## Employment, Earnings and Hours

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at \$178.73 in July were up $12.3 \%$ from $\$ 159.18$ a year earlier.

First estimates show that average weekly earnings (by industry division) were highest in construction ( $\$ 250.75$ ), followed by mining ( $\$ 233.67$ ), forestry (\$208.77), transportation, communication and other utilities (\$202.38), manufacturing ( $\$ 183.90$ ), finance, insurance and real estate ( $\$ 175.86$ ), trade ( $\$ 144.66$ ) and service ( $\$ 129.03$ ).

Average weekly earnings in July were highest in British Columbia (\$197.78), followed by Ontario (\$181.95), Alberta (\$181.92), Quebec (\$173.29), Manitoba (\$166.52), Saskatchewan (\$161.90) and the Atlantic region ( $\$ 158.88$ ).

Hourly earnings averaged $\$ 6.20$ in construction, $\$ 5.51$ in mining and $\$ 4.38$ in manufacturing.

## Department Store Sales

Department store sales rose to $\$ 378.3$ million in July, an increase of $21.3 \%$ from $\$ 311.8$ million in July 1973.

Sales were up in thirty-eight of the thirty-nine departments in the latest month with the largest advances recorded by boy's clothing and furnishings ( $39.1 \%$ ) and plumbing, heating and building materials ( $36.7 \%$ ).

All provinces reported increased department store sales from a year earlier with a high of $37.1 \%$ for Saskatchewan. Sales were up $21.2 \%$ in Montreal, $18.6 \%$ in Toronto, $15.7 \%$ in Vancouver and $12.5 \%$ in Winnipeg.

Inventories held in July (at selling price ) were valued at $\$ 1.30$ billion, up $27.0 \%$ from the corresponding month in 1973.

## Canada's Foreign Trade

 in Automotive and Related ProductsCanada's trade in automotive products with the United States produced a firsthalf 1974 deficit of $\$ 529$ million, up sharply from the $\$ 62$ million deficit incurred during January-June 1973.

Imports of automotive products from the United States totalled $\$ 3.15$ billion in the latest period, up $7.4 \%$ from a year earlier. Exports of these products to the United States showed an 8.5\% drop to $\$ 2.62$ billion.

Some $\$ 203$ million of the increase in the trade deficit was due to lower exports of parts, as imports of parts were unchanged. Higher imports and reduced exports of passenger cars contributed another $\$ 114$ million. Finally, net increases in imports of trucks and tires added approximately $\$ 100$ million and $\$ 50$ million, respectively, to the increase in the deficit.

The fall in U.S. demand for Canadian automotive products was primarily the result of a large contraction in sales of new cars in the U.S. Canadian demand for cars and trucks remained high, resulting in increased imports in the first half of 1974.

## Building Permits

Building permits taken out in Canada in June totalled $\$ 763.8$ million, a drop of $2.8 \%$ from $\$ 785.5$ million in June 1973.

Lower totals were recorded in the latest month for residential permits at $\$ 403.1$ million ( $\$ 465.7$ million a year earlier) and commercial permits at $\$ 175.0$ million ( $\$ 182.3$ million). Increases were registered for industrial permits at $\$ 97.8$ million ( $\$ 80.9$ million) and institutional and governmental permits at $\$ 87.9$ million ( $\$ 55.6$ million).

## Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities and city-combinations in August with increases ranging from $0.2 \%$ in Halifax to $1.3 \%$ in Thunder Bay and Vancouver.

Food indexes advanced in all cities with rises for beef, pork, dairy, bakery and cereal products, fresh fruit, beverages and restaurant food. Prices were lower in most centres for fresh vegetables, poultry and eggs.

Housing components rose in all cities as a result of increased shelter costs and higher prices for furniture, floor coverings and household supplies.

Over the twelve months from August 1973, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities, with increases as follows: Vancouver, $12.5 \%$; St. John's, $12.4 \%$; Quebec City, $11.5 \%$; Montreal, $11.2 \%$; Winnipeg, $10.8 \%$; Toronto, $10.7 \%$, Edmonton-Calgary, $10.5 \%$; Ottawa, $10.4 \%$; Thunder Bay, $10.4 \%$; Saint John, $10.2 \%$; Halifax, $9.6 \%$; and SaskatoonRegina, $9.5 \%$.

## Index of Industrial Production

## ( $1961=100$ )

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production decreased by $0.9 \%$ in July to 220.7 from 222.6 in June to stand 1.9\% higher than the July 1973 level of 216.6.

Total manufacturing output was down $0.7 \%$ in the latest month; non-durable manufacturing dropped $1.3 \%$ and durable manufacturing was off $0.1 \%$. Mining output decreased $4.1 \%$ while utilities output showed a $1.8 \%$ gain.

