## The Labour Force

Canada's seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate edged down lo $7.2 \%$ in September Irom $7.3 \%$ in August and has shown little change since March of this year.

Last month the unemployment rate for men 25 years of age and over decreased to $5.4 \%$ from $56 \%$, while for women 25 and over it went down $1046 \%$ from $4.8 \%$ in August. For persons aged 14 to 24. the unemployment rate decreased to $12.5 \%$ from $12.7 \%$.

The seasonally-adjusted participation rate percentage of the population 14 and over included in the labour force - advanced to $59.1 \%$ in September from $58.7 \%$ a month earlier.

On an actual basis. the number of persons employed declined to 9.41 million last month from 9.78 million in August bul was up from 9.22 million in September 1974.

The actual unemployment total was 586.000 or 5. will of the 10.00 million included in the labour iovet thst month. By province, unemployment 24 s tere: Newtoundland, $13.9 \%$. British Colum13. $34 \%$; Quebec, $7.5 \%$; New Brunswick, 6.9\%; Nova Scolia, 6.2\%; Ontario, 4.8\%; Maniloba, $30 \%$, Sherta, $2.6 \%$, and Saskatchewan, $1.3 \%$

## Retall Trade

Seasonally-adjusted August retail sales advanced $3.1 \%$ from July to a level of $\$ 4.40$ billion

Total retail trade without seasonal adjusiment reached $\$ 428$ billion, up $9.2 \%$ from a year earlier. All provinces had sales increases over August 1974 with the largesl advance in New Brunswick ( $13.7 \%$ ). Sales were up $17.0 \%$ in Montreal. $9.9 \%$ in Toronto. $8.8 \%$ in Vancouver and $1.8 \%$ in Winnipeg.
Year-to-year gains were registered in 23 of the 28 Irade groups with the largest increases recorded by used car dealers ( $31.7 \%$ ) and household furniture stores (25.3\%).

Revised data for July show retail sales for the month at \$4.26 billion, up 13.5\% from July 1974.

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credt: outstandmy on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached $\$ 17.81$ billion at the end of August, an increase of $15.4 \%$ from a year earlier

## Farm Implement Sales

Sales of tarm implements and equipment for January to August 1975 were valued at $\$ 618.0$ million, up $33.1 \%$ from $\$ 464.3$ million in the first eight montins of 1974

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment rose $9.2 \%$ to $\$ 97.8$ million in the latest period.

## Department Store Sales in Ottawa-Hull

Department stores in Ottawa-Hull metropolitan area reported sales totalling $\$ 5.82$ million for the week ending October 4 , an increase of $4.8 \%$ from the corresponding week in 1974. Sales were down $0.3 \%$ in Ottawa (city) but were up $4.4 \%$ in Ottawa and suburbs (combined) and $8.4 \%$ in Hull and suburbs.

Ottawa-Hull area depariment stores sales for the year to date totalled $\$ 170.3$ million, up $11.3 \%$ from January 1 - October 4, 1974. Sales rose $14.4 \%$ in Hull and suburbs, $12.4 \%$ in Ottawa (city) and $10.8 \%$ in Oltawa and suburbs.

## 1974 Preliminary Estimates

Average family income (total money income before taxes or other deductions) rose to \$14.485 in 1974 from $\$ 12.716$ in 1973, an increase of $14 \%$. If this is adjusted for changes in the Consumer Price Index, the gain is reduced to 3\%

The average income of unattached individuals moved up 18\%. advancing to $\$ 6,049$ in 1974 from \$5,149 in 1973.

Average income for all units, families and unattached individuals combined, moved to $\$ 12,169$ in 1974 from $\$ 10,694$ in 1973, an increase of $13.8 \%$.

On an individual basis, average income rose $14 \%$ to $\$ 7,304$ in 1974 from $\$ 6,416$ in 1973 . Men received an average income of $\$ 9,563$ in the latest year while the corresponding figure for women was $\$ 4,222$. (These figures exclude persons without income and children less than 14 years of age).

## Help-Wanted Index

(1969=100)
The seasonally adjusted help-wanted inceaz to 173 in the third quarter of 1975, up 4\% fom previous quarter. Indexes for the Atlantic region and Quebec were up about $20 \%$ and that fo Ontario rose $2 \%$. The Prairie region and British Columbia indexes were down $9 \%$ and $1 \%$ respectively.

