## Department Store Sales and Stocks

Department store sales rose to $\$ 432.1$ million in April, an increase of $12.8 \%$ from $\$ 383.0$ million in April 1974.

Sales increased in 36 of the 40 departments in the latest month with the largest gains recorded by gasoline, oil, auto accessories, repairs and supplies (31.9\%) and food and kindred products (29.4\%).

All provinces reported increased sales over April 1974 with a high of $84.9 \%$ for Prince Edward Island. Sales rose $19.5 \%$ in Vancouver, $15.4 \%$ in Winnipeg, $13.4 \%$ in Toronto and $2.2 \%$ in Montreal.

Inventories held in April (at selling price) were valued at $\$ 1.53$ billion, up $20.7 \%$ from a year earlier.

## Labour Income

Total labour income for April was estimated at $\$ 6.86$ billion, up $14.6 \%$ from a year earlier.

Adjusted for seasonal variations, the April estimate of $\$ 6.94$ billion showed an increase of $0.4 \%$ from the March level. Wages and salaries in both the goodsproducing and service-producing industries advanced at approximately the same rate.

## Coal and Coke Statistics

Production of coal in Canada increased $\mathbf{2 5 . 4 \%}$ in April to 2.36 million tons from 1.88 million in April 1974. Imports rose to 1.78 million tons from 1.72 million.

Industrial consumers used 1.63 million tons of coal in the latest month (down Q.8\% from a year earlier) and 388,274 lons of coke (down 15.4\%).

## Building Permits

Building permits taken out in Canada in March totalled $\$ 619.8$ million, down $25.0 \%$ from $\$ 826.1$ million a year earlier.

Lower totals were recorded in the latest month for residential permits at $\$ 354.6$ million ( $\$ 481.7$ million a year earlier), commercial permits at $\$ 119.3$ million ( $\$ 174.8$ million) and industrial permits at $\$ 45.8$ million ( $\$ 70.7$ million). Permits taken out for institutional and governmental building construction increased to $\$ 100.1$ million from $\$ 98.9$ million.

Building permits taken out in March, by province and with March 1974 figures in brackets:

- Ontario, $\$ 259.0$ million ( $\$ 382.0 \mathrm{mil}$ lion); Quebec, $\$ 151.4$ million ( $\$ 151.3$ million); British Columbia, $\$ 74.5 \mathrm{mil}$ lion ( $\$ 133.4$ million); Alberta, $\$ 72.3$ million ( $\$ 87.8$ million); Nova Scotia, $\$ 21.3$ million ( $\$ 14.6$ million); Manitoba, $\$ 17.3$ million ( $\$ 28.4$ million); Saskatchewan, $\$ 16.7$ million ( $\$ 14.4$ million); New Brunswick, $\$ 4.4$ million ( $\$ 7.3$ million); Prince Edward Island, $\$ 1.7$ million ( $\$ 243,000$ ); and Newfoundland, $\$ 1.2$ million ( $\$ 3.6$ million).
Cumulatively, building permits taken out in Canada in the first four months of 1975 totalled $\$ 1.60$ billion, down $12.0 \%$ from $\$ 1.82$ billion in January-April 1974.

## Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1971=100)
The residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 141.9 in May, an increase of $2.6 \%$ from the April level and up $4.3 \%$ from a year earlier.

Price of materials used in residential building construction increased $0.4 \%$ over the twelve months from May 1974; labour costs rose $11.5 \%$.

During this period, residential building construction input price indexes advanced in all regions of Canada, with increases recorded as follows: Quebec, $8.1 \%$; British Columbia, 7.6\%; Prairie Provinces, $5.8 \%$; Atlantic Provinces, 3.0\%; and Ontario, 1.4\%.

Labour cost indexes showed the following increases (by region): British Columbia, 28.1\%; Quebec, 20.3\%; Prairie Provinces, $10.9 \%$; Atlantic Provinces, $10.8 \%$; and Ontario, $4.1 \%$.

## Report on Job Vacancies

Preliminary estimates for the three months ended May 31 show an increase in the number of vacant jobs from the three-month period ended February 28, 1975. Vacancies for full-time, part-time and casual jobs rose to 64,800 from 60,500 .

However, this increase was substantially lower than those that occurred in the corresponding periods of each of the four preceding years. And on a year-toyear basis, vacancies were down by 39,400.

Vacancies for full-time jobs numbered 57,800 at May 31, up 4\% from February 28,1975 but down $38 \%$ from May 31, 1974.

For every 1,000 existing jobs in the latest three-month period, eight were vacant, the same as in the preceding period but down from 13 a year earlier.

## Railway Carloadings

Railways operating in Canada reported a total of 20.8 million tons of revenue carload freight loaded in May, a decrease of $8.6 \%$ from a year earlier. Non-carload shipments declined $24.8 \%$ to 164,40 tons.

