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Weekly Bulletin

Employment, Earnings and Hours

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at \$198.15 in April were up 14.8% from \$172.56 a year earlier.

First estimates show that average weekly earnings (by province) were highest in British Columbia (\$222.95), followed by Alberta (\$200.54), Ontario (\$200.07), Newfoundland (\$196.99), Quebec (\$192.53), Saskatchewan (\$183.28), New Brunswick (\$181.58), Manitoba (\$181.32), Nova Scotia (\$171.43) and Prince Edward Island (\$147.23).

Average weekly earnings in April (by industry division) were as follows: construction, \$276.16; mining, \$271.52; forestry, \$265.20; transportation, communication and other utilities, \$227.42; manufacturing, \$208.54; finance, insurince and real estate, \$188.98; trade, \$157.28; and service, \$137.35.

Retail Trade

Seasonally-adjusted April retail sales decreased 1.4% from March to a level of \$3.90 billion.


Total retail trade without seasonal adjustment reached \$3.95 billion, an increase of 10.5% from a year earlier. All provinces except Saskatchewan (-0.3%) had sales increases over April 1974 with the largest advance in Prince Edward Island (16.4%). Sales were up 17.7% in Vancouver, 11.9% in Montreal, 7.0% in Winnipeg and 6.6% in Toronto.

Year-to-year gains were registered in 24 of the 28 trade groups with the largest increases shown by used car dealers (36.3%) and combination stores (19.0%).

Revised data for March show retail ales for the month at \$3.64 billion, up 9.0% from March 1974.

Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached \$16.57 billion at the end of April, an increase of 13.7% from a year earlier.

Outstanding balances held by these credit grantors in the latest month, with percentage changes from April 30, 1974:

- Chartered banks' personal loans, \$11.39 billion (up 18.7%);
- Sales finance and consumer companies:
- small loans, \$275 million (-15.4%);
- large loans, \$1.49 billion (up 2.5%);
- retail instalment sales paper, \$1.12 billion (-4.1%);
- Life insurance companies' policy loans, \$1.10 billion (up 19.5%);
- Department stores and furniture, television, radio and household appliances stores, \$1.15 billion (up 6.9%);
- Quebec savings banks' personal loans, \$48 million (up 23.1%).

Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in April were estimated at \$6.70 billion, up 0.4% from the revised value for March of \$6.67 billion. New orders for durable goods increased 0.5% to \$2.94 billion, while those for non-durable goods rose 0.3% to \$3.75 billion.

Total unfilled orders were estimated at \$10.01 billion, down 1.9% from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was 0.6% higher at \$15.19 billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned — to shipments declined to 2.20:1 in April from 2.23:1 (revised) in March, while the finished products — to shipments ratio remained steady at 0.75:1 in both months.

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at \$6.89 billion, an increase of 1.8% from March.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in April were estimated at \$7.10 billion. Shipments in the first four months of 1975 totalled \$26.91 billion, up 7.2% from \$25.10 billion in January-April 1974.


Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities in May with increases ranging from 0.5% in St. John's and Halifax to 1.1% in Saint John and Vancouver.

The food index rose in all 14 centres, reflecting generally-higher prices for fresh produce, meat, poultry and dairy products. Increased shelter costs (for both owned and rented accommodation), higher prices for tobacco products, increased movie admission charges and higher prices for recreation equipment were other major contributors to the advances recorded for the all-items indexes at the city level. The health and personal care component of the index also increased in most cities.

Between May 1974 and May 1975, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities, with increases recorded as follows: Winnipeg, 11.2%; Saint John, 11.1%; Vancouver, 10.9%; Thunder Bay, 10.7%; St. John's, 10.5%; Calgary, 10.2%; Toronto, 10.2%; Saskatoon, 10.2%; Montreal, 9.8%; Edmonton, 9.6%; Quebec City, 9.2%; Regina, 9.2%; Halifax, 8.9%; and Ottawa, 8.9%.

Federal Government Employment

Canada's federal government had 450,790 employees on December 31, 1974, an increase of 17,064 (3.9%) from a year earlier.

Total payroll for the latest quarter amounted to \$1.36 billion, up \$257.1 million (23.3%) from October-December 1973.

Refined Petroleum Products

Canadian refineries produced 52.4 million barrels of refined petroleum products in April, up 4.2% from a year earlier.

