

Industrial Corporations, Financial Statistics

Canadian industrial corporations recorded aftertax profits of \$2.02 billion in the third quarter of 1975, down \$214 million (9.6%) from the corresponding period in 1974. Net income declined 14.6% for manufacturing industries, 11.5% for mining corporations and 1.3% for other industries.

Industrial corporations' sales in the latest quarter were estimated at \$51.53 billion, up \$4.49 billion (9.5%) from the third quarter of 1974.

The Labour Force

Canada's seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate remained at 7.2% in October, unchanged from September.

Limit month the unemployment rate for men 25 visits of age and over decreased to 5.2% from 5.4%, while for women 25 and over it went down to 4.2% from 4.6% in September. For persons aged 14 to 24, the unemployment rate increased to 12.9% from 12.5%.

The seasonally-adjusted participation rate — percentage of the population 14 and over included in the labour force — declined to 58.8% in October from 59.1% a month earlier.

On an actual basis, the number of persons employed remained at 9.41 million last month, the same as in September but up from 9.27 million in October 1974.

The actual unemployment total was 576,000 or 5.8% of the 9.98 million included in the labour force last month. By province, unemployment rates were: Newfoundland, 14.9%; New Brunswick, 8.8%; British Columbia, 7.9%; Quebec, 7.2%; Nova Scotia, 6.6%; Ontario, 4.7%; Manitoba, 3.1%; Alberta, 2.6%; and Saskatchewan, 2.4%.


Film Distributors, 1974

Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in September were estimated at \$7.06 billion, down 5.3% from \$7.45 billion (revised) in August. New orders for durable goods fell 11.7% to \$3.16 billion while those for non-durable goods dipped 0.5% to \$3.90 billion.

The backlog of unfilled orders in all manufacturing industries in September, seasonally adjusted, was estimated at \$9.92 billion, up 0.7% from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was 0.9% higher at \$15.17 billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments jumped to 2.17:1 in September from 2.05:1 in August, while the finished products — to shipments ratio moved up to 0.72:1 from 0.68:1

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at \$6.99 billion, a decrease of 4.6% from August.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in September at an estimated \$7.32 billion showed a rise of 3.6% from a year earlier. Cumulative shipments for the first nine months of 1975 totalled \$62.25 billion, up 5.8% from January-September 1974.

Operations of Transcontinental and Regional Air Carriers

Canada's seven major scheduled airlines reported (combined) net profit of \$9.02 million in July, up from \$6.68 million a year earlier

Total operating revenues rose 17.3% to \$159.6 million in the latest month; operating expenses advanced 15.1% to \$134.8 million.

Passenger traffic - measured in passengermiles for all services - showed a 4.3% increase over July 1974 to 1,921.2 million. Goods tonmiles for all services rose 10.5% to 40.6 million.

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General Wholesale Index

(1935-39=100)

The general wholesale price index advanced 0.4% in September to 501.8 from 499.6 (revised) in August to stand 6.1% higher than the September 1974 level of 472.8. Six of the eight major group indexes increased while two decreased.

The animal products group index rose 2.8% in September, reflecting price increases for lard and tallow (8.5%), cured meats (7.3%), livestock (5.8%) and eggs (2.8%). The iron products group advanced 2.8% with increases for scrap iron and steel (5.0%), rolling mill products (4.8%) and tinplate and galvanized sheets (3.6%). The textile products group moved up 2.7% as a result of price hikes for cotton fabrics (6.9%), rayon yarn (4.6%) and cotton yarns (3.4%). The non-ferrous metals group index rose 1.8% due to an 8.3% increase in the price of nickel.

The vegetable products group decreased 3.0% in the latest month due to price declines for potatoes (-20.7%), sugar and its products (-18.2%), fresh vegetables (-18.1%), dried fruits (-4.7%) and vegetable oil products (-4.1%)

Over the 12 months from September 1974, the following percentage changes were recorded for the major group indexes:

 Animal products, 13.6%; wood products, 13.3%; non-metallic minerals, 12.9%; iron products, 12.4%; chemical products, 11.7%; non-ferrous metals, -0.2%; textile products, -4.1%; and vegetable products, -4.4%.

Domestic Mobile Homes (Revised Data) Shipments of domestic mobile homes decreased to 4,430 single units in the second quarter of 1975 from 7,109 in April-June 1974. Shipments of double-wide units fell to 804 from 1,511

Farm Implement Sales

Sales of farm implements and equipment for January to September 1975 were valued at \$724.9 million (dealers' cost), up 34.0% from \$541.1 million in the first nine months of 1974.

