

Balance of International Payments
Canada's current account deficit to alle
\$4,329 million in 1976, about \$600 million
less than in 1975.

A swing of \$1,771 million in the balance on merchandise trade to a surplus of \$1,132 million in 1976 was the main positive contribution to the reduced current account deficit. However, the deficit balance on service transactions reached an unprecedented \$6 billion in 1976, up by \$1,270 million from 1975.

Capital movements during 1976 produced a massive net inflow of \$4.9 billion, nearly \$300 million more than the previous record inflow received in 1975.

Preliminary estimates indicate that Canada's balance of international indebiadness reached a book value of about \$48.5 billion by the end of 1976.

Long-term foreign investment at \$80 illion had increased by about \$12 billion in 1976, reflecting predominantly an inflow of long-term portfolio capital and an increase in earnings accruing to non-residents. Other long-term liabilities brought the total of long-term liabilities to over \$84 billion and various short-term claims on Canadians increased the total of Canada's external liabilities to about \$96 billion. Canadian long-term investment abroad increased by some \$2.5 billion to over \$23.5 billion at the end of 1976. Short-term claims on nonresidents, including net official monetary assets, brought the total of Canada's external assets to about \$47.5 billion.


# International Travel

Preliminary statistics for January show that 1.2 million United States visitors entered Canada, down 14.2% from January 1976. Canadian residents returning from the U.S. numbered 2.3 million, up 4.5% from last year.

Visitors entering Canada from countries other than the U.S. totalled 39,700 in Shuary, virtually unchanged from a year earlier. Canadian travellers returning from these countries rose 16.9% from January 1976 to 195,000.

# Consumer Price Index (CPI)

(1971 = 100)

The Consumer Price Index for Canada advanced 0.9% to 155.4 in February from 154.0 in January.

Nearly three-fifths of this latest relatively large increase was due to a 2% rise in the food index; this marked the second consecutive month in which this index has registered a sharp increase following a year of relative price stability. Higher prices for shelter, and to a lesser extent, for clothing also contributed notably to the all-items index rise in February. While the food index increased 2.0%, the index for all items excluding food rose by 0.5%.

Between February 1976 and February 1977, the All-Items Consumer Price Index

advanced 6.7%.

During this period, the following movements were recorded in the component indexes:

 Housing, 9.5%; tobacco and alcohol, 8.3%; transportation, 8.2%; health and personal care, 7.1%; clothing, 5.8%; recreation, education and reading, 5.0%; and food, 3.1%.

On a seasonally-adusted basis, the allitems index advanced 0.8% between January and February. The current annual rate of change in the CPI, based on the seasonally-adjusted movement since three months earlier was 9.2%, up from the 7.3% rate recorded the previous month.

Oil Pipeline Transport

Canadian oil pipelines received 2.81 million barrels per day of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum product in December, an increase of 0.6% from a year earlier.

Receipts of domestic petroleum and products increased 8.5% to 2.50 million B/D in the latest month while imports fell 36.4% to 314,000 B/D.





# General Wholesale Price Index

(1935-39=100)

The general wholesale price index rose to 533.0 in January, an increase of 1.2% from 526.5 (revised) in December and up 5.6% from the January 1976 level of 504.6. Increases were recorded for seven of the major groups while one remained unchanged.

The vegetable products index climbed 3.7% in January, reflecting price increases for fresh vegetables (16.7%), tea, coffee and cocoa (14.1%), dried fruits (9.6%), sugar and its products (5.0%), vegetable oil products (4.9%) and livestock and poultry feeds (3.4%). The non-ferrous products index was up 1.2% with increases for tin (13.7%), solder (4.9%), lead and its products (3.9%) and nickel (2.8%). The nonmetallic minerals group moved 1.4% higher due to increases for crushed stone (8.1%), plaster (6.4%), sand and gravel (5.2%) and lime (4.3%).

Over the 12 months from January 1976, the major group indexes showed the following percentage changes:

Wood products, 12.4%; non-ferrous metals including gold, 10.5%; textile products, 10.4%; non-metallic minerals, 8.1%; iron products, 6.5%; chemical products, 2.0%; vegetable products, 1.2%; and animal products, -2.4%.

### **Commercial Failures**

Preliminary figures show that failures recorded under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding-Up Acts numbered 720 in the fourth quarter of 1976, up from 466 in the October-December period of 1975.

