Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland totalled an estimated \$1.90 billion in January, more than double the \$891.5 million realized in January 1974.

Total payments made to farmers in the latest month, by province and with January 1974 figures in brackets:

• Saskatchewan, \$983.2 million (\$272.7 million); Alberta, \$417.7 million (\$187.2 million); Ontario, \$188.0 million (\$205.6 million); Manitoba, \$179.3 million (\$97.2 million); Quebec, \$82.1 (\$71.9 million); British million Columbia, \$26.5 million (\$28.1 million); Nova Scotia, \$8.8 million (\$8.7 million); New Brunswick, \$7.3 million (\$10.3 million); and Prince Edward Island, \$5.5 million (\$9.8 million).

Non-Residential Building Construction **Input Price Index**

(1961=100)


The non-residential building construction input price index for Canada rose to 239.6 in January, an increase of 2.5% from the December level and up 12.2% from a year earlier.


The materials component of the total index increased 12.9% over the twelve months from January 1974; the labour component moved up 11.7%.

Prices of steel and metal work used in non-residential building construction climbed 29.6% during this period, concrete products rose 22.1%, electrical equipment 11.1%, plumbing, heating and other equipment 8.1% and other materials 12.8%. Prices of lumber and lumber products registered an 11.9% decline.

Consumer Price Index (CPI)

(1961 = 100)

The Consumer Price Index for Canada rose 0.8% to 178.0 in February from 176.6 in January. Though all main components moved up, the CPI registered a smaller advance than in the corresponding month last year, mainly because of slower-rising food prices.

The main impetus behind the 0.8% rise in retail food prices in the latest month was generally-higher quotations for fresh fruit and vegetables (except potatoes) and increased prices for milk, butter and other dairy products and most cereal and bakery items.

The rise of 0.7% in the index for all items other than food was mainly attributable to widespread increases in insurance rates for automobiles and for dwellings and household effects.

Between February 1974 and February 1975, the All-Items Consumer Price Index advanced 11.8%.

During this period, the following component index increases were recorded:

Food, up 14.7%; tobacco and alcohol, 12.6%; recreation, education and reading, 12.3%; health and personal care, 11.7%; transportation, 11.4%; housing, 10.3%; and clothing, 8.5%.

Electric Power Statistics, 1973

Net generation — total generation less energy used in generating station service — increased 9.6% in 1973 to 263.3 billion kilowatt hours from 240.2 billion kwh. in 1972.

Although total generation rose by 9.6%, electric energy made available in Canada increased by 7.7%; exports rose 47.6% to 16.29 billion kwh. while imports decreased 5.5% to 2.25 billion kwh.

General Wholesale Index

(1935-39=100)

The general wholesale price index rose 0.6% in January to 484.7 from 482.0 (revised) in December to stand 12.9% higher than the January 1974 level of 429.2. Five of the eight major groups moved up; three declined.

The wood products group index increased 6.3% in the latest month as prices for newsprint and wrapping paper jumped 12.1% and wood pulp rose 8.5%.

Non-metallic minerals advanced 4.4% with price increases of 30.5% for coke, 14.2% for cement and 12.5% for salt.

Iron products rose 2.8%, mainly because of increases for wire and for rolling mill products.

The vegetable products group index decreased 4.1% from the December level, reflecting price declines for onions, sugar and its products and potatoes.


Restaurant Statistics

Restaurants in Canada had total estimated receipts of \$140.0 million in January, an increase of 10.8% from a year earlier. Sales were up in all provinces.

Restaurant receipts for the latest month, by province and with percentage gains over January 1974 in brackets:

Ontario, \$52.3 million (11.9%); Quebec, \$45.4 million (10.8%); Alberta, \$13.0 million (10.8%); British Columbia, \$12.3 million (9.7%); Manitoba, \$5.9 million (8.1%); Saskatchewan, \$4.3 million (10.3%); New Brunswick, \$3.2 million (6.5%); Nova Scotia, \$2.5 million (5.9%); Newfoundland, \$918,000 (12.1%); and Prince Edward Island, \$279,000 (6.9%).

Industry Selling Price Index: Manufacturing

(1961=100)

The industry selling price index for total manufacturing rose to 185.0 in January, an increase of 1.3% from the December level and up 17.5% from a year earlier.

The paper and allied industries group advanced 6.8%, spurred by an 8.5% price increase by pulp and paper mills. Nonmetallic minerals rose 6.2% with price hikes of 15.1% for cement manufacturers, 5.8% for ready-mix concrete and 3.3% for concrete products manufacturers.

Over the twelve months from January 1974, the largest price increases were shown by the following component group indexes:

• Chemical and chemical products industries, 32.6%; paper and allied industries, 30.6%; rubber products industries, 21.8%; petroleum and coal products industries, 21.1%; nonmetallic mineral industries, 20.9%; and foods and beverages industries, 18.1%.

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International Travel

Preliminary statistics for January show that 1.4 million United States visitors entered Canada, up 1.5% from a year earlier. Canadian residents returning from visits to the U.S. increased 13.0% to 1.9 million.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the U.S. rose 16.0% to 38,600. Residents of Canada returning from abroad numbered 159,500, up 10.5% from January 1974.


Electric Power Statistics

Net generation rose 1.1% in January to 26.6 billion kilowatt hours from 26.3 billion kwh. a year earlier.

There were increases in net generation in eight regions of Canada in the latest month while decreases were registered in New Brunswick (-20.0%), Ontario (-6.9%), Saskatchewan (-5.0%) and Quebec (-0.5%). The largest increases were recorded in Newfoundland (30%) and Nova Scotia (13.6%).

Hydro generation increased 7.1%; thermal production decreased 12.5%.

The Labour Force

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate for Canada rose to 6.8% in February from 6.7% a month earlier.

Last month the unemployment rate for men 25 years of age and over remained unchanged at 5.2%, while for women 25 and over it increased to 4.1% from 3.6% in January. For persons aged 14 to 24, the rate climbed to 12.1% from 11.8%.

Adjusted for seasonal variations, employment declined marginally in February while the number of unemployed increased by 16,000.

The seasonally-adjusted participation rate for Canada — percentage of the population 14 and over included in the labour force — moved up to 58.9% from 58.8%.

On an actual basis, the number of persons employed in February at 8.87 million was unchanged from January but up from 8.67 million in February 1974.

The actual unemployment total was 839,000, or 8.6% of the 9.71 million included in the labour force last month. By province, unemployment rates were: Newfoundland, 23.4%; New Brunswick, 16.3%; Quebec, 10.9%; British Columbia, 9.9%; Nova Scotia, 9.5%; Ontario, 7.1%; Manitoba, 5.4%; Alberta, 4.1%; and Saskatchewan, 3.9%.