Net sales of refined petroleum products at 47.6 million barrels in the latest month showed an increase of 2.4% from April 1974.

Canadian Balance

of International Payments

Canada's seasonally-adjusted current account deficit widened to \$1.53 billion in the first quarter of 1975 from \$998 million in the previous quarter. The main factor in the increased deficit was a riso of \$520 million in the merchandise tradedeficit to \$537 million.

Merchandise exports were especially weak in the latest quarter, showing a 6% drop in value that reflected both the slackness in demand in foreign countries, particularly the United States, and supply restraints in Canada, especially labour problems at West Coast Ports. Merchandise imports rose less than 1%.

Among non-merchandise accounts, the major movements on a seasonally-adjusted basis were an increase in travel expenditures abroad of \$100 million and a decrease in freight and shipping receipts. These were more than offset by a reduction in payments for interest and dividends and by small increases in receipts from service accounts.

Total capital movements, unadjusted for seasonal variations, led to a net capital inflow of \$2.00 billion in the first quarter of 1975, up from \$830 million in the previous quarter. This inflow largely financed the unadjusted current account deficit of \$2.03 billion, so that the imbalance covered by a decrease in Canada's official monetary assets was \$37 million.

Gross National Product (GNP)

Canada's Gross National Product (at market prices) grew by 0.3% in the first quarter of 1975 to reach a level of \$146.5 billion, seasonally adjusted at annual rates. In real terms, however, GNP declined on the quarter by 1.4% and was down 2.0% from the peak achieved in the first quarter of 1974.

The latest quarter was characterized by a recovery in consumer expenditure, further deterioration in residential construction activity and in the external trade sector, and some moderation in the rate of price inflation.

Despite the continuation of the recessionary pattern that began in the second quarter of 1974, growth was reasonably strong in the first quarter of 1975, with the exception of exports and the rate of inventory accumulation. Thus final domestic demand — which excludes these components — was up 1.3% in real terms in the quarter and 1.5% on the year.

Some first-quarter highlights:


- Consumer spending on goods and services showed an increase of 3.4% from last year's fourth quarter. This increase was considerably larger than the corresponding rise in personal disposable income of 2%, resulting in a drop of almost \$1 billion in personal savings.
- Business investment in machinery and equipment remained strong, increasing by 7.4% from the previous quarter. However, business residential construction declined by 4.8%. Total gross fixed capital formation was moderately strong in the first quarter, rising by 3.6% to a level of \$35.45 billion.
- Wages, salaries and supplementary labour income rose by 1.5% to a level of \$82.36 billion; the relatively-weak growth rate was mainly attributable to declining employment. Wages and salaries in the goods-producing industries showed virtually no change in the first quarter while those in the service-producing industries rose by 2.1%.
- Corporation profits (before taxes) declined for the second successive quarter, falling 4.7% from the fourth quarter to an annual level of \$16.61 billion.

Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.37 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in April, a decrease of 16.5% from a year earlier.

Labour Income

Total labour income for March was estimated at \$6.79 billion, up 14.4% from a year earlier.

Adjusted for seasonal variations, the March estimate of \$6.92 billion showed an increase of 1.1% from the February level.

Seasonally adjusted, labour income for the first quarter of 1975 increased by 1.5%, as compared with an advance of 4.1% recorded in the fourth quarter of 1974. Wages and salaries in the goodsproducing industries increased 0.4% in the latest quarter and those in the serviceproducing industries moved up 2.1%.

Unemployment Insurance Payments Net benefit paid to claimants under the

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act reached \$357 million in April, an increase of 69% from \$211 million a year earlier. The average weekly payment was up 12% to \$83.85 from \$74.78.

Initial and renewal claims received in April numbered 230,000, up 48% from the April 1974 total of 156,000.

For the first four months of 1975, net payments under the act amounted to \$1.25 billion, an increase of 39% from the \$900 million disbursed in January-April 1974.

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Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in April were estimated at \$3.65 billion, up 7.6% from April 1974.

One of the most notable sales changes in the consumer goods trades was registered by the motor vehicles component, showing an increase of 45.1%. In the industrial goods trades, sales of industrial and transportation equipment and supplies were up 40.0% from a year earlier.

Wholesale inventories were valued at \$6.41 billion in the latest month, an increase of 24.7% over April of last year.