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment rose 7.5% to \$113.7 million in the latest period.

Restaurant Statistics

Restaurants in Canada had total estimated receipts of \$184.2 million in September, and increase of 11.5% from a year earlier. Sales wore up in all provinces.

Restaurant receipts for the latest month, by province and with percentage gains over September 1974 in brackets:

 Ontario, \$65.9 million (9.7%); Quebec, \$59.3 million (11.2%); British Columbia, \$22.4 million (10.0%); Alberta, \$12.6 million (21.7%); Manitoba, \$10.8 million (15.9%); Saskatchewan, \$4.8 million (12.2%); Nova Scotia, \$3.6 million (9.9%); New Brunswick, \$3.0 million (12.7%); Newfoundland, \$1.5 million (10.2%); and Prince Edward Island, \$420,000 (20.0%)

Cumulatively, restaurant receipts for the first nine months of 1975 totalled an estimated \$1.48 billion, up 11.0% from January-September 1974.

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Major Appliance Sales

Salah of stoves and television sets declined, but Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales in September of other major appliances ran well above year-earlier levels.

Major appliance sales recorded by these manufacturers in the latest month, with percentage changes from September 1974 in brackets:

 Refrigerators, 57,989 (up 7.7%); home and farm freezers, 45,069 (up 67.2%);

• Stoves and ranges, 43,375 (-11.7%)

 Automatic washing machines. 44,958 (up 46.3%); electric and gas clothes dryers, 37,445 (up 20.0%);

• Television sets, 59,787 (-29.0%).

Manufacturers' sales in September of 53,775 colour television sets represented a decrease of 24.2% from a year earlier; black-and-white set sales fell 54.4% to 6.012 units.

Industry Seiling Price Index: Manufacturing

(1961-100)

The industry selling price index for total manufacturing rose to 194.4 in September, an increase of 0.4% from August and up 9.3% from a year earlier.

The foods and beverages group index edged up 0.1% in the latest month, reflecting price advances in slaughtering and meat packing (2.8%), feed manufacturers (2.2%), miscellaneous food products (1.4%) and poultry processors (2.8%). Price increases in the iron and steel mills industry (2.8%) were mainly responsible for moving the primary metals group up 1.3%.

The paper and allied products group index decreased 0.7% in September due to a 1.0% decline in the pulp and paper mills industry.

Over the 12 months from September 1974, the largest price increases were shown by the following group indexes:

 Non-metallic mineral products industries, 17.0%; wood industries, 11.2%; paper and allied industries, 11.2%; petroleum and coal products industries, 11.0%; leather industries, 10.0%; and chemical and chemical products industries, 9.6%.



International Travel

Preliminary statistics for September show that 2.8 million U.S. visitors entered Canada, down 9.7% from September 1974. Canadian residents returning from visits to the United States Increased 2.2% to 2.8 million.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other han the U.S. decreased 3.0% from a year earlier to 133,000. Canadian travellers returning from abroad numbered 140,000. up 1.7% from Saptember 1974.

Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland totalled an estimated \$7.71 billion in the January to September period of 1975, up 7.1% from \$7.20 billion in the first nine months of 1974.

Farm Input Price Index (1961=100)

The Farm Input Price Index for Canada rose 2.5% in the third quarter of 1975, moving to 214.1 from the revised second-quarter level of 208.9. The eastern index increased 2.0% while the western index advanced 3.0%.

Higher costs of petroleum products were responsible for more than one-half of the rise between the second and third quarters. Higher prices for building replacement and repairs, tarm labour, artificial insemination and custom work also contributed to this increase.

Over the 12 months from the third quarter of 1974, the Canada index showed a rise of 8.6%. During this period, production costs increased 6.9% for farmers in Eastern Canada and 10.7% for Western farmers.


Housing Starts

New residential construction activity accelerated in September with housing starts in Canadian centres of 10,000 population and over rising 38.4% to 18,864 units from 13,628 a year earlier.

Housing starts recorded in the latest month, by province and with September 1974 figures in brackets: Ontario. 6,488 (5,245); Quebec, 4,429 (3,704); British Columbia, 2,781 (2,100), Alberta, 2,435 (1,046), Saskatchewan, 938 (514); Manitoba, 557 (299); Nova Scotia, 481 (346); New Brunswick, 400 (225), Newfoundland, 246 (137); and Prince Edward Island, 109 (12).

For the first nine months of 1975, housing starts in urban centres totalled 119.972 units. down 11.5% from 135,596 in January-September 1974.
