

## Gross National Product (GNP)

The economy swung back to a relatively healthy but narrowly-based rate of real growth in the first quarter of 1977. Gross National Product, seasonally adjusted at annual rates, rose $2.2 \%$ to a level of \$199.9 billion; measured in real terms, GNP increased $1.3 \%$ atter having fallen 0.2\% in the last quarter of 1976.

Basis for the economy's first quarter performance was largely the strength of a substantial increase in the value of exports and a consequent improvement in the balance of trade in goods and services. An increase in the real value of government current expenditure also contributed a significant amount to the expansion in real output. But personal expenditure on goods and services - which accounted for aimost all of last year's real growth declined $0.4 \%$ in real terms as spending on (in semi-durable and non-durable goods Toil, and there was little strength in gross Fisa capital formation.

Despite increases in the implicit price indexes for a number of major expenditure aggregates, the price of national production as measured by the over-all GNP implicit price index rose only $0.8 \%$ in the first quarter. This was primarily because the implicit price index for government current expenditure fell $2.4 \%$ after increasing $6.4 \%$ last quarter, when large retroactive wage payments were made. Removing these payments gives a better measure of the "underlying" rate of price change in the economy, and on this basis, the government and GNP implicit price indexes increased during the quarter by $1.9 \%$ and 1.7\%, respectively.

## Radio Alr-Time Sales

Gross national AM and FM radio air-time sales totalled $\$ 6.0$ million in March, an increase of $5.3 \%$ from $\$ 5.7$ million in March 1976.

Agency and other commissions reduced gross national sales to $\$ 5.1$ million (up 6.3\%).

Net local air-time sales rose $16.1 \%$ to \$:4.4 million in March from $\$ 12.4$ million a year earlier.

Gross year-to-date radio air-time sales for 1977 reached $\$ 55.1$ million, up $6.8 \%$ from $\$ 51.6$ million. Net sales rose $7.4 \%$ to $\$ 49.1$ million from $\$ 45.7$ million.

## Real Domestic Product

The seasonally-adjusted index of real domestic product declined $0.3 \%$ to 125.3 in April from a level of 125.7 in March. Output of goods-producing industries decreased $0.5 \%$ and service-producing industries were down $0.2 \%$.
In goods-producing industries, only manufacturing increased while declines were recorded in agriculture, forestry, fishing and trapping, construction, mining and utilities. Total manufacturing was up for the second consecutive month; nondurables increased while durables were relatively unchanged from March. Nondurable manufacluring gains were recorded in food and beverages, rubber and plastic products, leather products, textiles, clothing, paper and allied producls, printing and publishing and chemicals and chemical products. In durables manufacturing, primary metals, metal fabricating and transportation equipment manufacturers declined but manufacturers of electrical and non-metallic mineral products increased substantially.
In service-producing industries, the first monthly decline since May 1976 was recorded, with only community, business and personal services and finance, insurance and real estate showing increases. In transportation, storage and communication, air transport, railway transport, bus transport, urban transit systems and communication systems declined although output of grain elevators increased substantially. In trade, wholesale trade decreased marginally. Retail trade was unchanged from March as declines for department stores, motor vehicle dealers and clothing stores offset increases for food, hardware and drug stores. Public administration and defence services declined substantially due to major decreases in federal, provincial and local administration.

## Index of Industrial Production

The seasonally-adjusted index of industrial production declined $0.3 \%$ to 122.3 in April from 122.7 in March.

Manufacturing output rose $0.2 \%$ in the latest month; non-durables manufacturing was up $0.7 \%$ and durables manufacturing dropped by $0.1 \%$. Mining production decreased $2.7 \%$ and output of electric power. gas and water utilities declined $1.9 \%$.

## Commercial Building Permits Issued in Canada



## Building Permits

The seasonally-adjusted value of building permits issued in Canada decreased $11.7 \%$ to $\$ 975.6$ million in April from a revised $\$ 1,104.6$ million in March. In April 1976, the corresponding figure was $\$ 1,040.6$ million.

The value of proposed residential construction dropped to $\$ 594.4$ million ( $\$ 731.6$ million in March 1977) when the number of new dwellings authorized decreased, reflecting an annual rate of 225,400 units compared to an unusually high rate of 289,800 in March.

Industrial projects estimated at $\$ 85.1$ million remained practically unchanged compared to March ( $\$ 86.5$ million), commercial projects increased to $\$ 204.5$ million ( $\$ 155.8$ million) and publicly-initiated construction decreased $10 \$ 91.6$ million ( $\$ 130.8$ million).

## Industrial Corporations' Profits

After-tax profits of Canadian industria corporations were $\$ 2,157$ million for the fres quarter of 1977 , an increase of $\$ 139$ milimin ( $6.9 \%$ ) from the first quarter of 1976.

Total sales of $\$ 59$ billion increased \& biltion ( $11.3 \%$ ) from the first quarter of $19,5$. Assets increased $\$ 4$ billion ( $2.4 \%$ ) over the fourth quarter of 1976 and $\$ 15$ billion ( $9.8 \%$ ) from the first quarter of 1976 .

