## Department Store Sales by Regions

Department store sales in November rose to $\$ 593.3$ million, up $9.0 \%$ from a year cartier. Increases were recorded in all regions of Canada.

Department store sales by regions for the latest month, with percentage increases over November 1974 in brackets:

- Ontario. \$223.0 million (7.5\%): Quebec, \$1 12.2 million ( $14.0 \%$ ): British Columbia. $\$ 90.6$ million (3.3\%); Alberta, $\$ 74.4$ miltion ( $10.7 \%$ ): Allantic Provinces, $\$ 39.8$ million ( $11.6 \%$ ): Manitoba. $\$ 35.6$ million ( $6.5 \%$ ); and Saskatchewan, $\$ 17.8$ million ( $20.4 \%$ ).

## Fossil Fuel Production, 1974-75

The value of all Canadian production of fossil wive loil, natural gas, nalural gas by-products hei coal) climbed $31.8 \%$ to $\$ 6.85$ billion in 1975 fant $\$ 5.20$ billion in 1974
Sver-all production of crude oil decreased $1.15 \%$ in 1975 to 525.3 million barrels, but the value of production rose $7.4 \%$ to $\$ 3.78$ billion. Domestic production of natural gas increased $1.0 \%$ to 3.07 trillion cubic feet while the total value of production jumped to $\$ 1.73$ billion from $\$ 723.8$ million. Production of natural gas by-products decreased $2.5 \%$ to 110.5 million barrels but the value of these products rose $17.5 \%$ to $\$ 767.8$ million.
Coal production rose $14.7 \%$ in 1975 to 27.0 miltion tons, with the total value increasing $90.1 \%$ to $\$ 575.8$ million.

## Reconciliallon of Canada-United States Merchandise Trade Balance

The US Canada Trade Statistics Committee has reconciled the published figures for CanadaU.S. bilateral merchandise trade for the first half of 1975 and has established that Canada was in deficit by $\$ 932$ miltion.

Canadian trade statistics had indicated a firsthalf deficit of $\$ 1.15$ billion while the US Bureau of the Census had reported that Canada had a sutples of $\$ 23$ milfion. These figures follow the pailer: found by the committee in previous conciliation studies in that both sets of official athe ligures overstate their imports and undersate their exports by comparison with the reconciled ligures

## Inventories, Shipments and Orders <br> in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in November were estimated at $\$ 7.38$ billion, up $0.6 \%$ from $\$ 7.33$ bilion in October. New orders for non-durable goods rose $1.4 \%$ to to $\$ 3.99$ billion while those for durable goods dropped 0.3\% to $\$ 3.38$ billion.

The backlog of unfilled orders in all manulacturing industries in November, seasonally adjusted. was estimated at $\$ 9.92$ billion, down $0.4 \%$ from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was $0.9 \%$ higher al $\$ 15.24$ billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned - to shipments dipped $102.06: 1$ in November from 2.09:1 in October while the finished products - to shipments ratio edged down to 0.68:1 from 0.69:1.

Manufacturers' shipments in November, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 7.41$ billion, an increase of 2.6\% from October.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in November at an estimated $\$ 7.49$ billion showed a rise of $3.6 \%$ from a year earlier. Cumulative shipments for the first 11 months of 1975 totalled $\$ 77.92$ billion, up $5.7 \%$ from January-November 1974

## Radio Air-Time Sales

Sales of advertising to national advertisers on AM and FM radio stations totalled $\$ 5.7$ million in September, up 18.4\% from a year earlier. Agency and other commissions reduced gross national sales to $\$ 4.9$ million.

Nel local air-lime sales were reported at $\$ 11.6$ million in the latest month, an increase of $1.9 \%$ from September 1974

## Gas Utilitles

Canadian consumers purchased 98.6 bilion cubic feet of natural gas in October, down 3.6\% from a year earlier. Exports decreased 2.5\% to 80.5 billion cubic feet.

Cumulatively. sales of natural gas in the firs 10 months of 1975 totalled 1.07 trillion cubic feet, an increase of 0.8\% from January-October 1974

Operations of Transcontinental and Regionat Air Carriers
Canada's seven major scheduled airlines reporled a combined net loss of $\$ 2.29$ million in October that compared with the loss of $\$ 3.74$ million posted a year earlier.

Tolal operating revenues rose $15.0 \%$ to $\$ 126.8$ million in the latest month; operating expenses advanced $11.0 \%$ io $\$ 124.6$ million.

Passenger traffic-measured in passengermiles for all services-showed a 3.1\% increase from October 1974 to 1.315 .6 million. Goods tonmiles for all services rose $16.5 \%$ to 48.4 million.

