New Motor Vehicle Sales
Retail sales of new motor vehicles reached 127,628 units in June, up $1.9 \%$ from a year earlier. Total sales value increased 8 . $1 \%$ to $\$ 595.8$ million.

Sales of passenger cars produced in Canada and the United States edged up $0.2 \%$ to 83,379 units; those of overseasmanufactured automobiles dropped $10.3 \%$ to 14,775 units.

Commercial vehicle sales in June rose $15.5 \%$ from a year earlier to 29,474 units; included were 27,369 manufactured in Canada and the United States (up 16\%) and 2,105 manufactured overseas (up 8.4\%).

For the first six months of 1974, sales of new motor vehicles reached 686,445 units with an accumulated value of $\$ 3.20$ billion. This represents an increase of $1.3 \%$ in units and $9.8 \%$ in value over sales for the January-June 1973 period.

## Non-Residential Building Construction Input Price Index <br> (1961=100)

The non-residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 227.7 in June, an increase of $0.6 \%$ from the previous month's level and up 14.4\% from a year earlier.

The materials component of the total index rose $20.5 \%$ over the twelve months from June 1973; the labour element moved up 9.8\%.

Prices of steel and metal work used in non-residential construction climbed $38.5 \%$ during this period, electrical equipment rose $22.4 \%$, plumbing, heating and other equipment $20.1 \%$, concrete products $12.6 \%$, lumber and lumber products $0.5 \%$ and other materials $20.2 \%$.

## Department Store Sales by Regions

Department store sales in June at $\$ 412.6$ million showed a rise of $14.5 \%$ from a year earlier. Increases were recorded in all regions.

Department store sales by regions in the latest month, with percentage increases from June 1973:

- Ontario, \$158.5 million (13.6\%); Quebec, $\$ 79.0$ million ( $14.2 \%$ ); British Columbia, $\$ 64.8$ million ( $14.6 \%$ ); Alberta, $\$ 49.4$ million ( $18.6 \%$ ); the Atlantic provinces, $\$ 25.6$ million ( $11.7 \%$ ); Manitoba, $\$ 25.2$ million (11.9\%); and Saskatchewan, \$10.1 million ( $25.3 \%$ ).

## Security Transactions with Non-Residents

Security transactions with non-residents during March led to a net capital inflow of $\$ 46$ million, an increase of $\$ 7$ million from the February net inflow of $\$ 39$ million.

Transactions between Canada and the rest of the world in all types of long-term portfolio securities during the first quarter resulted in a net capital inflow of $\$ 665$ million, an increase of $\$ 289$ million over $\$ 376$ million in the fourth quarter of 1973.

## Air Carrier Financial Statements, 1973

Gross operating revenues of Canadian air carriers in 1973 rose to $\$ 1.25$ billion, an increase of $18.7 \%$ from the year before. Operating expenses more than kept pace, however, jumping $19.9 \%$ to $\$ 1.17$ billion.

Net income after taxes was $\$ 23.9$ million in the latest year compared with $\$ 22.9$ million in 1972 . Of the 1973 net income total, $\$ 19.1$ million was reported by Canada's seven scheduled carriers (Air Canada, CP Air, Pacific Western Airlines, Transair, Nordair, Quebecair and Eastern Provincial Airways).

Canadian air carriers paid salaries, wages and personnel expenses totalling $\$ 449$ million in 1973 , up $21.7 \%$ from 1972.

## Summary of Exports

Canada's seasonally-adjusted June exports were estimated at $\$ 2.56$ billion, down $4.7 \%$ from the high rate of May.

On an unadjusted basis, merchandise exports in June at $\$ 2.66$ billion were up $19.3 \%$ from $\$ 2.23$ billion a year earlier.

Shipments to the United States rose $15.8 \%$ to $\$ 1.78$ billion. Deliveries of crude petroleum (including the export tax) increased by $\$ 213$ million to reach $\$ 333$ million and accounted for some $88 \%$ of the over-all rise in exports to the U.S. Overseas exports advanced $27.2 \%$ to $\$ 876.7$ million with wheat shipments (up by $\$ 71$ million) representing almost $40 \%$ of the rise.

Total exports for the first half of 1974 were $\$ 15.11$ billion, up $23.2 \%$ from $\$ 12.26$ billion in the January-June 1973 period.

