Employment, Earnings and Hours

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at \$195.54 in March were up 14.3% from \$171.07 a year earlier.

First estimates show that average weekly earnings (by province) were highest in British Columbia (\$220.69), followed by Alberta (\$199.82), Ontario (\$196.98), Newfoundland (\$190.14), Quebec (\$190.05), Saskatchewan (\$181.29), Manitoba (\$179.88), New Brunswick (\$178.37), Nova Scotia (\$169.43) and Prince Edward Island (\$146.30).

Average weekly earnings in March (by industry division) were as follows: mining, \$270.13; forestry, \$267.65; construction, \$258.98; transportation, communication and other utilities, \$225.05; anufacturing, \$205.76; finance, insurance and real estate, \$187.39; trade, \$155.11; and service, \$139.02.

Retail Trade

Retail sales in Canada reached \$3.69 billion in March, an increase of 10.4% from a year earlier.


Sales increased in all trade groups except household appliance stores (-5.2%) and furniture, TV, radio and appliance stores (-11.1%). The largest gains were shown by women's clothing stores (19.7%) and grocery, confectionery and sundries stores (16.2%).


All provinces except Prince Edward Island (-3.3%) recorded higher sales than in March 1974. The largest increases were registered in Newfoundland (20.5%) and Alberta (19.2%). Sales rose 13.4% in Montreal, 9.0% in Vancouver, 5.7% in Toronto and 0.9% in Winnipeg.

Revised data for February show retail teles for the month at \$3.22 billion, up 2.1% from February 1974.




Coal and Coke Statistics

Production of coal in Canada increased 10.0% in March to 2.31 million tons from 2.10 million tons in March 1974. Imports rose to 262,577 tons from 113,545 tons.

Industrial consumers used 1.69 million tons of coal in the latest month (down 12.4% from a year earlier) and 377,950 tons of coke (down 18.5%).

Quarterly Report on Job Vacancies

In the first quarter of 1975 there were on average 56,300 vacancies for full-time jobs in Canada, down 14,900 (21%) from the 1974 fourth quarter and down 23,700 (30%) from the first quarter of 1974.

All five economic regions of Canada showed decreases from the previous quarter and on a year-to-year comparison.

In the year-to-year comparison, 76% of the total decrease of 23,700 vacancies originated in goods-producing industries, with the largest decline occurring in manufacturing (-15,400). In service-producing industries, the largest decreases occurred in community, business and personal services sector (-4,800) and the trade sector (-4,200). Public administration was the only service-producing sector to show an increase from the previous year (up 5,000).


Farm Input Price Index (1961=100)


The Farm Input Price Index for Canada rose 1.1% in the first quarter of 1975, moving to 206.6 from the fourth-quarter 1974 level of 204.3. The eastern index declined 0.5% while the western index advanced 3.1%.

The latest index showed higher prices for mortgage credit, property taxes, machinery and motor vehicle replacement and operation and seed. Prices were lower for feed and feeder cattle.

Over the twelve months from the first quarter of 1974, the Canada index showed a rise of 10.2%. During this period, production costs increased 9.0% for farmers in Eastern Canada and 11.6% for western farmers.

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Preliminary Statement of Canadian Trade Canada's seasonally-adjusted merchandise trade balance moved into surplus in April as a result of a month-to-month increase of 3.5% in exports and a decline of 4.5% in imports. The April surplus of \$55 million compared with a deficit of \$170 million for March.

The continued drop in the value of shipments to the United States was more than offset by a sharp rise in seasonally-adjusted exports to overseas countries (excluding the United Kingdom).

Exports of wheat rebounded following the settlement of the longshoremen's strike on the Pacific coast, and exports of coal, iron and nickel ores, lumber, motor vehicles and parts also increased. Crude oil deliveries to the U.S. declined and exports of asbestos, copper ores, newsprint and fertilizer also decreased.


Seasonally-adjusted imports were lower, except from Japan. Imports from Japan for the three months ending in April, however, were still 17% below the preceding three-month period.

Unadjusted exports of \$10.16 billion in the first four months of 1975 were 5.8% higher than those for the corresponding period of 1974. Exports to the U.S. increased 5.4%, while shipments to Japan fell 20.4%.

Deliveries of crude oil and natural gas to the U.S. rose some \$300 million. Exports of newsprint were up \$150 million and wood pulp shipments were \$120 million ahead. Smaller but still important gains were recorded in exports of wheat, iron and nickel ores, fertilizer and motor vehicles. However, exports of copper ores and metal fell about \$200 million, and there was a decline of nearly \$170 million for lumber. Exports of aluminum, zinc and automotive parts also decreased in the latest period.

Year-to-date imports of \$11.13 billion in 1975 showed an increase of 20.2% from January-April 1974.




Gas Utilities

Canadian consumers purchased 147.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas in February, up 4.1% from a year earlier. Exports decreased 5.1% to 74.5 billion cubic feet.

Cumulatively, sales of natural gas for the first two months of 1975 totalled 296.9 billion cubic feet, an increase of 0.4% from January-February 1974.
