Consumer Price Index (CPI)

(1961=100)

The Consumer Price Index for Canada rose 0.8% in July to 168.0 from 166.7 in June.

Though all major components moved up in the latest month, an 0.9% rise in the food index accounted for over one-third of the over-all rise, and an 0.6% increase for housing contributed a further quarter. Recreation, education and reading advanced 2.2% and transportation moved up 0.8%. Among the remaining components, health and personal care increased 0.4%, while the indexes for clothing and for tobacco and alcohol each rose 0.3%.

Between July 1973 and July 1974, the All-Items Consumer Price Index advanced 11.3%.

During this period, the following index increases were recorded:

• Food, up 16.3%; transportation, 11.5%; clothing, 10.3%; recreation, education and reading, 9.2%; housing, 9.0%; health and personal care, 8.7%; and tobacco and alcohol, 5.5%.

Electric Power Statistics

Net generation rose 2.5% in June to 20.9 billion kilowatt hours from 20.4 billion kwh. a year earlier.


Net generation was up in nine regions in the latest month but decreased in British Columbia (- 22.7%), the Yukon (- 12.4%) and New Brunswick (-1.9%). The largest increases were recorded in Newfoundland (39.9%) and Manitoba (17.9%).

Hydro generation increased 8.0% in June; thermal production dropped 15.1%.


Preliminary statistics for the first six months of 1974 show that net generation in Canada rose 8.1% to 142.0 billion kwh. from 131.4 billion kwh. in January-June 1973.



General Wholesale Index

(1935-39=100)

The general wholesale price index decreased 0.2% to 452.3 in June from 453.3 (revised) in May but was still 23.0% higher than the June 1973 level of 367.8. Three of the eight major group indexes declined while five showed increases.

The vegetable products group index declined 2.7% due mainly to lower prices of grains, livestock and poultry feeds, fresh fruits and vegetable oil products. The wood products group decreased 1.1% with the most significant changes occurring for cedar, fir, hemlock and spruce.

The chemical products group index rose 3.2% in June relecting higher prices for explosives, soaps and detergents, inorganic chemicals and paint and paint materials. Increases in livestock and fresh meats were responsible for a 2.1% advance in the animal products group. Non-metallic minerals moved up 1.8% as prices rose for asphalt, petroleum and its products, and lime.

Over the twelve months from June 1973, the following advances were registered by the major group indexes:

• Non-ferrous metals, 33.6%; vegetable products, 33.5%; non-metallic minerals, 32.1%; textile products, 31.7%; iron products, 26.4%; chemical products, 22.0%; wood products, 10.9%; and animal products, 10.6%.



Industry Selling Price Index: Manufacturing

(1961=100)

The industry selling price index for total manufacturing rose to 169.3 in June, an increase of 0.8% from the previous month's level and up 20.1% from a year earlier.


The petroleum and coal products group rose 7.3% in June because of higher prices in the petroleum refining industry. The chemical and chemical products group moved up 2.5% with price increases shown by manufacturers of industrial chemicals, soap and cleaning compounds, and paints and varnishes.


Decreases occurred in the wood products group (-1.6%) with sawmills and planing mills down 3.5% and in the primary metals group (-0.3%) with smelting and refining prices declining 1.4%.

Over the twelve months from June 1973, the largest price increases were shown by the following component group indexes:

 Petroleum and coal products industries, 46.6%; paper and allied industries, 32.2%; chemical and chemical products industries, 30.1%; textile industries, 29.5%; and primary metal industries, 27.7%.
