## Department Store Sales by Regions

Department store sales in April rose to $\$ 430.5$ million, up $12.4 \%$ from a year earlier. Increases were recorded in all regions of Canada.

Department store sales by region for the latest month, with percentage increases over April 1974 in brackets:

- Ontario, $\$ 162.2$ million ( $11.0 \%$ ); Quebec, $\$ 77.0$ million ( $6.0 \%$ ); British Columbia, $\$ 71.7$ million ( $17.0 \%$ ); Alberta, $\$ 53.3$ million ( $15.0 \%$ ); Manitoba, $\$ 27.2$ million ( $13.4 \%$ ); Atlantic Provinces, $\$ 26.8$ million ( $18.0 \%$ ) ; and Saskatchewan, $\$ 12.4$ million ( $24.7 \%$ ).

Motor Vehicle Production
Ganadian production of motor vehicles totalled 136,760 units in April, a drop of $3.6 \%$ from 141,832 a year earlier.

Passenger car production declined to 102,225 units from 109,630 while production of commercial vehicles increased to 34,535 units from 32,202 in April 1974.

For the first four months of 1975 , Canadian production of motor vehicles totalled 461,411 units, down $20.1 \%$ from 577,333 in January-April 1974.

## Refined Petroleum Products

Canadian refineries produced 53.1 million barrels of refined petroleum products in March, down $5.6 \%$ from a year earlier.

Net sales of refined petroleum produtis at 48.1 million barrels in the latest month showed a decrease of $6.6 \%$ from A:rch 1974.

## New Motor Vehicle Sales

Retail sales of new motor vehicles in April totalled 122,510 units, down $1.3 \%$ from a year earlier. Total sales value increased $12.3 \%$ to $\$ 653.4$ million.

Sales of passenger cars produced in Canada and the United States decreased $6.3 \%$ to 76,973 units while those of overseas-manufactured automobiles rose $22.9 \%$ to 14,619 units.

Commercial vehicle sales in April increased $2.6 \%$ from a year earlier to 30,918 units; included were 29,213 manufactured in Canada and the U.S. (up $2.1 \%$ ) and 1,705 manufactured overseas (up I1.4\%).

For the first four months of 1975, total sales reached 388,378 units with an accumulated value of $\$ 2.05$ billion. This represents a decrease of $5.1 \%$ in units but an increase of $7.2 \%$ in value compared with sales for January-April 1974.

## Crude Petroleum

## and Natural Gas Production

Crude petroleum production for February amounted to 1.64 million barrels per day, down $16.4 \%$ from a year earlier.

Natural gas production averaged 9.96 billion cubic feet per day in the latest month, a decrease of $2.2 \%$ from February 1974.

## Non-Residential Building Construction Input Price Index

(1961=100)
The non-residential building construction input price index for Canada rose to 242.9 in April, an increase of $0.5 \%$ from the March level and up $9.3 \%$ from a year earlier.

The materials component of the total index advanced $5.1 \%$ over the twelve months from April 1974; labour costs increased $12.7 \%$.

Prices of concrete products used in non-residential building construction jumped $21.9 \%$ during this period. Other increases included: electrical equipment $8.6 \%$; steel and metal work $4.3 \%$; plumbing, heating and other equipment $4.0 \%$; and other materials $10.6 \%$. Prices of lumber and lumber products dropped 13.0\%.

## Report on Job Vacancies

Preliminary estimates for the three months ended April 30 show a continued decline in the average number of vacant jobs.

Vacancies for full-time, part-time and casual jobs numbered 62,800 compared with 68,400 in the three months ended January 1975 and 99,000 in the three months ended April 30, 1974.

Full-time job vacancies declined to 56,800 from 61,900 in the preceding period and 89,600 a year earlier.

For every 1,000 existing jobs in the surveyed three-month period, seven were vacant, down from nine in the preceding period and from 13 a year earlier.

Income After Tax, 1972
The average income after tax of Canadian families rose from $\$ 8,783$ in 1971 to $\$ 9,550$ in 1972, an increase of about $9 \%$. For unattached individuals, the average income after tax increased by about $5 \%$ from $\$ 3,710$ to $\$ 3,910$.

The average total money income, before income tax deductions, of families was $\$ 11,300$ in 1972 while for unattached individuals, it was $\$ 4,572$.

An income-after-tax report containing 1973 estimates in addition to the 1972 data is being compiled. This report, Income After Tax, Distributions by Size in Canada, 1972 and 1973 (13.210, price to be determined) is scheduled for release early next year.

## Railway Carloadings

Railways operating in Canada reported a total of 19.3 million tons of revenue carload freight loaded in April, a decrease of $6.1 \%$ from a year earlier. Non-carload shipments were down $17.6 \%$ to 154,849 tons.

