Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland totalled an estimated \$8.27 billion for the January-November period of 1974, an increase of 29.3% from \$6.39 billion in the corresponding period of 1973.

Cash receipts rose in all provinces in the latest period. Total payments made to farmers, by province and with January-November 1973 figures in brackets:

• Saskatchewan, \$2.18 billion (\$1.50 billion); Ontario, \$2.09 billion (\$1.77 billion); Alberta, \$1.59 billion (\$1.13 billion); Quebec, \$1.01 billion (\$881.7 million); Manitoba, \$797.6 million (\$594.9 million); British Columbia, \$331.4 million (\$279.6 million); New Brunswick, \$94.9 million (\$86.7 million); Nova Scotia, \$92.4 million (\$85.5 million); and Prince Edward Island, \$78.8 million (\$65.0 million).

Railway Carloadings


Railway carload freight totalled 21.7 million tons in November, down 2.2% from November 1973.

Commodities showing notable tonnage increases in the latest month included: copper-nickel ores and concentrates (up 66.4%); wheat (up 22.1%); and coal (up 20.3%). Major tonnage declines were registered for lumber (- 37.6%) and gypsum (- 31.5%).

For the first eleven months of 1974, total carload traffic at 224.3 million tons was up 1.6% from January-November 1973. Cumulatively, individual commodity classes recording the largest increases in terms of tons loaded were coppernickel ores and concentrates (up 38.3%) and potash (up 26.1%).

Provincial Government Employment Canada's provincial and territorial governments (excluding British Columbia) employed a total of 328,122 persons in general government services during the last pay period of September 1974, an increase of 2.9% from a year earlier.

Gross payrolls for the third quarter of 1974 amounted to \$779.5 million.

Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1971=100)

The residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 137.9 in November, an increase of 0.7% from the previous month's level and up 8.1% from a year earlier.

Prices of building materials used in residential construction rose 6.6% over the twelve months from November 1973; labour costs moved up 10.6%.

During this period, residential building construction input price indexes advanced in all regions, with increases recorded as follows:

Atlantic Provinces, 10.6%; Prairie Provinces, 10.1%; British Columbia, 9.3%; Ontario, 7.3%; and Quebec, 6.3%.

Railway Operating Statistics

Operating revenues of the six major rail-ways in Canada totalled \$210.9 million in October, up 9.7% from a year earlier. Expenses rose 22.4% to \$210.6 million. Net income for the month at \$376,426 was 98.1% below that of October 1973.

Revenue freight ton-miles dropped 2.9% to 11.8 billion in the latest month; passenger-miles increased 11.8% to 116.6 million.

During the first ten months of 1974, railway revenues rose 20.5% while expenses were up 22.3%. Net income dropped 54.4% to \$17.0 million.

Coal and Coke Statistics

Coal production in October totalled 2.24 million tons, up 7.4% from October 1973. Imports rose 6.9% to 1.91 million tons.

In the latest month, industrial consumers used 1.45 million tons of coal (down 2.0% from a year earlier) and 559,503 tons of coke (up 5.1%).

Department store sales in November rose
to \$544.7 million, up 12.4% from a year
earlier. Increases were recorded in all
regions of Canada.

and Saskatchewan, \$14.8 million (19.5%).



Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.78 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in October, a decrease of 4.8% from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils decreased 6.4% to 2.30 million B/D while imported oils rose 4.0% to 477,000 B/D.

Radio Time Sales

Sales of advertising to national advertisers on AM and FM stations totalled \$5.80 million in October, up 22.4% from September. Sales to local advertisers increased 11.6% to \$12.91 million.


Crude Petroleum

Crude petroleum production for September amounted to 1.77 million barrels per day, down 7.5% from a year earlier.

Natural gas production averaged 8.46 billion cubic feet per day in the latest month, a decrease of 7.4% from September 1973.

Operations of Transcontinental and Regional Air Carriers

Canada's seven major scheduled airlines reported combined operating income of \$33.1 million in August, up 52.2% from \$21.8 million a year earlier. (Traffic in August 1973 was disrupted by a labour dispute at CP Air involving their machinists).

Operating revenues climbed 38.6% to \$148.4 million in the latest month; operating expenses rose 35.0% to \$115.3 million.

Passenger-miles for all services were up 15.6% to 1,947.3 million and goods ton-miles for all services increased 5.6% to 38.3 million.

Canadian ports received and shipped 196.8 million short tons of cargo in international trade in 1973. Domestic cargo handled amounted to 123.9 million short tons.

Federal Government Employment Canada's federal government had 462,864 employees on June 30, 1974, an increase of 17,708 (4.0%) from a year earlier.

Total payroll for the latest quarter amounted to \$1.24 billion, up \$200.4 million (19.3%) from the March-June 1973 period.

Non-Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1961=100)

The non-residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 238.8 in November, an increase of 0.9% from the previous month's level and up 13.9% from a year earlier.

The materials component of the total index rose 18.5% over the twelve months from November 1973; the labour element moved up 10.3%.

Prices of steel and metal work used in non-residential building construction jumped 35.5% during this period, electrical equipment rose 31.3%, concrete products 16.5%, plumbing, heating and other equipment 13.0% and other materials 21.0%. Prices of lumber and lumber products registered an 8.2% decline.