Exports to the United States rose $18.1 \%$ to $\$ 10.17$ billion. Deliveries of crude oil, natural gas and petroleum products were up by $\$ 1$ billion and those of pulp and newsprint higher by $\$ 300$ million. However, exports of automotive and related products decreased by $\$ 200$ million and lumber deliveries were $\$ 170$ million lower.

Overseas exports increased $35.1 \%$ to $\$ 4.94$ billion with wheat and other crude and fabricated materials accounting for nine-tenths of the rise.

Average export prices in the first half of 1974 were more than a third above the level for the corresponding period in 1973. Allowing for these price changes, the volume of exports declined $8 \%$ in the latest period.

## Coal and Coke Statistics

Coal production in May at 1.73 million tons showed a decrease of $6.7 \%$ from May 1973. Imports dropped to 1.87 million tons from 2.54 million tons.

Industrial consumers used 1.04 million tons of coal (down $14.6 \%$ from a year earlier) and 481,402 tons of coke (down $3.7 \%$ ) in the latest month.

## Summary of Imports

Canadian merchandise imports in June rose to a record seasonally-adjusted level of $\$ 2.64$ billion, up $4.9 \%$ from the previous month.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, imports in June at $\$ 2.70$ billion were up $\$ 704$ million ( $35.4 \%$ ) from a year earlier.

Purchases from the United States advanced by $26.1 \%$ to $\$ 1.80$ billion with the most notable increases registered for aircraft and aircraft parts (up $\$ 38$ million), motor vehicles and parts (up \$23 million) and coal (up $\$ 19$ million). Im= ports from other countries increased by $58.6 \%$ to $\$ 899.7$ million. Crude petroleum purchases rose to $\$ 223.9$ million from $\$ 61.7$ million a year earlier and represented almost half of the rise in the import bill from overseas countries.

At $\$ 14.77$ billion, total imports for the first half of 1974 were $30.7 \%$ above $\$ 11.30$ billion in the corresponding period in 1973.

Purchases from the United States rose $26.2 \%$ to $\$ 10.23$ billion. Featured prominently in this increase were machinery and equipment (up $\$ 600$ million), and automotive and related products (up $\$ 260$ million); increases ranging from $\$ 100$ to $\$ 150$ million were recorded for forestry products, steel materials and chemicals. Overseas imports were up $42.1 \%$ to $\$ 4.54$ billion with purchases of crude petroleum (up $\$ 780$ million) representing almost $60 \%$ of the increase.

Average import prices in the first half of 1974 were up about $25 \%$ from the corresponding period last year; allowing for this, import volume showed a $4 \%$ increase in the latest period.

## Crude Petroleum and Natural Gas Production

Crude petroleum production for April amounted to 1.92 million barrels per day, down $1.9 \%$ from a year earlier.

Natural gas production averaged 9.70 billion cubic feet per day in the latest month, an increase of $0.6 \%$ from April 1973.

## Merchandise Trade Balance

Canada's seasonally-adjusted merchandise trade balance shifted to a deficit of $\$ 79$ million in June from a surplus of $\$ 172$ million in May. Exports were estimated at $\$ 2.56$ billion in the latest month, while imports totalled $\$ 2.64$ billion.

On a quarterly basis, the trade balance declined to a surplus of $\$ 233$ million in the second quarter of 1974 compared with a $\$ 358$ million surplus in the first quarter.

And the total $\$ 591$ million surplus for the first half of this year is well below the $\$ 1.19$ billion surplus recorded in the first half of 1973.

## Railway Carloadings

Railways operating in Canada reported a total of 21.7 million tons of revenue carload freight loaded in June, a drop of $4.1 \%$ from June 1973. Cars loaded were down $3.7 \%$ to 362,323 .

Commodities registering notable tonnage decreases in the latest month includ. ed: sand and gravel ( $-44.8 \%$ ); logs, poles and other forest products ( $-37.5 \%$ ); con-tainers-on-flat-cars $(-21.2 \%)$; coal $(-16.0 \%)$; and wheat ( $-15.5 \%$ ). Potash loadings increased $31.7 \%$.

For the first six months of 1974, revenue carload freight loadings totalled 116.5 million tons, a decline of $1.0 \%$ from the January-June period in 1973. Cumulatively, C.O.F.C. tonnage decreased $24.6 \%$, fertilizers $19.9 \%$ and sand and gravel 18.5\%. Potasi loadings were up $27.7 \%$.