Estimated total liabilities of bankrupt firms rose to \$105.5 million in the latest period from \$74.8 million.

Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundland totalled an estimated \$1,202.9 million in January, down 31.1% from \$1,744.6 million in January 1976.

These estimates include: cash receipts from the sale of farm products; Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops; cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada; and deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. No deduction was made for the cost incurred by farmers in the production of the commodities sold.

Saskatchewan, \$519.6 million (\$849.0 million); Alberta, \$228.2 million (\$365.6 million); Ontario, \$206.3 million (\$210.5 million); Manitoba, \$102.4 million (\$153.2 million); Quebec, \$84.6 million (\$98.4 million); British Columbia, \$31.5 million (\$35.9 million); Prince Edward Island, \$10.4 million (\$11.4 million); New Brunswick, \$10.0 million (\$10.6 million); and Nova Scotia, \$9.9 million (\$10.0 million).

Airport Activity, 1976

Scheduled passenger arrivals and departures at Toronto International Airport increased 4.3% to 4,728,201 in the first six months of 1976 from 4,533,515 in the corresponding period of 1975. Similar figures for Montreal Mirabel and Dorval airports combined show a decrease of 0.7% to 3,149,083 in the latest period from 3,170,576.

#### The Labour Force

Canada's seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate climbed to 7.9% in February from 7.5% in January.

Last month the unemployment rate for men 25 years of age and over rose to 4.7% from 4.4% in January while for women 25 and over it remained unchanged at 7.0%. For persons aged 15 to 24, the unemployment rate jumped to 14.4% from 13.3%.

Between January and February, the seasonally-adjusted participation rate — percentage of the population 15 and over included in the labour force — rose to 61.3% from 61.0%.

On an actual basis, the number of persons employed rose to 9.29 million in February from 9.26 million in January and was up from 9.18 million in February 1976.

The actual unemployment total was 932,000 or 9.1% of the 10.22 million included in the labour force last month. By province, unemployment rates were: Newfoundland, 17.4%; New Brunswick, 15.1%; Prince Edward Island, 13.5%; Nova Scotia, 13.2%; Quebec, 11.3%; British Columbia, 9.2%; Ontario, 8.0%; Manitoba, 7.5%; Saskatchewan, 5.4%; and Alberta, 4.6%.

#### Retail Trade

Seasonally-adjusted January retail sales nateased 3.1% from December to a level of 5.202.8 million.

Total retail trade without seasonal adjustment reached \$4,243.0 million in January, up 9.5% from a year earlier. All provinces reported increased sales over January 1976 with the largest advance in Ontario (11.4%). Sales were up 13.7% in Toronto. 9.7% in Vancouver, 7.9% in Winnipeg and 6.8% in Montreal.

Year-to-year increases were registered in 23 of the 28 trade groups with the largest gains posted by florists (24.8%), motor vehicle dealers (24.2%) and garages (24.2%).

Revised data for December 1976 show retail sales for the month at \$6,296.5 million, up 9.2% from December 1975.

## Local Government Finance, 1976

A survey of budgets and other sources of financial information indicates that in 1976 local government revenue rose to \$15.8 billion, up 11.8% over 1975, while expenditures increased 12.0% and exceeded \$16.8 billion.

Large companies will certainly want to purchase this handbook. So too should small firms, for it is an inexpensive way to accumulate valuable information for proper business planning.



#### **Refined Petroleum Products**

Net sales in Canada of all refined petroleum products amounted to 55.6 million barrels in January, up 0.4% from a year earlier.

Canadian refineries produced 58.3 million barrels of refined petroleum products in the latest month, an increase of 7.4% from January 1976.

# Farm Equipment Sales

Sales of farm implements and equipment in January were valued at \$50.6 million (dealers' cost), up 7.2% from \$47.2 million in January 1976.

Sales of repair parts for farm equipment rose 14.3% to \$14.1 million in the latest month from \$10.5 million

### Breweries, 1975

Breweries in Canada shipped \$693.7 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1975, up 13.2% from 1974. Total value added by the industry increased 12.4% to \$476.2 million, the number of employees increased 2.0% to 11,652 and total salaries and wages increased 20.4% to \$172.4 million.
