## Department Store Sales and Stocks

Department store sales rose to \$733.4 million, an increase of 12.7% from \$650.6 million in December 1973.

Sales were up in 37 of the 40 departments in the latest month with the largest gains recorded by plumbing, heating and building materials, which more than doubled in sales to \$4.6 million from \$2.1 million, major appliances (42.0%) and floor coverings (38.5%).

All provinces reported increased department store sales over December 1973 with a high of 58.8% for Prince Edward Island. Sales rose 12.6% in Montreal, 10.0% in Winnipeg, 6.4% in Toronto and 5.4% in Vancouver.

Inventories held in December (at selling price) were valued at \$1.30 billion, up 26.2% from the corresponding month in 1973.

## Fossil Fuel Production, 1973-74


The value of all production of Canadian fossil fuels (oil, natural gas, natural gas by-products and coal) climbed 60% to \$5.17 billion in 1974 from \$3.23 billion in 1973.

Over-all production of crude oil decreased 6.0% in 1974 to 616.2 million barrels, but the value of production rose 60% to \$3.59 billion. Domestic production of natural gas fell 1.2% to 3.08 trillion cubic feet but the total value of production rose 52% to \$686.6 million. Production of natural gas by-products fell 2.7% to 113.1 million barrels, with the value increasing 80% to \$629.0 million.

Coal production rose 4.6% in 1974 to 23.6 million tons, with the total value increasing 49% to \$268.0 million.

## Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in December were estimated at \$6.98 billion, down 3.5% from the revised November level of \$7.23 billion. New orders for durable goods fell 9.8%, while those for non-durable goods rose 2.5%.

Total unfilled orders were estimated at \$10.26 billion in December, down 1.0% from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was 1.9% higher at \$14.22 billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned — to shipments rose to 2.01:1 in December from 1.99:1 (revised) in November, while the finished products — to shipments ratio moved to 0.67:1 from 0.66:1 (revised).

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at \$7.08 billion, an increase of 0.9% from the revised November value of \$7.02 billion.


Unadjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in December at an estimated \$6.70 billion showed an increase of 20.3% from a year earlier. Shipments in 1974 totalled \$79.34 billion, up 21.4% from \$65.37 billion in 1973.

## Index of Industrial Production

(1961=100)

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production declined 0.7% in December to 214.5 from 215.9 (revised) in November to stand 2.5% below the December 1973 level of 219.9.

Mining output rose 2.7% in the latest month. Total manufacturing output was down 1.1%; durables manufacturing decreased 1.7% and non-durable manufacturing was off 0.5%. Utilities output declined 1.2%.

#### Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in December were estimated at \$3.25 billion, up 13.0% from December 1973.

Notable sales changes from a year earlier included groceries and food specialties, up 23.5%, and industrial and transportation equipment and supplies, up 31.0%.

Wholesale inventories were valued at \$5.94 billion in the latest month, an increase of 29.7% over December of last year.

#### Coal and Coke Statistics

Canadian coal production in December increased 1.4% to 2.28 million tons from 2.25 million tons in December 1973. Imports decreased to 174,510 tons from 1.26 million tons.

Industrial consumers used 1.70 million tons of coal in the latest month (down 19.5% from a year earlier) and 544,186 tons of coke (up 10.1%).

## Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities during January, with increases ranging from 0.1% in Winnipeg to 0.8% it Saint John and Ouebec City.

Food indexes increased in nine centres, declined in four and were unchanged in one. Quotations were generally higher for dairy, bakery and cereal products, eggs, processed fruit and vegetables, beverages and restaurant food. Prices were lower for most meats, poultry, fresh fruit and sugar.

Between January 1974 and January 1975, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities, with increases as follows: St. John's, 13.5%; Winnipeg, 13.4%; Vancouver, 13.3%; Thunder Bay, 13.2%; Toronto, 12.3%; Saskatoon, 12.2%; Calgary, 12.2%; Montreal, 11.9%; Edmonton, 11.9%; Regina, 11.7%; Saint John, 11.5%; Quebec City, 11.4%; Ottawa, 10.2%; and Halifax, 10.1%.



### Franchise Food Outlet Sales

Total estimated 1973 sales and receipts of outlets associated with franchise food serving operations in Canada amounted to \$379.7 million.

Sales by product lines showed chicked represented 36.1% of total food, non-alcoholic and alcoholic beverage sales. Hamburger sales were reported at 26.0%, followed by dairy products and soft drinks at 13.9%.

## The Wheat Review

Total exports of wheat from the four traditional major exporters during August-December 1974 amounted to 783.6 million bushels, down 9% from the August-December 1973 record level of 857.7 million.

Total supplies of wheat remaining in these countries at January 1, 1975 for export and for carryover at the end of respective crop years amounted to 1,720.2 million bushels, down 0.2% from 1,724.0 million a year earlier.

Supplies were held as follows, in millions of bushels and with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 788.2 (659.6); Canada, 557.1 (645.8); Australia, 332.1 (330.3); and Argentina, 42.8 (88.3).

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## **Consumer Credit**

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached \$16.17 billion at the end of December, an increase of 16.7% from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to \$10.82 billion in the latest month, up 21.8% from December 1973.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held \$1.21 billion balances of retail instalment sales paper (an increase of 5.0% from a year earlier) and had \$1.51 billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up 6.1%).

## **Telephone Industry Statistics**

Canadian telephone systems reported net operating revenue of \$55.7 million in December, a decrease of 8.5% from December 1973.

Gross operating revenues of the thirteen major telephone companies rose 13.4% to \$206.7 million in the latest month; operating expenses jumped 24.6% to \$151.1 million.

Construction expenditures of the firms at \$169.5 million in December showed an increase of 34.1% from a year earlier.

## Restaurant Statistics


Restaurants in Canada had total estimated receipts of \$144.5 million in December, an increase of 11.4% from a year earlier. Sales were up in all provinces.

Restaurant receipts for the latest month, by province and with percentage gains over December 1973 in brackets:

 Ontario, \$55.0 million (12.3%); Quebec, \$47.9 million (10.9%); British Columbia, \$12.3 million (11.4%); Alberta, \$10.3 million (10.2%); Manitoba, \$6.9 million (\$12.3%); Saskatchewan, \$4.6 million (11.4%); Nova Scotia, \$3.3 million (9.1%); New Brunswick, \$2.6 million (7.2%); Newfoundland, \$1.3 million (10.8%); and Prince Edward Island, \$334,000 (\$11.3%).

In 1974, restaurant receipts totalled an estimated \$1.77 billion, up 10.3% from the 1973 figure.


## **Unemployment Insurance Payments**

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act totalled \$164 million in December, an increase of 16% from \$142 million in December 1973. The average weekly payment was \$73.95, up 11% from \$65.72 a year earlier.

Initial and renewal claims received in December numbered 332,000, up 31% from the November total of 253,000 and 30% greater than the 256,000 filed in December 1973.

In 1974, net payments under the act amounted to \$2.12 billion, an increase of 6% from \$2.00 billion in 1973.
