## Employment, Earnings and Hours

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at \$234.27 in October were up 10.0\% from \$212.90 a year earlier

First estimates show that (unadjusted) average weekly earnings (by province) were highest in British Columbia (\$267.06), followed by Alberta (\$245.92). Ontario (\$235.29). Newfoundland (\$228.98), Quebec (\$226.41), Saskatchewan (\$221.83), Manitoba (\$216.01). New Brunswick (\$207.86). Nova Scotia (\$198.82) and Prince Edward Island (\$175.89)
Average weekly earnings in October (by industry division) were as follows: construction. \$342.70: mining, \$326.15; forestry, \$301.13; Iransportation, communication and other utilities, \$269.62; manufacturing, $\$ 247$ 58; finance, insurance and real estate, \$215.29; trade, \$181.22; and service, 152.63

## Department Store Sales by Regions

Depantment stores sales rose to $\$ 669.6$ million in November, up 12.3\% from a year earlier, Increases were recorded in all regions of Canada.

## Farm Cash Recelpts

Farmers' cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland totalled an estimated $\$ 8,937.5$ million in the January-November period of 1976, down $1.0 \%$ from the $\$ 9,024.9$ million realized during the corresponding period of 1975.

These estimates include: cash receipts from the sale of farm products; Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops; cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada; and deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. No deduction was made for the cost incurred by farmers in the production of the commodifies sold.

Total payments made to farmers in the first 11 months of 1976, by province and with year-earlier figures in brackets:

- Ontario, \$2,413.2 million ( $\$ 2,321.7$ milfion); Saskatchewan, $\$ 2,152.2$ million ( $\$ 2,332.4$ million); Alberta, $\$ 1,672.3$ million ( $\$ 1,697.0$ million); Quebec, $\$ 1,226.5$ million ( $\$ 1.202 .1$ million); Manitoba, $\$ 816.3$ million ( $\$ 850.3$ million); British Columbia, $\$ 360.0$ million ( $\$ 364.0$ million); Nova Scotia, $\$ 107.2$ million ( $\$ 101.1$ million); New Brunswick, $\$ 98.3$ million ( $\$ 84.9$ million); and Prince Edward Island, $\$ 91.5$ million ( $\$ 71.4$ million).

## General Wholesale Price Index

(1935-39=100)
The general wholesale price index rose $0.9 \%$ in November to 515.3 from the revised October index of 510.9 to stand $2.8 \%$ above the November 1975 level of 501.2. Seven of the eight major groups included in the total index increased while one decreased.
The vegetable products index advanced $2.7 \%$ in November due to price increases recorded for tobacco (40.9\%), potatoes $(14.6 \%)$, fresh vegetables ( $12.7 \%$ ) and tea, coffee and cocoa ( $4.5 \%$ ). The non-ferrous metals index was up $0.8 \%$, reflecting higher prices for gold ( $19.5 \%$ ), silver ( $4.4 \%$ ) and tin ( $3.8 \%$ ). Iron products moved up $0.7 \%$ due mainly to an increase in castings and forgings (4.5\%). The textile products index rose $0.5 \%$ with increases for raw collon (2.9\%), worsted yarn (1.9\%) and imported raw wool (1.6\%).

Over the 12 months from November 1975, the major group indexes showed the following percentage changes:

- Textile products, $11.0 \%$; wood products, $8.8 \%$; non-metallic minerals, $8.8 \%$; nonferrous metals including gold, $6.8 \%$; iron products, $4.8 \%$; chemical products, $2.3 \%$; animal products, $-3.5 \%$; and vegetable products. $-5.2 \%$.

## Canada's Foreign Trade In Automotive Products

Canada's deficit in trade in automotive products with the United States declined to $\$ 737$ million in the first nine months of 1976 from $\$ 1,385$ million in the corresponding period of 1975 . Exports rose $37.5 \%$ to $\$ 5,727$ million while imports showed a $16.5 \%$ increase to $\$ 6,464$ million.

Shipments of Canadian-made automobiles to the U.S. increased $23 \%$ 10 $\$ 2,528$ million and trucks were up $46 \%$ to $\$ 964$ million. The value of automotive parts shipments climbed $50 \%$ to $\$ 2,114$ million and tires rose $175 \%$ to $\$ 121$ million reflecting the lengthy production disruption in the U.S. rubber industry.

