Unemployment Insurance Statistics

Net benefit polito claimants under the Unemploymen Insurence. Act reached ... \$397 million in the second from the \$298 million disburse a very earlier. The average weekly benefit at \$92.88 was up 10% from March 1975.

Persons receiving unemployment insurance benefits in March numbered 862,000, down 3% from February. Some 36% of the beneficiaries were under 25 years of age—almost equal numbers of males and females.

Claims filed by persons seeking unemployment insurance benefit in March totalled 201,000, up 5% from a year earlier.

For the first three months of 1976, net payments under the act amounted to \$1.08 billion, an increase of 21% from \$891.6 million paid out in January-March 1975.

Residential Building Construction input Price Index

(1971 = 100)

The residential building construction input price index for Canada advanced to 156.9 in April, an increase of 1.2% from March and up 13.4% from a year earlier.

Prices of materials used in residential building construction increased 12.8% over the 12 months from April 1975; labour costs rose 14.3%.


During this period, residential building construction input price indexes advanced in all regions of Canada with increases recorded as follows:

Prairie Provinces, 16.7%; Quebec, 14.1%;
 British Columbia, 13.6%; Ontario, 12.0%;
 and Atlantic Provinces, 11.8%.

Labour cost indexes showed the following increases (by region): Prairie Provinces, 23.7%; Atlantic Provinces, 13.9%; British Columbia, 13.5%; Ontario, 12.4%; and Quebec, 12.1%.

Railway Operating Statistics

Canada's six major railways reported a net deficit of \$49.6 million in 1975 that contrasted with net income of \$82.2 million posted in 1974. Operating revenues rose 5.7% last year to \$2.62 billion while operating expenses climbed 11.4% to \$2.67 billion.

Cumulative freight ton-miles were 1.9% below the 1974 level and passenger-miles were down 13.1%.

In December 1975, the six lines showed a deficit of \$103.3 million as opposed to net income of \$39.3 million recorded in the corresponding month in 1974. Operating expenses at \$212.7 million were down 13.3% from December 1974, while operating revenues declined 61.6% to \$109.4 million. (The sharp decline in December 1975 revenues was mainly attributable to adjustments by Canadian National as a result of changing from a cash basis to an accrual basis in accounting for government payments).

Operations of Transcontinental and Regional Air Carriers

Canada's seven major scheduled airlines reported a combined net loss of \$5.68 million in January that compared with a loss of \$5.42 million posted in January 1975.

Total operating revenues rose 15.8% to \$128.1 million in the latest month; operating expenses advanced 14.5% to \$131.2 million.

Passenger traffic — measured in passenger-miles for all services — totalled 1,511.6 million in January of this year, up 11.3% over the 1,357.5 million recorded in the comparable month in 1975. Goods tonmiles for all services rose 17.0% to 42.7 million from 36.5 million.

Iron Ore

Canadian mines shipped 5,254,722 short tons of iron ore in April compared with 4,419,557 short tons a year earlier.


Output for the first four months of 1976 at 10,288,410 short tons was down 7.8% from January-April 1975.

Public warehousing firms in Canada reported total operating revenues of \$110.9 million for 1974. Net profits, after income taxes, amounted to \$7.9 million.


Report on Job Vacancies

Preliminary estimates for the three months ended April 30 show a decrease in the average number of vacant jobs from the comparable period a year earlier. Vacancies for full-time, part-time and casual jobs decreased to 48,100 from 63,200.

Vacancies for full-time jobs decreased 23% to 44,200. The number of longer-term vacancies — jobs unfilled for more than four weeks — fell 41% to 14,300.

For every 1,000 existing jobs in the latest three-month period, six were vacant, a decrease of two vacancies per thousand jobs from last year. The highest job vacancy rates were in Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, each with nine per thousand; the lowest rate, three per thousand, was in Newfoundland.

Industry Selling Price Index

(1971=100)

The industry selling price index for total manufacturing rose to 158.5 in March, an increase of 0.3% from February and up 5.7% from a year earlier.

The wood industries group index rose 1.3% in the latest month as higher output prices were recorded for sawmills and planing mills, plus other wood fabricators. The paper and allied products group advanced 0.9%, reflecting price increases for newsprint and other paper products such as facial tissues and toilet paper. The non-metallic minerals group index moved up 1.8% due to higher prices for cement, ready-mix concrete, lime and glass.

Over the 12 months from March 1975, the largest price increases were shown by the

following group indexes:

Wood industries, 16.9%; petroleum and coal products industries, 13.0%; non-metallic mineral products industries, 11.4%; leather industries, 10.2%; textile industries, 8.1%; metal fabricating industries, 7.0%; furniture and fixture industries, 6.3%; and machinery industries, 6.0%.

