

Consumer Price Index (CPI)

(1971=100)

The Consumer Price Index for Canada advanced 0.2% to 141.5 in September from 141.2 in August, reflecting a distinctly slower rate of rise than in the three preceding summer months. Lower food prices contributed to this deceleration along with a somewhat less rapid rise in the index for allitems excluding food, which moved up 0.7%.

A 0.7% decrease in the food index was largely attributable to seasonally lower quotations for fresh produce, vegetables in particular, also contributing to this decline were lower prices foe fand for bakery products. But pork prices continued to climb, rising a further 6.5% in September to a level 42% above that of a year earlier, and poultry prices also increased.

Higher energy prices — for fuel oil and gasoline in certain provinces, as well as advances in electricity and domestic gas rates in several cities — provided the major impetus behind the latest month's 0.7% rise in the index for all-items excluding food.

Between September 1974 and September 1975, the All-Items Consumer Price Index advanced 10.6%.

During this period, the following component index increases were recorded:

 Food, 13.1%; transportation, 12.5%; tobacco and alcohol, 12.4%; health and personal care, 11.6%; housing, 9.6%; recreation, education and reading, 9.3%; and clothing, 4.7%.

On a seasonally-adjusted basis, the all-items index rose 0.6% between August and September. The current annual rate of change in the CPI, based on the seasonally-adjusted movement since three months earlier, was 10.2%, considerably lower than the rates registered more recently.

Department Store Sales by Regions


Department store sales in August rose to \$460.6 million, up 14.2% from a year earlier. Increases were recorded in all regions of Canada.

Department store sales by region for the latest month, with percentage increases over August 1974 in brackets:

Ontario, \$168.3 million (15.2%); Quebec, \$84.1 million (17.8%); British Columbia, \$76.5 million (12.0%); Alberta, \$60.2 million (11.2%); Atlantic Provinces, \$30.4 million (17.3%); Manitoba, \$27.8 million (6.1%); and Saskatchewan, \$13.1 million (15.5%).

New Motor Vehicle Sales

Retail sales of new motor vehicles totalled 99,253 units in August, down 5.1% from a year earlier. Total sales value increased 11.9% to \$554.0 million

Sales of passenger cars produced in Canada and the United States decreased 7.3% to 59,034 units while those of overseas-manufactured automobiles increased 2.0% to 14,076 units.

Commercial vehicle sales in August declined 3.6% from a year earlier to 26,143 units; included were 24,791 manufactured in Canada and the U.S. (down 2.5%) and 1,352 manufactured overseas (down 20.1%).

For the first eight months of 1975, total sales of new motor vehicles reached 865,210 units with an accumulated value of \$4.68 billion. This represents a decrease of 4.3% in units but an increase of 10.6% in value compared with sales for January-August 1974.




Iron Ore

Canadian mines shipped 4.41 million tons of iron ore in August compared with 4.85 million tons a year earlier.

Cumulative output for the first eight months of 1975 at 28.57 million tons was down 8.9% from 31.38 million tons in January-August 1974.

General Wholesale index

(1935-39=100)

The general wholesale price index advanced 1.9% in August to 499.4 from 490.2 in July to stand 6.1% higher than the August 1974 level of 470.6. Six of the eight major group indexes increased while two decreased.

The vegetable products group index rose 8.4% in August due mainly to higher prices for potatoes (up 29.8%), tea, coffee and cocoa (up 23.8%), sugar and its products (up 20.9%), grains (up 10.2%) and vegetable oil products (up 10.0%). The non-metallic minerals group index rose 1.2% as prices increased 17.3% for asphalt, 6.1% for coal tar and 2.3% for petroleum and its products.

Over the 12 months from August 1974, the following percentage changes were recorded for the major group indexes:

 Wood products, 14.3%; chemical products, 13.2%; non-metallic minerals, 13.1%; animal products, 11.0%; iron products, 10.9%; vegetable products, -0.5%; non-ferrous metals, -2.9%; and textile products, -7.3%.

Gold Production

Production of gold increased to 127,266 troy ounces in August from 117,789 troy ounces a year earlier.

Gold production for the first eight months of 1975 at 1,076,871 troy ounces showed a drop of 3.4% from January-August 1974.

Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland totalled an estimated \$6.87 billion in the January to August period of 1975, up 7.8% from \$6.38 billion in the first eight months of 1974.

Total payments made to farmers in the latest period, by province and with year-earlier figures in brackets:




Crude Petroleum and Natural Gas Production

Crude petroleum production for June amounte to 1.58 million barrels per day, down 13.5% from year earlier.

Natural gas production averaged 8.84 billion cubic feet per day in the latest month, an increase of 2.3% from June 1974.

Non-Residential Building Construction input Price index

(1961 = 100)

The non-residential building construction input crice index for Canada rose to 256.7 in August, an increase of 1.4% from the July level and up 9.3% from a year earlier.

The materials component of the total index advanced 3.3% over the 12 months from August 1974; labour costs increased 14.2%.

Prices of concrete products used in non-residential building construction jumped 18.4% during this period and plumbing, heating and other equipment increased 0.6%. But price declines were recorded for: electrical equipment, 5.7%; steet and metal work, -1.4%; and lumber and lumber products, -1.1%. Other materials increased 10.3%.

Major Appliance Sales

Sales of stoves and television sets declined, but Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales in August of other major appliances ran well above year-earlier levels.

Major appliance sales recorded by these manufacturers in the latest month, with percentage changes from August 1974 in brackets:

- Refrigerators, 45,101 (up 11.7%); home and farm freezers, 38.843 (up 104.8%);
- Stoves and ranges, 32,997 (-8.3%);
- Automatic washing machines, 28,302 (up 31.9%); electric and gas clothes dryers, 25,009 (up 8.9%);
- Television sets, 37,709 (-36.2%).

Manufacturers' sales in August of 34,519 Canadian-made colour television sets represented a decrease of 17.4% from a year earlier; black-and-white set sales dropped to 3,190 units from 17,272.

Industry Selling Price Index: Manufacturing

(1961=100)

The industry selling price index for total manufacturing rose to 193.6 in August, an increase of 0.8% from July and up 10.1% from a year earlier.

The food and beverages group index increased 1.5% in the latest month, reflecting price advances of 19.2% for sugar refineries, 4.6% for poultry processors and 2.8% for feed manufacturers. Price increases in the petroleum refining industry (5.0%) were mainly responsible for moving the petroleum and coal products group up 4.9%.

Over the 12 months from August 1974, the largest price increases were shown by the following group indexes:


 Non-metallic mineral products industries, 17.3%; chemical and chemical products industries, 13.7%; paper and allied industries, 13.6%; and petroleum and coal products industries, 10.9%.

Asbestos

Canadian producers' shipments of asbestos dropped to 78,002 tons in August from 172,862 tons a year earlier. This brought year-to-date shipments in 1975 to 691,987 tons, down 42.5% from January-August 1974.

Housing Starts

New residential construction activity increased in August with housing starts in Canadian centres of 10,000 population and over rising 18.0% to 17,530 units from 14,857 a year earlier.

Housing starts recorded in the latest month, by province and with August 1974 figures in brackets: Ontario, 5,8 '3 (6,731); Quebec, 4,764 (3,659); British Columbia, 2,453 (1,446); Alberta, 1,658 (674); Saskatchewan, 868 (404); Manitoba, 747 (632); New Brunswick, 499 (664); Newfoundland, 408 (336); Nova Scotia, 228 (300); and Prince Edward Island, 32, (11).

For the first eight months of 1975, housing starts in urban centres totalled 101,108 units, down 17.1% from 121,968 in January-August 1974.
