

## Retail Trade

Seasonally-adjusted June retail sales advanced $1.8 \%$ from May to a leve! of $\$ 4.09$ billion.

Total retail trade without seasonal adjustment reached $\$ 4.23$ billion, up $9.0 \%$ from a year earlier. All provinces had sales increases over June 1974 with the largest advance in Prince Edward Island ( $20.1 \%$ ). Sales were up $10.1 \%$ in Montreal, $8.4 \%$ in Vancouver, $7.9 \%$ in Toronto and $4.5 \%$ in Winnipeg.

Year-to-year gains were registered in 19 of the 28 trade groups with the largest increases recorded by motor vehicle dealer ( $17.6 \%$ ) and household furniture stores (16.4\%).

Revised data for May show retail sales for the month at $\$ 4.44$ billion, up $9.7 \%$ from May 1974.

Urban Family Food Expenditures, 1974
A survey of private households in 14 cities shows average weekly expenditure on food per family in 1974 was $\$ 40.00$ for all families and unattached individuals and $\$ 45.75$ for families of two or more persons. Average weekly dollar expenditure per person was $\$ 13.57$ for the former category and $\$ 13.15$ for the latter.

The importance of spending for food away from home against total food expenditure, for families of two or more, rose from $11.5 \%$ for those with annual income under $\$ 6,000$ to $31.8 \%$ for those with income of $\$ 20,000$ and over. For all families and unattached individuals, the corresponding proportions were $32.0 \%$ and $20.2 \%$, with the higher proportion in the lower income category due to a preponderance of unattached individuals.

## Consumer Price Indexes <br> for Regional Cities

Consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities in July with increases ranging from $1.1 \%$ in Thunder Bay and Winnipeg to $1.7 \%$ in Saint John, Saskatoon and Regina.

The food index advanced in all 14 centres, reflecting generally-higher prices for fresh produce, meats, eggs, dairy products and restaurant meals. Higher shelter costs for both owned and rented accommodation, as well as increased prices for gasoline, were important factors in the advances recorded. Other notable contributors were: increased rail fares; higher prices for toiletries; and increased rates for vacation lodging.

Between July 1974 and July 1975, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities with increases recorded as follows: Winnipeg, $12.6 \%$; Saint John, 12.0\%; Vancouver, $11.4 \%$; Calgary, 11.3\%; Toronto, 11.2\%; Thunder Bay, 11.2\%; Saskatoon, 11.1\%; Montreal, $10.9 \%$; Regina, $10.9 \%$, Edmonton, $10.9 \%$; St. John's, 10.6\%; Quebec City, $9.9 \%$; Ottawa, $9.6 \%$; and Halifax, $9.1 \%$.

## Refined Petroleum Products

Canadian refineries produced 50.4 million barrels of refined petroleum products in June, down $11.0 \%$ from a year earlier.

Net sales of refined petroleum products at 45.4 million barrels in the latest month showed an increase of $4.0 \%$ from June 1974.

## Department Store Sales and Stocks

Department store sales rose to $\$ 436.6$ million in June, an increase of $5.4 \%$ from \$414.3 million in June 1974.

Sales increased in 22 of the 40 departments in the latest month with the largest gains recor ded by food and kindred products ( $29.7 \%$ ) and gasoline, oil, auto accessories, repairs and supplies ( $21.0 \%$ ).

All provinces except Newfoundland ( $-0.4 \%$ ) reported increased sales over June 1974 with a high of $29.3 \%$ for Prince Edward Island. Sales rose $3.4 \%$ in Toronto, $3.3 \%$ in Vancouver, $3.0 \%$ in Montreal and $2.1 \%$ in Winnipeg.

Inventories held in June (at selling price) were valued at $\$ 1.31$ billion, up 4.9\% from a year earlier.

## Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached $\$ 17.26$ billion at the end of June, an increase of $14.0 \%$ from a year earlier.

Outstanding balances held by these credit grantors in the latest month, with percentage changes from June 1974:

- Chartered banks' personal loans, $\$ 12.00$ billion (up 19.6\%);
- Sales finance and consumer companies - small loans, $\$ 263$ million (-17.0); - large loans, $\$ 1.51$ billion (up 0.9\%); - relail instalment sales paper, \$1.13 billion (-6.1\%);
- Life insurance companies' policy loans, $\$ 1.11$ billion (up 15.0\%);
- Department stores and furniture, television, radio and household appliances stores, $\$ 1.20$ billion (up $9.9 \%$ );
- Quebec savings banks' personal loans, $\$ 52$ million (up 26.8\%).

## Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in June were estimated at $\$ 6.99$ billion, down $0.5 \%$ from $\$ 7.03$ billiur (revised) in May. New orders for durable goods dropped $1.8 \%$ to $\$ 3.06$ billion while those for non-durable goods increased $0.6 \%$ to $\$ 3.93$ billion.