Security Transactions with Non-Residents

A net capital inflow of \$43 million was recorded in February compared with a \$93 million net inflow in the previous month Gross purchases from non-residents rose during the month while sales remained at about the January level, contributing to the reduced capital inflow.

Trading in all classes of Canadian securities gave rise to a net inflow of \$50 million, a substantial decrease from the \$110 million net inflow in January. The reduction was mainly attributable to lower net sales of bonds and debentures, with sales of provincially-guaranteed and corporate issues showing a particularly large decline from the high January levels.

Transactions in foreign securities in February resulted in net purchases by Canadian residents of \$6 million compared with net purchases of \$17 million in the previous month.

Sales Financing

Sales finance companies purchased \$220.1 million of retail finance paper in March, an increase of 18.1% from a year earlier.

The total for the latest month comprised \$61.2 million for passenger cars, \$27.3 million for other consumer goods, \$94.0 million for commercial vehicles and \$37.8 million for other commercial and industrial goods.

General Wholesale Index

(1935-39=100)

The general wholesale price index advanced to 505.0 in March, an increase of 0.2% from February and up 5.7% from a year earlier. Five of the eight major groups included in the total index were higher while three declined.

The wood products group index rose 1.4% in March, reflecting price increases for newsprint and wrapping paper (4.5%), hemlock (2.1%), fir (1.3%) and spruce (1.0%). The non-metallic minerals group moved up 0.7% due to increases for tumblers (9.3%) and clay and allied products (7.3%). The iron products group index advanced 0.6% as scrap iron and steel prices jumped 14.3%. Non-ferrous metals were also up 0.6% due mainly to increases for silver (2.5%), gold (1.9%) and copper (1.7%).

The animal products group index declined 0.8%, reflecting decreases for cured meats (-4.5%), fresh meats (-4.0%) and livestock (-2.1%). Vegetable products were down 0.4% with decreases for tobacco (-5.3%), potatoes (-4.9%), vegetable oil products (-2.3%) and grains (-1.8%).

Over the 12 months from March 1975, the following percentage changes were recorded for the major group indexes:

Animal products, 13.8%; non-metallic minerals, 10.9%; iron products, 9.9%; wood products, 9.6%; textile products, 7.3%; chemical products, 0.0%; non-terrous metals including gold, -0.1%; and vegetable products, -5.1%

Merchandising Inventories

Merchandising inventories held in March by selected groups were as follows:

- Wholesale merchants, \$6,776.9 million (up 4.8% from February and up 6.8% from March 1975);
- Department stores, \$1,557.5 million (up 1.2% from February and up 18.1% from March 1975);
- Retail chain stores, \$2,193.6 million (up 5.2% from February and up 13.1% from March 1975).

Urban Transit

Urban transit systems carried 100.3 million fare passengers in April and had operating revenues amounting to \$32.7 million. Revenue vehicle-miles run totalled 28.1 million.

Total production of milk for all purposes in March amounted to 1,374,517,000 pounds, an increase of 17.1% from a year earlier.

Asbestos

Canadian producers' shipments of asbestos increased to 134,598 short tons in April from 75,358 short tons a year earlier.

Cumulative shipments for the first four months of 1976 at 546,318 short tons were up 38.7% from January-April 1975.

Crude Petroleum and Natural Gas Production

Crude petroleum production for October amounted to 1.61 million barrels per day, down 8.5% from a year earlier.

Natural gas production averaged 9.34 billion cubic feet per day in the latest month, an increase of 1.7% from October 1974.

Department Store Sales in Ottawa-Hull

Department stores in Ottawa-Hull metropolitan area reported sales totalling \$5.03 million for the week ending May 22, a decrease of 12.3% from the corresponding week in 1975. Sales were down 19.1% in Hull and suburbs, 11.3% in Ottawa and suburbs and 6.8% in Ottawa (city).

Ottawa-Hull area department store sales for the year to date totalled \$90.26 million, up 10.4% from January 1 — May 22, 1975. Sales rose 15.4% in Hull and suburbs, 12.1% in Ottawa (city) and 9.7% in Ottawa and suburbs.

Gas Utilitles

Canadian consumers purchased 146.1 billion cubic feet of natural gas in March, up 2.8% from a year earlier. Exports increased 0.6% to 83.9 billion cubic feet.

Cumulatively, sales of natural gas in the first three months of 1976 totalled 460.9 billion cubic feet, an increase of 4.9% from January-March 1975.