The figures represent the latest dala for the first quarter of 1977 and supersede the preliminary estimates for the same period released last month. The figures are also available on CANSIM.

## Housing Starts

New residential construction activity continued to decline in April with housing starts in Canadian centres of 10,000 population and over decreasing $7.7 \%$ to 14,961 units from 16,213 in April 1976.

Housing starts recorded in the latest month, by province, with April 1976 figures in brackets: Ontario, 4,760 (5,817); Quebec, 3,366 (3,455); Alberta. 2,631 (2,916): British Columbia, 2,288 ( 2,260 ): Saskatchewan. 926 (368); Manitoba, 420 (630); Nova Scolia, 371 (286); New Brunswick, 164 (366); Newfoundland, 33(107); and Princ Edward Island, 2 (8).

For the first four months of 1977, housing starts in centres of 10.000 population and over totalled 45,041 units, down 15.0\% from 53,012 in January-April 1976.

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales in April were estimated at $\$ 4,368$ million, up $4.3 \%$ from April 1976.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 7,622$ million at the end of April, an increase of $10.7 \%$ from a year earlier.

## Unemployment Insurance Statistics

Net benefit paid to claimants under the Unemployment insurance Act totalled \$354 inillion in April, up 13\% from $\$ 314$ million cishursed a year earlier.
Persons receiving unemployment insuracce benefits were $6 \%$ more than a year earlier, at 859,000 , but $4 \%$ fewer than in March 1977. Persons seeking benefit filed 200,000 claims in April, down 6\% from March but 3\% more than in April 1976.

For the first four months of 1977, net payments under the Act amounted to $\$ 1,553$ million, an increase of $11 \%$ from $\$ 1,395$ million paid out in January-April 1976. A rise of $9 \%$ to $\$ 101.01$ in average weekly benefits accounted for most of the increase.

## Consumer Price Indexes

## for Reglonal Cities

Between April and May, consumer price indexes rose in all 14 regional cities with increases ranging from $0.4 \%$ in Winnipeg to $08 \%$ in six other cities.
Aigher food prices - notably for beef, tresih produce, coffee, soft drinks, butter wict sugar - along with increased shelter cifirges were major contributors to the inteases. Other important factors included higher prices for barber and hairdressing services, seasonal recreation equipment, new cars and for beer and liquor

Between May 1976 and May 1977. consumer price indexes rose in all regional cities with increases recorded as follows: Regina, $9.5 \%$; Edmonton, $8.6 \%$; Calgary. $8.5 \%$; Quebec City, $8.5 \%$; Halifax. $8.1 \%$. Montreal, $8.1 \%$; Saskatoon, $8.1 \%$; Ottawa, 7.9\%; Thunder Bay, 7.7\%; St. John's, 7.4\%; Toronto, $7.4 \%$ : Saint John, $7.3 \%$; Winnipeg, 7.3\%; Vancouver, 6.2\%

## Teaching Qualifications

Teachers surveyed nationally in 1973-74 indicated qualifications at public elementary schools improved significantly over the previous year. Only 75\% of staff had more than two years of post-secondary education in 1971-72, compared with $83 \%$ in the latest survey.
At the secondary level, where qualifications have been traditionally higher, the change was not so marked. Both categories, however, shared a decline in the number of females in the teaching force. from $59 \%$ to $56 \%$. Over a ten-year period, the decline was 8\%.

Median salaries rose $11 \%$ to $\$ 9,704$ for elementary teachers and $9 \%$ to $\$ 12,990$ at the secondary level.

## Distributional Eflects of Health

 and Educallon Benefits, Canada, 1974For the first time it has been possible 10 observe the distribution of benefits received from health and educational services by family income and other characteristics. If is estimated that in 1974, on average, each family unit in Canada received over \$1,500 worth of benefits.

The analysis indicates that benefits accruing from the utilization of health and educational services have an equalizing effect on income distribution. though this effect is not as string as that of government transfers paid in ash to persons.
Low income lamilies and unattached individuals receive more than their "share" of benefits; this is true of health as well as educational benefits.

## Employment, Earnings and Hours

Average weekly earnings in Canadian industry at $\$ 246.12$ in April were up 9.7\% from \$224.40 a year earlier.

First estimates show that (unadjusted) average weekly earnings (by province) were highest in Eritish Columbia (\$276.22), followed by Alberta ( $\$ 257.83$ ), Ontario ( $\$ 246.38$ ), Quebec ( $\$ 241.00$ ). Newfoundland (\$237.87), Saskatchewan (\$231.42), Manitoba (\$223.33). New Brunswick ( $\$ 223.03$ ), Nova Scotia ( $\$ 207.20$ ) and Prince Edward Island (\$181.24).

Average weekly earnings in April (by industry division; were as follows: construction, $\$ 361.36$; mining, $\$ 343.23$; forestry, $\$ 323.64$; transriortation, communication and other utilities, $\$ 285.59$; manufacturing, $\$ 262.88$; finance insurance and real estate, $\$ 227.87$; trade $\$ 189.53$; and service, \$168.47

Compared with April 1976, average hourly earnings were up $13.1 \%$ in construction, $11.2 \%$ in manufacturing and $9.2 \%$ in mining.
