Industrial Corporations, Financial Statistics
Canadian industrial corporations recorded aftertax profits (before extraordinary items) of \$2.40
billion in the fourth quarter of 1975, an increase of
\$70 million (3.0%) from the corresponding period

in 1974.

Net income of manufacturing industries declined 2.8% in the latest quarter but mining corporations showed a 1.1% profit rise and net income of other industries increased 14.3%.

Industrial corporations' sales in the fourth quarter of 1975 reached an estimated \$55.64 billion, up 10.5% from October-December 1974

Consumer Price Indexes for Regional Cities Consumer price indexes rose in all 14 regional ties in January with movements ranging from the in both Quebec City and Montreal to 1.3% in Thurder Bay.

Although the food index declined slightly at the national level, food prices increased in nine cities and decreased in only five. Prices were generally lower for beef and poultry products while being higher for pork and restaurant meals.

Shelter charges were higher for both owned and rented accommodation while numerous increases for domestic gas, electricity and telephone rates contributed to an advance in the household operation component.

The re-imposition of the Ontario sales tax to 7% from 5% (to 7% from 0% for new automobiles) had a considerable impact on price index levels in cities within this province. Seasonally-higher train fares were also reported.

Between January 1975 and January 1976, consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities with increases recorded as follows: Winnipeg, 11.5%; Thunder Bay, 11.0%; Halifax, 10.9%; Calgary, 10.6%; Regina, 10.3%; St. John's, 10.3%; Saskatoon, 10.3%; Ottawa, 9.9%; Saint John, 9.9%; Edmonton, 9.8%; Toronto, 9.4%; Montreal, 9.1%; Vancouver, 9.0%; Quebec City, 8.4%




Marriages, 1974


Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in December were estimated at \$3.82 billion, up 17.7% from December 1974.

One of the most notable sales changes in the consumer goods trades was registered by the groceries and food specialties component, showing an increase of 22.7%. In the industrial goods trades, sales of other construction materials and supplies, including lumber rose 40.1% from a year earlier.

Wholesale inventories were valued at \$6.11 billion in the latest month, up 2.9% from December 1974.

Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

Manufacturers' seasonally-adjusted new orders in December were estimated at \$7.54 billion, up 2.9% from \$7.32 billion (revised) in November. New orders for durable goods rose 2.2% to \$3.44 billion while those for non-durable goods were up 3.5% to \$4.10 billion.

The backlog of untilled orders in all manufacturing industries in December, seasonally adjusted, was estimated at \$9.92 billion, down fractionally from the previous month.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, was 1.8% higher at \$15.51 billion.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned — to shipments dipped to 2.06:1 in December from the revised November ratio of 2.07:1, while the finished products — to shipments ratio remained at 0.69:1 in both months.

Manufacturers' shipments in December, seasonally adjusted, were estimated at \$7.54 billion, an increase of 2.5% from November.

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in December at an estimated \$7.24 billion showed a rise of 9.9% from a year earlier. Cumulative shipments for the year 1975 totalled \$85.10 billion, up 6.0% from the 1974 total of \$80.29 billion.

Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding on the books of selected credit holders reporting monthly reached \$18.70 billion at the end of December, an increase of 15.4% from a year earlier.

Outstanding balances held by these credit grantors in the latest month, with percentage changes from December 31, 1974:

- Chartered banks' personal loans, \$13.15 billion (21.6%);
- Sales finance and consumer companies'
 - small loans, \$252 million (-14.9%);
 - large loans, \$1.50 billion (0.1%);
- retail instalment sales paper, \$1.15 billion (-1.6%);
- Life insurance companies' policy loans, \$1.16 billion (8.5%);
- Department stores and furniture, television, radio and household appliance stores, \$1.42 billion (8.4%);
- Quebec savings banks' personal loans, \$58 million (31.8%).

Motor Vehicle Production

Canadian production of motor vehicles totalled 114,547 units in December, up 20.9% from 94,740 a year earlier.

Passenger car production increased to 82,042 units from 70,050 and production of commercial vehicles rose to 32,505 units from 24,690 in December 1974.

Canadian production of motor vehicles totalled 1,424,006 units in 1975, down 6.6% from the 1974 total of 1,524,874 units.

Unemployment Insurance Payments

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment Insurance Act reached \$209 million in November, an increase of 50% from the \$139 million disbursed a year earlier. The average weekly benefit at \$88.01 was up 14% from November 1974.

A total of 615,000 persons was receiving unemployment insurance benefits in the latest month.

For the first 11 months of 1975, net payments under the act amounted to \$2.87 billion, an increase of 47% from \$1.95 billion paid out in the January-November 1974 period.

The Wheat Review

Canadian production of wheat in 1975 is now estimated at 627.5 million bushels, up 28% from the 1974 total of 488.5 million bushels.

Total exports of wheat from the four traditional major exporters during August-November 1975 have amounted to 847.3 million bushels, an increase of 28% from the August-November 1974 level of 639.4 million bushels.

Total supplies of wheat remaining in these countries at December 1, 1975 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years plus the year-end (November 30) carryover stocks in Australia and Argentina amounted to 1,850.0 million bushels, up 20% from the same date in 1974.

Supplies were held as follows, in millions of bushels and with the previous year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,151.3 (891.2); Canada, 559.9 (545.5); Australia, 84.6 (69.3); and Argentina, 54.2 (37.7).

Oil Pipe Line Transport

Canadian oil pipe lines received 2.80 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum products in December, a decrease of 2.9% from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic oils dropped 4.9% to 2.30 million B/D in the latest month while those of imported oils rose 7.6% to 494,000 B/D.


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


Motion Picture Theatres, 1974

Receipts from paid admissions (excluding amusement taxes) of 1,423 regular and drive-in motion picture theatres in 1974 amounted to \$172.7 million. Paid admissions numbered 90.4 million persons.

These theatres had revenues from all other sources — sale of refreshments, rental revenue from concessions and vending machines, revenue from showing advertisements — totalling \$39.8 million in 1974. Amusement taxes collected amounted to \$12.8 million.