Total unfilled orders were estimated at $\$ 9.93$ billion, down $1.0 \%$ from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was $0.6 \%$ higher at $\$ 15.23$ billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments dipped to $2.15: 1$ in June from 2.16:1 in May, while the finished products - to shipments ratio moved down to 0.73 : 1 from 0.74:1.

Manufacturers' shipments in the latest month, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 7.10$ billion, an increase of $1.3 \%$ from May.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in June at an estimated $\$ 7.40$ billion showed a rise of $1.1 \%$ from the previous month. Shipments in the first six months of 1975 totalled $\$ 41.59$ billion, up $6.6 \%$ from January-June 1974.

## Gas Utilities

Canadian consumers purchased 97.8 billion cubic feet of natural gas in May, down $0.2 \%$ from a year earlier. Exports rose $0.1 \%$ to 79.8 billion cubic feet.

Cumulatively, sales of natural gas for the first five months of 1975 totalled 669.5 billion cubic feet, an increase of 2.7\% from January-May 1974.

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in June were estimated at $\$ 3.97$ billion, up $0.9 \%$ from June 1974.

One of the most notable changes in the consumer goods trades was registered by the groceries and food specialties component, showing an increase of $12.5 \%$. In the industrial goods trades, sales of industrial and transportation equipment and supplies rose $23.3 \%$ from a year earlier.

Wholesale inventories were valued : $\$ 6.61$ billion in the fatest month, an increase of $17.0 \%$ over June of last year.

## Unemployment Insurance Payments

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act reached $\$ 239$ million in June, an increase of $62 \%$ from $\$ 148$ million a year earlier. The average weekly payment was up $13 \%$ to $\$ 83.00$ from $\$ 73.57$.

Initial and renewal claims received in June numbered 194,000 , up $24 \%$ from the June 1974 total of 157,000 .

For the first six months of 1975, net payments under the act amounted to $\$ 1.76$ billion, an increase of $41 \%$ from the $\$ 1.25$ billion disbursed in January.June 1974.

## Index of Farm Production <br> (1961=100)

The 1974 index of the physical volume of agricultural production for Canada is estimated at 149.8 , down $2.8 \%$ from 154.1 (revised) in 1973.
(The agricultural products included in the index are, in so far as statistics are available, all commodities produced on farms for sale, consumption in farm homes or additions to farm inventories).
Gross farm production increased in five provinces in the latest year and decreased in four provinces. Ontario recorded the greatest increase in farm output ( $9.1 \%$ ), followed by Prince Edward Island ( $8.9 \%$ ), New Brunswick ( $6.5 \%$ ), Nova Scotia ( $5.4 \%$ ) and Quebec ( $4.9 \%$ ). Production dectined in Alberta $(-3.8 \%)$, British Columbia $(-6.6 \%)$, Saskatchewan ( $-12.4 \%$ ) and Manitoba ( $-17.9 \%$ ).

## Major Appliance Sales

Sales of freezers and automatic washing machines increased, but Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales in June of other major appliances ran well under yearearlier levels.

Major appliance sales recorded by these manufacturers in the latest month, with percentage changes from June 1974 in brackets:

- Refrigerators, 47,691 (-15.3\%); home and farm freezers, 38,418 (up 42.8\%);
- Electric stoves and ranges, 36,381 (- $24.8 \%$ );
- Automatic washing machines, 28,225 (up 11.8\%); electric and gas clothes dryers, $20,211(-6.9 \%)$;
- Television sets, 42,633 (-27.3\%).

Manufacturers' sales in June of 36,257
Canadian-made colour television sets represented a drop of $20.0 \%$ from a year earlier; black-and-white set sales fell $52.1 \%$ to 6,376 units.

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.58 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in June, a decrease of 2.6\% from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils declined $6.8 \%$ to 2.17 million $B / D$ in the latest month while those of imported oils increased $29.0 \%$ to $405,000 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$.

## International Travel

Preliminary statistics for June show that 4.2 million United States visitors entered Canada, up 2.0\% from June 1974. Canadian resident travellers returning from visits to the U.S. increased $4.6 \%$ to 3.1 million.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the U.S. increased $17.2 \%$ from a year earlier to 185,000 . Canadian travellers returning from abroad numbered 100,000 , up $5.2 \%$ from June 1974.

Sales Financing, 1974
Retail sales financing undertaken by sales finance and consumer loan companies expanded $4.7 \%$ in volume during 1974 to $\$ 2.58$ billion. The aggregate purchases comprised $\$ 1.13$ billion (up $4.4 \%$ over 1973) for consumer goods paper, including passenger cars, and $\$ 1.45$ billion (up $5.0 \%$ ) for commercial goods paper.

Wholesale financing by these companies totalled $\$ 6.27$ billion in 1974 , an increase of $21.2 \%$ from 1973.

## Hospital Statistics, 1974

Total operating expenses per patient-day of public general hospitals rose $16.6 \%$ to $\$ 96.39$ in 1974 from $\$ 82.66$ in 1973.

In 1974 a general tendency for higher utilization of public hospitals over 1973 is recorded versus lower utilization rates in proprietary and lederal hospitals.