Nearly all of the increase in Canadian imports of automotive products from the U.S. was attributable to automotive parts which increased by more than $24 \%$ to $\$ 4,055$ million in the January to September period of 1976. Canadian imports of cars from the U.S. increased almost $10 \%$ to $\$ 1,601$ million while trucks and other commercial vehicles were up $3.5 \%$ to $\$ 721$ million. Tire imports dropped $34.5 \%$ to $\$ 87$ million.
in sharp contrast to the contraction in the deficit with the U.S., Canada's automotive trade balance with overseas countries deteriorated during the latest period. Imports expanded $27 \%$ to $\$ 646$ million while exports declined $5 \%$ to $\$ 410$ million. The deficit with these countries more than tripled to $\$ 236$ million in 1976 from the unusually-low level of $\$ 76$ million for the first nine months of 1975.

## Local Government Employment

Municipal governments in Canada employed a total of 255,654 persons in general government services at the end of September, an increase of 3,829 (1.5\%) from the corresponding period in 1975.

Gross payrolls for the third quarter of 1976 amounted to $\$ 763.7$ million, up $12.6 \%$ from $\$ 678.2$ million in July-September 1975.

## Retall Trade

Seasonally-adjusted November retail sales increased 0.5\% from October to a level of $\$ 4,832.9$ million.

Total retailtrade without seasonal adius ment reached $\$ 5,040.7$ million, up $74 \%$ from a year earlier. All provinces reparted increased sales over November 1975 with the largest advance in Alberta (13.3\%). Sales were up 11.5\% in Winnipeg, $7.2 \%$ in Vancouver, $6.1 \%$ in Toronto and $3.3 \%$ in Montreal.

Year-to-year increases were registered in 25 of the 28 trade groups with the largest gains posted by book and stationery stores (30.9\%) and florists (26.3\%).

Revised data for October show retail sales for the month at $\$ 5,035.5$ million, up 8.5\% from October 1975.

## New Motor Vehicie Sales

Retail sales of new motor vehicles totalled 102,583 units in November, down 9.3\% from a year earlier. Total sales value decreased $3.5 \%$ to $\$ 626.5$ million.

Sales of passenger cars produced in Canada and the United States fell $16.6 \%$ to 63,519 units while those of overseasmanufactured automobiles rose $15.5 \%$ 12,374 units.

Commercial vehicle sales in November rose $2.1 \%$ from a year earlier to 26,690 units; included were 25,593 produced in Canada and the U.S. (up 2.4\%) and 1,097 manufactured overseas (down $6.2 \%$ ).

For the first 11 months of 1976, sales of new motor vehicles totalled 1.198,696 units with an accumulated value of $\$ 7,160.8$ million. This represents a decrease of $0.4 \%$ in units but an increase of $8.3 \%$ in value compared with sales for JanuaryNovember 1975.

## International Travel

Preliminary statistics for November show that 1.6 million United States visitors entered Canada, down $12.4 \%$ from November 1975. Canadian residents returning from the United States numbered 2.5 million, down $1.6 \%$ from last year.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the United States increased by $0.2 \%$ in November to 54,000 . Canadian travellers returning from these courdries totalled 83,000 (this figure is not compara. ble with November 1975 due 10 a charge definitions).

## The Labour Force

Canada's seasonally-adjusted unemploywent rate rose to $7.5 \%$ in December from $7.3 \%$ in November

Last month the unemployment rate for men 25 years of age and over increased to $.4 \%$ from $4.2 \%$ in November while for women 25 and over it rose to $6.7 \%$ from $6.5 \%$. For persons aged 15 to 24, the unemployment rate climbed to 14.0\% from 13.5\%.

Between November and December, the seasonally-adjusted participation rate percentage of the population 15 and over included in the labour force - decreased to $60.6 \%$ from $60.7 \%$.

On an actual basis, the number of persons employed declined to 9.48 million in December from 9.59 million in November but was up from 9.40 million in December 1975.

