Labour Force

December's total employed reached 9,729,000, up 2.7% from 9,476,000 in 1976. Unemployment rose 17% to 882,000 from 754,000 with a rate of 8.3 against 7.3 a year earlier.

The 1977 averages (with 1976 figures in brackets) for the national labour force series were:

- Labour Force, 10,616,000 (10,308,000)
- Employment, 9,754,000 (9,572,000)
- Participation rate, 61.5 (61.1)
- Unemployment, 862,000 (736,000)
- Unemployment rate, 8.1 (7.1)

December's seasonally-adjusted level of employment was virtually unchanged from October and November at 9,842,000. Men over 25 increased by 5,000 and women by 25,000. Women 15 to 24 declined by 20,000

and men rose by 6,000. Alberta's employment increased 9,000. Saskatchewan declined 6,000 and other provinces were relatively unchanged.

The seasonally-adjusted level of unemployment increased by 11,000 to 911,000. The level increased for men 25 and over (13,000), women (4,000) and declined slightly for men and women 15-24.


Unemployment increased in Ontario (10,000), Québec (4,000) and declined in Nova Scotia (2,000). The remaining provinces showed little or no change.

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 to 8.5. The rate for men rose 0.2 to 7.7, and for women declined 0.1 to 9.7.

The rate decreased 1.0 to 11.4 in Prince Edward Island, 0.5 to 10.2 in Nova Scotia, 0.4 to 17.5 in Newfoundland, 0.3 to 14.3 in New Brunswick, 0.3 to 6.2 in Manitoba and 0.1 to 4.6 in Alberta. It increased 0.3 to 4.9 in Saskatchewan, 0.3 to 7.1 in Ontario and 0.1 to 11.5 in Québec and was unchanged in British Columbia at 8.5.

Direct Investment, Foreign Sources

Book value rose at an annual rate of 10% to \$39,838 million at the end of 1975. In absolute terms, the \$3.7 billion exceeded the record \$3.5 billion of 1974. Estimates indicate undistributed earnings accruing to direct investors accounted for over twothirds of the expansion. Net direct investment capital inflows (as recorded in the balance of payments) totalled \$670 million. Other factors such as revaluations and similar accounting adjustments also contributed. Five countries accounted for the largest additions to the foreign direct investment position: the United States, the United Kingdom, Belgium (with Luxembourg), France, and the Netherlands. U.S. direct investment rose 11% or \$3.2 billion to \$32,194 million or 81% of total foreign direct investment in Canada at the end of 1975. The growth was spread over all the industrial categories. U.K. direct investment increased 5% to \$3,717 million (9% of the total). The Netherlands and France added 12% and 13% (to \$678 million and \$665 million). E.E.C. countries (bar the U.K.) totalled \$2,312 million, up 15%. Direct investment owned in Switzerland rose 16% to \$447 million.

All industrial categories registered increases for direct investment owned in the U.S. (e.g., manufacturing: \$1,384 million, petroleum and natural gas: \$659 million, financial industries: \$373 million).

Some \$1,213 million or about one-third of U.K. direct investment centred on manufacturing. Investment in the financial sector (mainly insurance and real estate firms): \$1,011 million. In petroleum and natural gas: \$743 million.

About 32% or \$1,268 million of direct investment owned by residents of "all other countries" was in manufacturing: wood and paper products \$420 million, non-metallic minerals, \$300 million. Petroleum and natural gas rose 4% to \$1,002 million and the financial sector advanced 27% to \$849 million.

Foreign Control

Book value of long-term capital employed in foreign-controlled enterprises rose 12% to \$56,881 million (9% in 1974). U.S.-controlled investment rose 13% to \$41,731 million to 73% of total foreign-controlled investment. U.K.-controlled capital increased to \$7,663 million (13%). E.E.C. countries with \$4,793 million accounted for 8%. (Developed countries, with \$56,284 million in foreign-controlled capital, accounted for 99% of the total).

Foreign-controlled investment at the end of 1975 was 43% above the book value of foreign direct investment (\$39,838 million), the same ratio of 1973 and 1972 (41% in 1974). Ratios of foreign-controlled investment to foreign direct investment indicate ability or willingness of foreign-controlled enterprises to obtain financing from investors outside the country of control.

Building Permits

Building permits for a seasonally-adjusted value of \$911 million were issued in October, down 17.3% from September (\$1,101 million) and 9.3% lower than October 1976 (\$1,033 million).

Residential (-11.0%), industrial (-14.5%) and in institutional (-61.4%) building projects declined and municipalities issued permits for 18,379 new dwellings (\$562 million) compared with 20,808 and \$625 million in September. There were fewer single-detached homes authorized (8,054) and fewer multiple dwellings, 10,325 to 11,570. In the non-residential sector the absence of large projects accounts for declines from \$98 million to \$84 million for industrial plants and from \$160 million to \$62 million for institutional buildings. Value of commercial building projects remained relatively strong at \$203 million.