## Motor Vehicle Production

Canadian production of motor vehicles totalled 92,686 units in July, a decrease of $0.5 \%$ from a year earlier.

Passenger car production fell $14.6 \%$ to 64,642 units; production of commercial vehicles increased $60.6 \%$ to 28,044 units.

Motor vehicle production for the first seven months of 1974 totalled 948,655 units, down $5.3 \%$ from the corresponding period in 1973.

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in July were estimated at $\$ 3.82$ billion, up $34.2 \%$ from July 1973.

Significant sales changes from a year earlier included groceries and food specialties, up $29.3 \%$, and iron and steel, up 66.0\%.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 5.61$ billion in the latest month, an increase of $25.2 \%$ over July of last year.

## Gold Production

Gold production declined to 124,511 troy ounces in July from 148,376 troy ounces a year earlier.

Gold production for the first seven months of 1974 at 996,775 troy ounces showed a drop of $13.4 \%$ from $1,151,483$ troy ounces in January-July 1973.

## Retail Trade

Retail sales in July reached \$3.71 billion, an increase of $19.5 \%$ from July 1973.

Year-to-year gains were registered in all trade groups with a high of $40.5 \%$ for fuel dealers.

All provinces recorded higher sales in the latest month with the largest increases in Saskatchewan ( $33.7 \%$ ) and Alberta (23.4\%).

Seasonally adjusted, July retail sales showed an increase of $1.7 \%$ from June to a level of $\$ 3.75$ billion with increases in thirteen of the eighteen trade groups.

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly totalled $\$ 15.34$ billion at the end of July, an increase of $18.4 \%$ from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by clartered banks rose to $\$ 10.25$ billion in the latest month, up $23.1 \%$ from July 1973.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held $\$ 1.23$ billion balances of retail instalment sales paper (an expansion of $11.5 \%$ from a year earlier) and had $\$ 1.51$ billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up $10.0 \%$ ).

Outstanding balances of the books of credit holders reporting quarterly as well as those reporting monthly totalled $\$ 19.22$ billion at the end of June, a level $18.0 \%$ higher than that reached a year carlier.

## Construction Machinery and Equipment Sales, 1973

The value of new construction machinery and equipment entering the market to end-users amounted to $\$ 1.07$ billion in 1973, an increase of $31.6 \%$ over 1972 sales of $\$ 811.4$ million.

Sales of used construction machinery and equipment were valued at $\$ 178.5$ million in the latest year while rental revenue for all types of machinery amounted to $\$ 106,9$ million.

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## The Wheat Review

Canada's wheat exports during the 1973-74 crop year totalled 418.5 million bushels, down $27.4 \%$ from 576.6 million in the previous August-July period.

Shipments to the People's Republic of China dropped to 53.7 million bushels from 153.3 million, while exports to the U.S.S.R. fell to 36.0 million bushels from 163.2 million.

Wheat supplies remaining at the July 31, 1974 close of the Canadian crop year amounted to 379.4 million bushels, up $3.8 \%$ from 365.4 million on hand a year earlier.

## Unemployment Insurance

Benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployinent Insurance Act totalled \$159 million in July, up $8 \%$ from $\$ 148$ million in June and $10 \%$ more than $\$ 145$ million disbursed in July 1973.

The average weekly payment was $\$ 73.11$ in the latest month, up $7 \%$ from $\$ 68.33$ a year earlier.

Initial and renewal claims for unemployment insurance numbered 188,000 in July, up $20 \%$ from the June total of 157,000 and $5 \%$ more than the 179,000 received in July 1973.

For the first seven months of 1974, payments under the act amounted to $\$ 1.41$ billion, up $5 \%$ from $\$ 1.34$ billion in January-July 1973.

Inventories, Shipments and Orders
in Manufacturing Industries
Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in July were estimated at $\$ 6.81$ billion, up $1.5 \%$ from the revised June level of $\$ 6.71$ billion. New orders for durable goods dropped $3.9 \%$, while those for non-durable goods showed a $6.8 \%$ increase.

Unfilled orders in July were estimated at $\$ 9.38$ billion, up $1.0 \%$ from the previous month.

Total inventory owned (seasonally adjusted) was $1.9 \%$ higher at $\$ 12.76$ billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments dropped back to $1.90: 1$ in July from 1.94:1 in June, while the finished products - to shipments ratio was $0.61: 1$ as compared with $0.64: 1$.

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 6.72$ billion, an increase of 4.3\% from the revised June value of $\$ 6.44$ billion.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in July at $\$ 6.35$ billion were up $24.9 \%$ from a year earlier. Shipments for the first seven months of 1974 totalled $\$ 44.47$ billion, up $21.2 \%$ from $\$ 36.70$ billion in JanuaryJuly 1973.