Compared with the third quarter of 1974, the help-wanted index showed a decline of $20 \%$ Decreases recorded in Ontario, the Prairie region and British Columbia were only parlially offsel by small advances in the Atlantic provinces and Quebec

## Restaurant Statistics

Restaurants in Canada had total estimated receipts of $\$ 197.5$ million in August, an increase of $11.8 \%$ from a year earlier. Sales were up in all provinces.

Restaurant receipts for the latest month, by province and with percentage gains over August 1974 in brackets:

- Ontario. $\$ 725$ million ( $96 \%$ ): Quebec, $\$ 60.6$ million ( $11.5 \%$ ): British Columbia, $\$ 21.9$ million (13.2\%): Alberta, $\$ 14.8$ million ( $19.4 \%$ ): Manitoba, $\$ 10.5$ million ( $16.1 \%$ ). Saskatchewan, $\$ 6.3$ million ( $11.8 \%$ ); Nova Scolia, $\$ 4.5$ million ( $11.7 \%$ ): New Brunswick. $\$ 3.2$ million ( 15.74 ) Newfoundland, $\$ 2.7$ million ( $8.3 \%$ ); ank: Prince Edward Island, \$633,000 (19.2\%)

## Railway Transport, Part II, 1974

Railway operating revenues and expenses in 19: 4 were substantially higher than in 1973 - a nailaction of the record volume of trallic handled. increased rales on traffic not subject to a general frnignt rate freeze, higher payments received under the National Transportation Act, increased costs and the effect of the 1973 railway strike on statislics for that year
Operating revenues rose $21.0 \%$ to a record $\$ 2.57$ billion in 1974 with freight receipts at $\$ 2$ : 4 billion accounting for almost $85 \%$ of that total.

However, wage and pension increases, higher payroll laxes and soaring material and fuel prices were factors contributing to addirional operating cosis, which jumped $23.6 \%$ to $\$ 2.51$ billion.
Net railway operating revenues declined 10 $\$ 56.1$ million in 1974, down $37.7 \%$ from $\$ 90.0$ million in 1973.

## Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manulacturing Industries

Manufacturers seasonally-adjusted new orders in Augusi were estimated at $\$ 7.54$ billion. up $7.3 \%$ from $\$ 7.03$ billion (revised) in July. New orders for durable goods jumped $16.4 \%$ to $\$ 3.59$ billion while those for non-durable goods rose $0.1 \%$ to $\$ 3.95$ billion.

The backlog of unfilled orders in all manutacluring industries in August, seasonally adjusted was estimated at $\$ 9.85$ billion, up $1.7 \%$ from the previous month.

Tolal inventory owned, seasonally adjusted was $0.6 \%$ lower at $\$ 15.07$ billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments moved down to 2.04:1 in August from 2.09:1 in July, while the finished products - 10 shipments ratio dropped $100.68: 1$ from 0.70:1

Manulacturers' shipments in the latest month seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 7.38$ billion, an increase of $19 \%$ from July

Not adjusted for seasonal vartation. manufaclurers' shipments in August at an estimated $\$ 6.76$ billion showed a rise of $4.4 \%$ from a year earlier Cumulative shipments for the first eight months of 1975 totalled $\$ 55.18$ billion, up $6.4 \%$ from January-August 1974

## International Traved

Preliminary statistics for August show that 6.4 million U S visitors entered Canada, down 3.1\% from August 1974. Canadian residents returning from visits to the United States increased $9.5 \%$ to 4.4 million

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the U.S. increased $13.4 \%$ from a year earlier to 229,400. Canadian travellers returning from abroad numbered 204,100. up 7.3\% from August 1974.

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.68 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate. pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in August, an increase of $0.2 \%$ from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils decreased $1.9 \%$ to 2.23 million $B / D$ in the latest month while those of imported oils increased $12.2 \%$ to 455,000 B/D.

## Eleciric Power Statistics

Nel generation declined $42 \%$ in Augusi 10207 billion kilowatt hours from 216 billion kwh . a year earlier

Increases in nel generation were registered in eight regions of Cariada in the latest month while decreases were ecorded in New Bruns. wick ( $-32.6 \%$ ), British Columbia ( $-31.5 \%$ ), Saskatchewan ( $-160 \%$ ) and Quebec ( $-6.7 \%$ ). The largest increase's were $29.1 \%$ in Newfoundland and $7.4 \%$ in Prince Edward Island

Hydro generation decreased $10.4 \%$ in August; thermal production increased $15.5 \%$
