## Statement of Canadian Trade

Canadian exports for May, seasonally adjusted, were $\$ 3.12$ billion on a balance-of-payments basis, up $1.0 \%$ from April. imports declined $8.5 \%$ to $\$ 2.88$ billion and the consequent merchandise trade balance was $\$ 242$ million compared to an April deficit of $\$ 64$ million.

For the three-month period from March to May, there was a trade surplus of $\$ 151$ million compared to the deficit of $\$ 157$ million for the three months from December to February.

Adjusted exports to the United States in May reached the record level of $\$ 2.15$ billion. There was a decline in shipments to overseas destinations, particularly Japan and the United Kingdom.
Disruption of freight services in British Coumbia brought drops in shipment of umber, pulp and-nowsprinipapepexphts af metallic ores also dipped Wheat shipments advanced sharply. Motor vehi le exports to the U.S. declined $\$ 1.5$ million tut those of automotive parts addexgines ro e $\$ 30$ million. Crudte oil and natural gos deliveries to the US. each mere up about $\$ 15$ million.

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Expoits forthativeifmbithporiodended in May were \$0.06 טmifrt, about the same as the preceding three-month period. Imports for the period were $\$ 9.17$ billion, marginally down from the previous three months.
Imports from the U.S. were about unchanged but those from Japan increased and Those from the European Economic Community declined. Automotive products imported from the U.S. were up some $\$ 165$ million but those of coal and organic chemicals were down. Overseas imports of crude oil and automotive goods were down. in total, about $\$ 295$ million.

## Production of Eggs and Poultry

Canadian egg production decreased 1.4\% to 37.5 million dozen in May 1976 from 38.1 million dozen a year earlier. The average number of layers was down $4.1 \%$ to 22.9 million from 23.8 million and the number of eggs per 100 layers was up 2.8\% 10 1,970 from 1,917.

Farm price of eggs sold for market was up $21 \%$ to 63.0 cents a dozen from 51.9 cents.

## Farm Implement and Equipment Sales

Sales of tarm implements and equipment. including repair parts, for 1975 totalled $\$ 1.1$ billion, up $31.3 \%$ from $\$ 845.9$ million in 1974. New machines accounted for $\$ 966.8$ million, up $35.5 \%$ from $\$ 713.7$ million in 1974. Repair parts were valued at $\$ 144.0$ million compared to $\$ 132.2$ million in 1974.

## Building Permits

The value of building permits taken tu: in Canada in April was $\$ 1,084.3$ million. 10 from \$932.5 million in April 1975

Permit activity in April decreased fro March in all but the government sector which was spurred by a $\$ 50$ millica post oflice project in St. Laurent, Que.

Provincial totals for building permits taken out in April, with year-earlier figures in brackets:

Ontario $\$ 368.5$ million ( $\$ 375.4$ million); Quebec $\$ 269.8$ million ( $\$ 148.4$ million); Alberta $\$ 163.6$ million ( $\$ 97.2$ million); British Columbia $\$ 108.0$ million ( $\$ 168.1$ million); Manitaba $\$ 56.5$ million ( $\$ 30.7$ million); Saskatchewan $\$ 46.4$ million ( $\$ 32.5$ million): New Brunswick $\$ 36.5$ million ( $\$ 14.1$ million): Nova Scotia $\$ 20.9$ million ( $\$ 43.7$ million); Newfoundland $\$ 9.0$ million ( $\$ 13.7$ million): Prince Edward Island $\$ 4.4$ milion ( $\$ 4.6$ million).

For the first four months of the year, the value of permits issued was $\$ 3.43$ billion. up $30.7 \%$ from the first four months of 1975.

## International Travel

Preliminary statistics for May show 2.7 million U.S. visitors entered Canada, dow $8.7 \%$ from May 1975 Canadian residenis relurning from the U.S. totalled 3.1 whillion, an increase of $13.4 \%$ over May 19:5
Visitors entering Canada from counties other than the U.S. increased by $12.4 \%$ to 132,500. Canadian travellers coming back from countries other than the U.S. totalled 119,000, an increase of $11.7 \%$ over May 1975.

## Railway Employees

Employment in the Canadian railway industry in 1975, excluding persons engaged in rail express, highway transport, telecommunications and other non-rail activities, averaged 114,541 employees, down 3,815 or $3.2 \%$ from 1974

Compensation totalled $\$ 1.55$ biltion, an increase from $\$ 1.44$ billion paid in 1974.
Employee salaries averaged $\$ 13,569$, an increase of $\$ 1,380$ or $11.3 \%$ from 1974 Hourly wage rates at an average $\$ 6.27$ were up 75 cents.

## Railway Transport, Part V, 1975

Canadian railways hauled a total of 249.1 million tons of revenue freight in 1975, a decrease of $8.3 \%$ from 1974. The decline reflected adverse economic conditions, labour problems, strikes at ports and in certain Canadian industries and a poor marke! supply of some commodities.

Domestic loadings were down 6.5\% in 1975 to 227.7 miltion tons. Rail shipments received from United States connections dropped $23.3 \%$ to 21.4 million tons.
Only one of the seven major commodity categories, live animals, showed a traffic increase in 1975. Receipts in this group rose $9.5 \%$ reflecting a 28,000 ton increase in cattle shipments.
The heaviest losses last year were recorded in the crude and fabricated materials classes; this was due to lower movements of forest and allied products resulting from prolonged strikes in the industry. Loadings of iron ore, sulphur and potash were also down from year-earlier levels while coal shipments increased $29.1 \%$ to 5.0 million tons.

## Asbestos

Shipments of asbestos by producers in May 1976 increased to 142.531 tons from 76.709 short tons in May of 1975. This brought shipments in 1976 to date to 688.849 tons, up from 470,718 tons in the similar period a year earlier
