## Inventories, Shipments and Orders

 in Manufacturing IndustriesManufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in January were estimated at $\$ 6.86$ billion, down $2.8 \%$ from the December level of $\$ 7.05$ billion. New orders for durable goods dropped $8.9 \%$ while those for non-durable goods were off $2.0 \%$.

Total unfilled orders were estimated at $\$ 10.32$ billion, down $0.9 \%$ from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was $1.5 \%$ higher at $\$ 14.64$ billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments rose to 2.11:1 in January from 2.06:1 in December, while the finished products - to shipments ratio moved to $0.70: 1$ from 0.69:1.

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 6.95$ billion, a decrease of $0.7 \%$ from December.

Not adjusted for seasonal variations, manufacturers' shipments in January were estimated at $\$ 6.47$ billion, up $10.7 \%$ from $\$ 5.84$ billion a year earlier.

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production declined $1.9 \%$ in January to 211.2 from 215.3 (revised) in December to stand $5.0 \%$ below the January 1974 level of 222.3 .

Total manufacturing output was off $2.0 \%$ in the latest month; non-durable manufacturing increased $1.2 \%$ but durables manufacturing decreased $5.0 \%$ from the previous month.

Mining output dropped $3.1 \%$ in January while utilities output registered an $0.2 \%$ increase.

## Major Appliance Sales

Freezer sales were higher, but Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales in January of other major appliances ran well under year-earlier levels.

Major appliance sales recorded by these manufacturers in the latest month, with percentage changes from January 1974 in brackets:

- Refrigerators, 33,362 (-24.5\%); home and farm freezers, 33,542 (up 56.3\%);
- Stoves and ranges, $28,805(-31.0 \%)$;
- Automatic washing machines, 15,763 (-49.0\%); electric and gas clothes dryers, 16,631 (-47.87);
- Television sets, 35,341 (-34.7\%).

Manufacturers' sales in January of 29,014 Canadian-made colour television sets reflected a drop of $27.8 \%$ from a year earlier; black-and-white set sales fell $54.6 \%$ to 6,327 units.

## Unemployment Insurance Payments

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act reached $\$ 307$ inillion in January, an increase of $24 \%$ from $\$ 248$ million a year earlier. The average weekly payment was $\$ 82.54$, up 12\% from $\$ 73.80$ in January 1974.

Initial and renewal claims filed in the latest month numbered 356,000 , up $7 \%$ from the December total of 332,000 and $28 \%$ from the 278,000 received in January 1974.

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached $\$ 16.20$ billion at the end of January, an increase of $17.1 \%$ from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to $\$ 10.89$ billion in the latest month, up 22.6\% from January 1974.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held $\$ 1.18$ billion balances of retail installment sales paper (an increase of $3.3 \%$ from a year earlier) and had $\$ 1.50$ billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up 5.6\%).

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in January were estimated at $\$ 3.06$ billion, up $6.6 \%$ from January 1974.

Notable sales changes from a year earlier included groceries and food specialties, up $16.1 \%$, and industrial and transportation equipment and supplies, up $48.6 \%$.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 6.12$ billion in the latest month, an increase of $28.6 \%$ over January of last year.

The first issue of a new quarterly publication, Government Finance in Accordance with the System of National Accounts ( $68.001, \$ 1.05 / \$ 4.20$ ), will be available shortly. Designed to supplement the existing quarterly, National Income and Expenditure Accounts (13-001, $\$ 1.05 / \$ 4.20$ ), the new publication will provide detailed revenue and expenditure transactions of the government sector.

## Consumer Price Indexes <br> for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all region. al cities during February, with incisase: ranging from $0.3 \%$ in Edmonton to 1.48 in Winnipeg.

Housing components rose in all 14 centres in response to increased shelter costs, higher insurance rates for household effects and increased prices for household supplies. Health and personal care indexes increased in all cities with higher charges for men's haircuts and women's hairdressing and increased prices for pharmaceuticals and toiletries. Recreation, education and reading elements also rose in all centres, reflecting higher movie admission and increased magazine subscription rates.