Rail traffic received from U.S. connections at just under 2.0 million tons showed a sharp $28.9 \%$ drop from last April - continuing the downtrend begun in late 1974.

In the latest month, the more notable percentage declines in loadings were recorded for: sand, gravel and crushed stone $(-39.0 \%)$; potash ( $-24.1 \%$ ); and iron ore $(-12.3 \%)$. Coal registered the only significant increase, rising $27.3 \%$ to 1.8 million tons.

## International Travel

Preliminary estimates show Canada earned $\$ 178$ million from international travel in the first three months of this year. But Canadians travelling abroad spent $\$ 680$ million in the same period, leaving the international travel account with a deficit of $\$ 502$ million.
United States residents spent $\$ 134$ million in Canada and $\$ 44$ million was spent by visitors from all other countries. Canadian resident spending abroad in the first quarter of 1975 was estimated at $\$ 459$ million in the U.S. and $\$ 221$ million in all other countries.

The travel account deficit of $\$ 502$ million in the latest period was up from \$362 million in January-March 1974.

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## Iron Ore Shipments

Canadian mines shipped 4.21 million tons of iron ore in April, an increase of 3.8\% fiom a year carlier.

Cumulatively, output for the first four months of 1975 totalled 10.94 million tons, up $19.0 \%$ from 9.20 million tons in January-April 1974.

## Residential Building Construction Input Price Index <br> (1971=100)

The residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 138.3 in April, an increase of $1.4 \%$ from the previous month's level and up $3.3 \%$ from a year earlier.

Prices of building materials used in residential building construction decreased $1.2 \%$ over the twelve months from April 1974; labour costs rose $11.9 \%$.

During this period, residential building construction input price indexes advanced in all regions of Canada, with increases recorded as follows:

- Quebec, $6.0 \%$; Prairie Provinces, $4.8 \%$; Atlantic Provinces, 3.7\%; British Columbia, $3.5 \%$; and Ontario, $1.4 \%$.

## Operations of Transcontinental and Regional Air Carriers

Canada's seven major scheduled airlines reported a combined loss of $\$ 1.9$ million in 1974 compared with a profit of $\$ 19.0$ million in 1973.

Total operating revenues rose $27.8 \%$ to $\$ 1.33$ billion in the latest year; operating expenses climbed $31.0 \%$ to $\$ 1.27$ billion.

Passenger traffic - measured in passenger-miles for all services - showed a $12.0 \%$ increase over 1973 to $16,741.5$ million. Goods ton-miles for all services were up 6.3\%.

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## Railway Operating Statistics

Revenues of the six rnajor railways in Canada rose $21.2 \%$ to $\$ 2.46$ billion in 1974, while expenses more than kept pace with a 23.1 \% increase to $\$ 2.38$ billion. Net income at $\$ 77.7$ million was down $17.1 \%$ from the 1973 level.

Canadian National earned $\$ 1.39$ billion in railway operating revenues in 1974; expended $\$ 1.37$ billion; and recorded net income of $\$ 13.8$ million on operations (a decrease of $38.9 \%$ from $\$ 22.6$ million in the preceding year).

Canadian Pacific reported railway revenues of $\$ 935.2$ million in the latest year; had expenses totalling $\$ 867.5$ million; and showed net income of $\$ 67.7$ million (up $9.9 \%$ from $\$ 61.6$ million in 1973).

Revenue freight 10 n -miles of the six major railways increased $6.6 \%$ to 133.7 billion in 1974. Total passenger-miles rose $21.6 \%$ to 1.81 billion.

## Railway Freight Traffic, 1974

Railways operating in Canada carried 271.7 million tons of revenue freight in 1974, an increase of $2.4 \%$ over 1973.

A breakdown of the 1974 movement by major commodity groups shows that only food, feed and beverages ( $-0.3 \%$ ) and crude materials ( $-0.5 \%$ ) were handled in lesser volume. Gains were recorded for the following categories: live animals ( $49.6 \%$ ); non-carload freight ( $46.4 \%$ ); special traffic ( $13.5 \%$ ); fabricated materials ( $7.7 \%$ ) and end products (6.1\%).

On a geographic basis, tonnage loaded increased in Manitoba (7.1\%), Ontario ( $7.0 \%$ ), Alberta ( $5.7 \%$ ), Quebec ( $4.4 \%$ ) and Saskatchewan ( $0.3 \%$ ). Tonnage declines occurred in New Brunswick $(-21.3 \%)$, Prince Edward Island ( $-8.1 \%$ ), Newfoundland (-5.5\%), Yukon and Northwest Territories ( $-1.4 \%$ ), British Columbia $(-0.9 \%)$ and Nova Scotia (-0.7\%).
