ 172.40$ ); trade ( $\$ 139.51$ ); and service ( $\$ 125.06$ ).

Hourly earnings averaged $\$ 5.40$ in mining and $\$ 4.27$ in manufacturing in the latest month.

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.84 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in April, up $0.2 \%$ from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils increased $2.2 \%$ to 2.46 million $\mathrm{B} / \mathrm{D}$ in the latest month; imported oils decreased $11.3 \%$ to . 38 million $\mathrm{B} / \mathrm{D}$.