Between February 1974 and February 1975, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities, with increases as follows: Winnipeg, $13.7 \%$; Thunder Bay, $12.6 \%$; Vancouver, 12.4\%; St. John's, 12.3\%; Saskatoon, 12.1\%; Calgary , 11.9\%; Montreal, 11.9\%; Toronto, $11.8 \%$; Edmonton, 11.4\%; Regina, 11.4\%; Saint John, 11.4\%; Quebec City, 11.3\%; Halifax, $10.5 \%$; and Ottawa, $10.1 \%$.

## Farm Implement Sales

Sales of farm implements and equipment for January were valued at $\$ 33.0$ million, an increase of $35.8 \%$ from $\$ 24.3$ million a year earlier.

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment at $\$ 7.8$ million in the latest month showed a decrease of $3.7 \%$ from $\$ 8.1$ million in January 1974.

## Canada's Foreign Trade

## in Agricultural Products

Domestic exports of agricultural products amounted to $\$ 3.79$ villion in 1974 , up $26 \%$ from $\$ 3.00$ billion in 1973 . Imports of farm products rose $31 \%$ to $\$ 2.82$ billion from $\$ 2.16$ billion. The trade surplus for these commodities increased to $\$ 963$ million in 1974 from $\$ 842$ million in 1973.

Shipments of agricultural products to overseas countries increased by one-third to $\$ 3.28$ billion, while exports to the United States declined $7 \%$ to $\$ 510 \mathrm{mil}$ lion. Wheat shipments to countries other than the U.S. rose in value to $\$ 2.03$ billion in 1974 from $\$ 1.22$ billion a year earlier, accounting for almost the entire increase in shipments to overseas countries.

Canada's imports of agricultural products from the U.S. increased $29 \%$ to $\$ 1.57$ billion in 1974 and those from other countries rose by one-third to $\$ 1.25$ billion.

## Housing Starts

New residential construction activity declined in January with housing starts in Canadian centres of 10,000 population and over showing a $47.2 \%$ drop to 7,133 units from 13,506 a year earlier.

Housing starts recorded in the latest month, with January 1974 figures in brackets: Ontario, 2,653 (6,212); Quebec, 1,652 (3,122); British Columbia, 1,352 (1,295); Alberta, 687 ( 1,174 ); Manitoba, 249 (701); Saskatchewan, 182 (323); Nova Scotia, 154 (489); Newfoundland, 134 (59); New Brunswick, 53 (114); and Prince Edward Island, 17 (17).

## Federal Government Employment

Canada's federal government had 458,967 employees on September 30, 1974, an increase of 27,477 ( $6.4 \%$ ) from a year earlier.

Total payroll for the latest quarter amounted to $\$ 1.21$ billion, up $\$ 254.1$ million ( $26.6 \%$ ) from the July-September 1973 period.

Radio and Television Broadcasting, 1974
Preliminary data on privately-owned radio broadcasting operations for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1974 show revenues up $14 \%$ from the previous year at $\$ 182.4$ million. Net profits (before taxes) were estimated at $\$ 28.5$ million, an increase of $11.5 \%$.

Television revenues increased $13.0 \%$ in the latest year to $\$ 193.0$ million. Beforetax profits - significantly affected by the performance of the new Global Television Network which reported a net loss for the period - declined $28.1 \%$ to $\$ 23.1$ million.

## Canadian Balance

## of International Payments

Canada's deficit in its current account balance of payments increased in 1974 to $\$ 1.88$ billion from $\$ 425$ million in 1973.

The main factor in the larger deficit was the drop in the surplus on merchandise trade to $\$ 1.02$ billion from $\$ 2.23$ billion a year carlier. As in 1973, there were major labour disputes which severely disrupted the pattern of trade, while the demand for exports was reduced by lower economic activity in many countries.

Augmenting the drop in the merchandise trade surplus was a rise of almost $\$ 250$ million in the deficit on nonmerchandise transactions to $\$ 2.90$ billion.

Capital movements led to a net inflow in 1974 of $\$ 1.90$ billion, a swing of $\$ 1.95$ billion from the small net outflow recorded in the previous year. Canada's net official monetary assets rose by $\$ 24$ million to $\$ 5.83$ billion (U.S.).
