## Department Store Sales by Regions

Department store sales in February rose to $\$ 306.8$ million, up $10.3 \%$ from a year earlier. Increases were recorded in all regions of Canada.

Canada's deficit in trade in automotive products with the United States increased in 1974 to $\$ 1.33$ billion from $\$ 440$ million in 1973.

Imports of automotive products from the U.S. showed a $17.7 \%$ rise to $\$ 6.75$ billion that considerably outpaced Canada's gain in exports, which rose by $2.4 \%$ to $\$ 5.42$ billion. It was the fourth consecutive year that import growth exceeded export expansion, with the spread widening.

Nearly three-fourths of the deterioration in the trade balance in 1974 was attributable to the deficit on automotive parts, which expanded $47 \%$ to $\$ 2.05$ billion. Trucks and tires also contributed to widening the deficit. Only the surplus on passenger cars improved moderately possibly because of the consumer preference in the U.S. for the smaller-sized automobiles assembled in Canada.

Canada's deficit in automotive trade with overseas countries also continued to expand in 1974, up $\$ 82$ million to $\$ 484$ reilhon. Over-all imports of automotive *ad related products from these countries intreased $\$ 137$ million to $\$ 760$ million, while exports rose $\$ 55$ million to $\$ 276$ million.

## Retail Trade

Retail sales in Canada reached $\$ 3.29$ billion in February, an increase of $13.7 \%$ from a year earlier. Sales increased in 25 of the 28 trade groups with the largest gains recorded by book and stationery stores ( $33.4 \%$ ) and grocery, confectionery and sundries stores ( $31.7 \%$ ).

All provinces and territories reported sales increases over February 1974 with highs of $19.4 \%$ for Newfoundland and Saskatchewan. Sales rose $15.7 \%$ in Montreal, $10.2 \%$ in Toronto, $8.1 \%$ in Vancouver and $0.9 \%$ in Winnipeg.

Revised data for January 1975 show total retail sales at $\$ 3.34$ billion, up $14.0 \%$ from a year earlier.

## Unemployment Insurance Payments

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act reached $\$ 288$ million in February, an increase of $30 \%$ from $\$ 221$ million a year earlier. The average weekly payment was up $12 \%$ to \$84.11 from \$75.00.

Initial and renewal claims received in February numbered 219,000 , up $29 \%$ from the February 1974 total of 170,000.

For the first two months of 1975 , net payments under the act amounted to $\$ 594$ million, an increase of $27 \%$ from the $\$ 468$ million disbursed in JanuaryFebruary 1974.

## Farm Implement Sales

Sales of farm implements and equipment for the first two months of 1975 were valued at $\$ 60.9$ million, up $29.6 \%$ from $\$ 47.0$ million in January-February 1974.

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment increased $1.7 \%$ to $\$ 18.3$ million in the latest period.

## International Travel

Preliminary statistics for February show 1.4 million United States visitors entered Canada, down $1.8 \%$ from February 1974. Canadian resident travellers returning from visits to the U.S. increased $9.3 \%$ to 1.8 million.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the U.S. rose $15.7 \%$ to 34,800 in the latest month. Residents of Canada returning from abroad numbered 122,500, up 14.4\% from February 1974.

## Index of Industrial Production

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production increased $0.7 \%$ to 211.5 in February from a downward-revised level of 210.0 in January. But the index was down $5.8 \%$ from a year earlier.

Total manufacturing output was up $0.5 \%$ in the latest month; non-durable manufacturing decreased $0.4 \%$ but durables manufacturing increased $1.5 \%$.

Mining production showed a $2.1 \%$ gain and utilities output advanced $0.4 \%$.

## Housing Starts

New residential construction activity continued to decline in February with housing starts in Canadian centres of 10,000 population and over dropping $44.9 \%$ to 4,973 units from 9,029 a year earlier.

Canadian Direct Investment Abroad, 1971 At the end of 1971, the total book value a) Canadian long-term direct investment nbroted in subsidiaries, controlled comban'ss, affiliates and branches was $\$ 6.53$ billica, an increase of $\$ 346$ million ( $6 \%$ ) ower 1970.

Over one-half of total direct investment at the end of 1971 was in manufacturing, as investment in this industrial component rose $8 \%$ to $\$ 3.45$ billion. Investment in utilities at $\$ 1.28$ billion was next in importance, followed by mining and petroleum at $\$ 934$ million.

Direct investment in United States firms rose $\$ 137$ million - the smallest increase in the last four years - to $\$ 3.39$ billion and accounted for $52 \%$ of Canada's direct investment abroad at the end of 1971. Investment in the U.S. manufacturing sector, at $\$ 1.97$ billion, represented $30 \%$ of total direct investment abroad.

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.65 million barrels per day of crude oil, tordensate, pentanes plus and refined Fetroleum products in February, down $14.0 \%$ from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils declined $15.4 \%$ to 2.23 million $B / D$ in the latest month; imported oils decreased $6.2 \%$ to 424,000 B/D.

## Wholesale Trade

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached $\$ 16.21$ billion at the end of February, an increase of $16.5 \%$ from a year earlier.

Personal cash loans by chartered banks rose to $\$ 10.98$ billion in the latest month, up $22.1 \%$ from February 1974.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies held $\$ 1.15$ billion balances of retail instalment sales paper (an increase of $0.8 \%$ from a year earlier) and had $\$ 1.49$ billion outstanding of personal cash loans (up 4.8\%).