Rail traffic received from United States connections at 2.0 million tons was down 26.6\% from May 1974.

In the latest month, the more notable percentage declines in loadings were recorded for: gravel and crushed stone ( $-30.3 \%$ ); pulpwood chips ( $-20.7 \%$ ); and iron ore $(-16.0 \%)$. Shipments of phosphate rock more than tripled and coal loadings increased $49.9 \%$.

Cumulatively, rail loadings for the first five months of 1975 totalled 91.5 million tons, down 3.5\% from January-May 1974.

## Gas Utilities

Canadian consumers purchased 142.4 billion cubic feet of natural gas in March, up $3.9 \%$ from a year earlier. Exports decreased $2.1 \%$ to 83.4 billion cubic feet.

Cumulatively, sales of natural gas for the first three months of 1975 totalled 439.3 billion cubic feet, an increase 1.6\% from January-March 1974.

## Preliminary Statement of Canadian Trade

 On a balance-of-payments basis, Canada's seasonally-adjusted merchandise trade balance returned to a deficit position in May as exports declined 2.5\% from April and imports remained virtually unchang. ed. The May deficit of $\$ 33$ million stood in contrast to a modest surplus in April but still compared favourably with an average monthly deficit of $\$ 180$ million in the first quarter.On a customs basis, exports to the United States continued to decline marginally. A drop in shipments to the European Economic Community of $9 \%$ was more than compensated for by an $18 \%$ rise in exports to Japan.

Exports were adversely affected by the longshoremen's strike in Montreal, as shipments of wheat dropped from April levels by $35 \%$ to $\$ 158$ million. Declines were also recorded for key exports to the U.S. - deliveries of passenger automobiles dropped $14 \%$ to $\$ 230$ million and deliveries of crude oil $4 \%$ to $\$ 200$ million. However, deliveries of wood pulp and newsprint rose $10 \%$ to $\$ 179$ million and $\$ 170$ million respectively.

Imports of textiles and apparel increased in May by more than a third to $\$ 105$ million and similar increases were recorded for raw sugar and cocoa. Imports of crude petroleum rose $11 \%$ to $\$ 310 \mathrm{mil}$ lion. On the other hand, shipments of passenger automobiles dropped $10 \%$ to $\$ 179$ million and purchases of motor vehicle parts and engines declined $14 \%$ to $\$ 313$ million.

In the first five months of 1975 , unadjusted exports of $\$ 13.1$ billion were $3.3 \%$ above those for the corresponding period in 1974. Exports to the U.S. rose $2.6 \%$ to $\$ 8.7$ billion. In the same period, imports rose $16.5 \%$ to $\$ 14.2$ billion, including a gain of $11.2 \%$ to $\$ 9.5$ billion for imports from the U.S.

## Telephone Industry Statistics

Canadian telephone systems reported net operating revenue of $\$ 62.8$ million in April, a drop of $4.7 \%$ from April 1974.

Gross operating revenues of the thirteen major telephone companies rose $19.3 \%$ to $\$ 222.2$ million in the latest month; operating expenses jumped $25.4 \%$ to $\$ 159.4$ million.

Construction expenditures of these firms at $\$ 139.6$ million in April showed an increase of $31.9 \%$ from a year earlier.

## The Wheat Review

Total exports of wheat from the four traditional major exporters during the August-April period of the current crop year amounted to $1,398.3$ million bushels, up $3 \%$ from $1,362.8$ million exported in the year-earlier period.

Total supplies of wheat remaining in these countries at May 1, 1975 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to $1,153.9$ million bushels, a drop of $3 \%$ from the $1,193.5$ million on hand at the same date in 1974.

Supplies were held as follows, in mil. lions of bushels and with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 460.1 (368.6); Canada, 459.4 (521.7); Australia, 219.4 (232.7); and Argentina, 15.0 (70.5).

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Farm Cash Receipts, 1974
Farmers received in 1974 an estimated $\$ 8.84$ billion in cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland, an increase of $29.4 \%$ from $\$ 6.83$ billion in 1973.

There were increases in most categories of cash receipts from crops and livestock. The most notable gains occurred in wheat, barley and rapeseed while receipts from hogs declined along with deficiency payments.

## Railway Transport: Part IV, 1974

Railways operating in Canada handled a total of 314.4 nillion tons of revenue freight in 1974, an increase of $2.7 \%$ over 1973.

Revenue freight ton-miles rose $6.0 \%$ to 138.7 billion.

The number of persons travelling by rail increased $21.8 \%$ to 24.1 million in the latest year and passenger-miles at 1.9 billion were up $17.5 \%$. The average passenger journey decreased to 78 miles from 81 miles in 1973.