The actual unemployment total was 754.000 or $7.4 \%$ of the 10.23 million included in the labour force last month. By province, unemployment rates were: Newfoundland, 13.9\%: New Brunswick, 11.8\%, Nova Scotia, $10.0 \%$; Quebec, $9.4 \%$; Prince Edward Island, 8.8\%: British Columbia, 8.2\%; Ontario, 6.3\%; Manitoba, $5.4 \%$; Alberta, 3.9\%; and Saskatchewan, 3.6\%.

## Help-Wanted Index

(1969=100)
The seasonally-adjusted help-wanted index stood at 156 in the fourth quarter of 1976. a fractional rise from the previous quarter but $3 \%$ lower than in the corresponding quarter in 1975.

The annual index for 1976 at 157 was down 4\% from 164 in 1975. Last year the index rose $8 \%$ in the Prairie Region but decreased in all other regions of Canada, the declines ranging from $2 \%$ in British Columbia to $35 \%$ in the Atlantic Region.

## The Wheat Review

Total exports of wheat from the tour Iraditional major exporters during August amounted to 190.3 million bushels, up 15\% from a year earlier. Canadian wheat exports rose to 40.7 million bushels from 28.6 million.

Total supplies of wheat remaining in Canada, the United States. Australia and Argentina at September 1, 1976 for export and for carryover at the end of their respective crop years amounted to 2,954.1 wiflion bushels, 20\% more than the 2,451.5 million on hand at the same date in 1975.
Supplies were held as follows, in millions 3) bushels and with last year's comparable figures in brackets: United States, 1,716.4 (1.536.7): Canada, 945.2 (718.3): Australia, 181.8 (143.9); and Argentina, 110.7 (52.6).

## Road Motor Vehicle Revenues, 1975

Total provincial and territorial revenues from molive fuel taxes, vehicle registrations and other road-related revenues amounted to $\$ 2,081$ million in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1976, up $4.9 \%$ from $\$ 1,983$ million in the 1974-75 fiscal year. Motive fuel taxes - which accounted for the bulk of this revenue - were up $4.7 \%$ to $\$ 1,505$ million from $\$ 1,438$ million.

On June 24, 1975, the federal government instituted an excise tax on gasoline consumed in non-commercial activities. Revenues from this tax during the 1975-76 fiscal year totalled $\$ 425$ million.

## Motlon Picture Theatres <br> and FIIm Distributors, 1975

Receipts from paid admissions (excluding amusement taxes) of 1,492 regular and drive-in motion picture theatres in 1975 amounted to $\$ 212.7$ million. Paid admissions numbered 97.5 million persons.

These theatres had revenues from all other sources - sales of refreshments, rental revenue from concessions and vending machines, revenue from showing advertisements - totalling $\$ 51.1$ million in 1975. Salaries and wages amounting 10 $\$ 48.7$ million were paid to 16,360 employees.

There were 85 film distributing establishments operating in Canada in 1975 and they had receipts totalling $\$ 114.9$ million, of which $\$ 114.0$ million was trom the rental of films. Salaries and wages paid by these firms to their 808 employees totalled $\$ 8.4$ million.

Department Store Sales in Ottawa-Hull Department stores in the Ottawa-Hull metropoltan area reported sales totalling $\$ 4.06$ million for the week ending January 1 , an increase of $14.0 \%$ from the same period last year Sales were up $50.5 \%$ in Hull and suburbs, $5.9 \%$ in Ottawa (city) and $5.5 \%$ in Oltawa and suburbs.

Ottawi-Hull area department store sales in 1976 totalled $\$ 276.60$ million, up $8.9 \%$ over the 1975 figure. Sales rose $17.0 \%$ in Hull and suburbs, $10.8 \%$ in Otlawa (city) and $7.8 \%$ in Ottawa and suburbs.

## Advertising Agencles, 1975

Advertising agencies in Canada posted gross cperatirig revenues of $\$ 122.9$ million in 197\%, an increase of 6.5\% over the 1974 figure of $\$ 115.4$ million. Net profits before taxes ose $6.0 \%$ to $\$ 10.8$ million.

Salaries and wages totalling $\$ 69.3$ million were paid in 1975 to the industry's 4,721 employees.