Québec, Ontario and British Columbia accounted for most of October's decline. An absence of major industrial developments explains the 23.3% Québec decrease: for Ontario, a drop of 30.4% (\$419 million in September to \$292 million) reflected the significant declines in residential, commercial and institutional building projects: British Columbia's 28.1% decrease also stemmed from fewer permits issued for residential and institutional construction.

Cumulative totals covering ten months reflect the weakness of the 1977 construction program excepting Alberta — value of permits issued exceeds last year's by 17.0%.

Motor Vehicle Shipments

Automobile production slowed to 106,744 in November from 108,423 in 1976. January to November: 1,080,346 (1,047,725 a year earlier). Commercial vehicles: 64,439 (49,017). Year to date: 563,632 (461,277).

In the fourth quarter, the seasonallyadjusted help wanted index (1969=100) stood at 153, 4% higher than the third but 2% less than 1976's fourth quarter.

More TV Colours Lifestyles

Acquisition of colour TV continues to be a prime path pursued by members of households according to a comparison of 1976 and 1977 survey results. But whereas 67.8% of households owned colour TVs against 60.6% in 1976, the percentage owning two cars stayed the same — 24.4%.

The "electric refrigerators" category standing at 99.4% has almost reached saturation point (a rise of 0.2%). Snowmobiles, however, hover around the 10% mark.

Other prime risers include FM receivers (82.3% from 76.5%), home freezers (47.6% from 43.5%), automatic washing machines (59.2% from 55.9%), automatic dish-washers (21.8% from 18.6%), motorcycles (8.1% from 5.0%) and wood or coal used for cooking fuel (1.7% from 1.3%).

On the "down" side, on the other hand, were sewing machines (64.2% from 65.4%), one-automobile households (54.5% from 55.0%), and black and white TVs (56.3% from 62.4%).

Ninety-nine thousand households of the condominium variety were included in the survey for the first time in 1977, 1.4% of the 7,022 million total, and this departure in itself may have coloured some of the 1977 results.

Farm Implements/Equipment

January to November farm implements and equipment sales dropped 5.6% to \$1,018.6 million from \$1,078.5 million in 1976. Value of repair parts reached \$152.7 million from \$148.1 million.

Farm Cash Receipts

Excluding Newfoundland farmers, cash receipts from farm operations for the first 11 months of 1977 rose 0.2% to \$9,221.5 million from \$9,204.7 million a year earlier. The provincial breakdown, with 1976 figures in brackets: Ontario \$2,604.7 million (\$2,510.5 million); Saskatchewan, \$1,989.6 million (\$2,183.2 million); Alberta, \$1,774.7 million (\$1,700.7 million); Québec, \$1,307.7 million (\$1,246.3 million); Manitoba, \$826.0 million (\$827.7); British Columbia, \$419.2 million (\$427.1 million); Nova Scotia, \$117.3 million (\$112.1 million); New Brunswick, \$98.4 million (\$103.3 million); and Prince Edward Island, \$83.9 million (\$93.8 million).

Provincial Government Employment

Excluding British Columbia, provincial and territorial governments' gross payrolls for the third quarter: \$1,245.7 million, up 4.7% from April-June. Employees reported for the last pay period in September: 367,038, down 0.6% from 169,252 in June.

Coal and Coke


August coal production increased 5.6% to 2,222,474 short tons (2 016 195 metric) from 2,103,945 (1 908 667) a year earlier. Industry used 1,919,126 tons (1 741 002) of coal, up 382,798 (347 269) and 476,762 tons (432 511) of coke, up 1,215 (1 102).

Rental, Automobiles/Trucks

In 1976, 549 establishments primarily engaged in the rental and leasing of automobiles and trucks earned operating revenues of \$374.5 million and reported 5 063 employees, paid \$50.2 million.

Department Store Sales

January to November department store sales rose 6.4% to \$5,890.1 million from \$5,533.9 million a year earlier. November sales rose 11.7% to \$747.8 million from \$669.7 million in 1976.

Regional totals, with percentage increase from 1976: Ontario, \$280.5 million (10.4%); Québec, \$131.9 million (4.8%); British Columbia, \$117.3 million (17.3%); Alberta, \$103.5 million (23.7%); Atlantic Provinces, \$49.6 million (5.5%); Manitoba, \$43.5 million (8.3%); and Saskatchewan, \$21.5 million (10.8%).



Transportation Statistics

A 1976 household goods moving survey indicates 289 active carriers enjoyed gross operating revenues of \$159.0 million and total operating expenses of \$151.0 million. Motor carriers (freight) show a 5% decrease in the number of carriers to 2,457 (gross operating revenues increased 9% to \$2,854 million).

The 1976 passenger bus survey of 49 carriers show total operating revenues rose 14.9% to \$188.2 million from 1975. The urban transit survey showed total operating expenses for the industry increased 26.6% to \$650.2 million from 1975. Results of the Other Bus Statistics 1976 new survey indicate that there were 1,333 carriers whose major activity was school bus, charter bus, sightseeing bus or limousine service to airport or stations. This excludes intercity passenger bus and urban transit carriers. Total operating revenue earned was \$235.8 million and the total operating expense was \$206.6 million.