For the first 10 months of 1975, Canadian transcontinental and regional air carriers reported a net loss of $\$ 94,000$; the airlines earned net profit of $\$ 11.11$ million in the January to October period of 1974

Births, 1974
Births to Canadian residents lotalled 345.604 in 1974, up fractionally from the 1973 figure of 344,368.

Canada's birth rate per 1,000 population declined marginally to 15.4 in 1974 from 15.6 in 1973. While Quebec continued to record the lowest birth rate of any of the provinces, its rate rose to 14.0 from 13.8, marking the firsi yearly increase since 1957

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in October were estimated at $\$ 4.00$ billion, up $3.7 \%$ from October 1974.

One of the most notable sales changes in the consumer goods trades was registered by the motor vehicles component, showing an increase of $20.2 \%$. In the industrial goods trades, sales of iron and steel rose $35.8 \%$ from a year earlier.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 597$ billion in the latest month, up $1.3 \%$ from October of last year.

## Telephone Industry Statistics

Canadian telephone systems reported nel operating revenue of $\$ 90.6$ million in November. an increase of $29.9 \%$ from November 1974.

Gross operating revenues of the 13 major telephone companies rose $21.5 \%$ to $\$ 253.3$ million in the latest month; operating expenses advanced $17.3 \%$ to $\$ 162.7$ million.

Construction expenditures of these firms at $\$ 103.8$ million in November showed a drop of 26.4\% from a year earlier.

## Provincial Government Finance, 1973

Canada's provincial and territorial governments had financial assets tolalling $\$ 20.85$ billion at March 31, 1974, an increase of $15.8 \%$ from $\$ 1801$ billion a year earlier.

Liabilities of these governments rose 1230 in the latest year to $\$ 21.94$ billion from $\$ 1954$ billion.

## Non-Residential Buliding Construction Input Price Index <br> ( $1961=100$ )

The non-residential building construction input price index for Canada rose to 265.9 in December, an increase of $0.7 \%$ from the November level and up $14.1 \%$ from a year earlier.

The materials component of the total index advanced $9.8 \%$ over the 12 months from December 1974; labour costs increased 17.4\%.

Prices of concrete products used in monresidential building construction jumped $18.2 \%$ during this period: smaller increases were noted for: lumber and lumber products ( $11.4 \%$ ) steel and metal work ( $76 \%$ ): plumbing, heating and other equipment ( $6.7 \%$ ); and other materials (14.3\%). Electrical equipment prices declined 16\%

## Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.72 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in November, an increase of $0.1 \%$ from a year parlier.

Receipts of domestic oils decreased 3.4\% to $\$ 19$ million B/D in the latest month while those of imported oils increased $17.3 \%$ to $528,000 \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{D}$.

## Railway Carloadings

All railway revenue freight loaded in December totalled 18.8 million tons. down $7.8 \%$ from a year earlier. Commodity traffic from United States connections (included above) amounted to 1.8 million tons, a decrease of $16.0 \%$ from December 1974.

On a commodity basis, significant declines were noted for loadings of pulpwood and newsprint paper-no doubt reflecting continuing strikes in the forest products industry. Also down from year-earlier levels were shipments of sand, gravel and crushed stone ( $-31.2 \%$ ) and polash (-18.7\%).

Cumulatively, rail carload and non-carload trallic in 1975 aggregated 250.5 million tons. down $8.6 \%$ from the 1974 total. Freight received from U.S. connections decreased $22.8 \%$ to 22.7 million tons.

Pulpwood loadings showed the largest percentage decline in 1975. dropping $35.7 \%$; pulpwood chips fell $29.1 \%$ : and sand, gravel and crushed stone was oft $24.2 \%$ Other notable declines occurred in badings of sulphur, newsprint paper, potash, wood pulp, iron and steel and grain products. Coal loadings increased $28.3 \%$ to 20.5 million tons.

## Coal and Coke Statistics

Production of coal in Canada increased $5.3 \%$ in November to 2.40 million tons from 2.28 million tons in November 1974. Imports rose to 1.80 million tons from 1.65 million tons.

Industrial consumers used 1.63 million tons of coal in the latest month (down $2.6 \%$ from a year earlier) and 407.193 tons of coke (down $28.8 \%$ ).

## Farm Cash Recelpts (Revised)

Farmers' cash receipts trom farming operations in all provinces except Newtoundiand totalled an estimated $\$ 8.93$ billion in the January to November period of $19: 5$, up $100 \%$ from $\$ 8.11$ billion in the first 11 monihs of 1974.

Total payments made to farmers in the latest period. by province and with year-earlier figures in brackets:

The total for the latest month comprised $\$ 60.0$ million for passeriger cars $\$ 27.7$ million for other consumer goods $\$ 78.6$ million for commercial vehicles and $\$ 48.6$ million for other commercial and industrial goods
