## Preliminary Statement, Trade

Seasonally adjusted on a balance of payments basis, exports in August rose $2.8 \%$ to $\$ 4,129$ million (following a $2 \%$ gain in July) - a level slightly below the eight months' average level. Imports dropped $48 \%$ to $\$ 3,943$ million after a $6 \%$ advance in July, the August figure again almost matching the monthly average of 1978 imports so far. There was a turnaround of $\$ 309$ million from a revised deficit of \$123 million in July to a surplus of $\$ 186$ million Exports declined 9\% to $\$ 12,082$ million over June-July-August from $\$ 13.297$ million in the preceding three months with imports rising fractionally to $\$ 11,981$ million. The merchandise trade surplus accumulated in the period March to May contracted from $\$ 1,369$ mittion to $\$ 101$ miltion and at $\$ 2,084$ million the surplus for eight months compates with $\$ 1,734$ million for JanuaryAucust 1977
Seasonally adjusted on a Customs basis axports to the United States advanced $2.6 \%$ i0 $\$ 3.009$ million following a rise of $1 \%$ in July. The Augus! figure topped the $\$ 3$ billion level again after the recent peak of $\$ 3,280$ million in April. Metallic ores rebounded after strikes ended at Québec-Labrador fron mines, exports of chemicals recovered and moderate increases came in other industrial materials. Motor vehicles, automotive parts and other equipment and machinery declined. Exports of $\$ 8,842$ million for three months fell $2.5 \%$ from March-May

At $\$ 1.142$ million, seasonally-adjusted exports to overseas countries rose $4 \%$ from July following that month's 8\% gain. Shipments increased to the European Economic Community. tell to Japan and elsewhere. Wheat barley, some industrial materials and motor vehicles advanced Coal, lumber, chemicals and non-ferrous metals lell. Over three months, exports of $\$ 3,247$ million were $20 \%$ below March-April-May

The proportion of exports going to the U.S expanded from $68.9 \%$ in the first eight months of 1977 to $70.6 \%$ in 1978.

A1 $\$ 2.895$ million, seasonally-adjusted mports on a Customs basis from the U.S. blood $1 \%$ below July and slightly above June. A sharp fall in transportation and other equipment (in particular automotive parts) and declines in industrial materials were in part offset by increased arrivals of machinery and coal. Total rose $3.8 \%$ 10 $\$ 8.714$ million from $\$ 8.392$ million for the preceding period.

Imports from overseas dropped nearly $13 \%$ to $\$ 1,071$ million, the fall almost emtirely borne by countries other than Japan and the E.E.C. Crude oil imports dropped and arrivals of food, some fabricated materials, machinery and apparel and tootwear also declined. Increases came in automotive goods, particularly cars. 1 m ports in a three-month comparison receded $8 \%$ to $\$ 3,293$ million.

The proportion of imports originating in the U.S. rose marginally to $70 \%$ in the first eight months of 1978 from the same period 1977. The proportion of imports from the E.E.C. and Japan also expanded but the shares for the remaining countries decreased.

## Urban Family Spending, 1976

A survey of private households in eight cities was conducted early in 1977 in which families and unattached individuals were asked to recall their expenditures for the previous year. Detailed information was provided by 3,681 families and unattached individuals in St . John's. Halifax Montréal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver. Total expenditure averaged $\$ 17.995$ of which $16.0 \%$ was on food, $15.6 \%$ on shelter, $12.2 \%$ on travel and transporlation and $7.0 \%$ on clothing. A full report entitted Urban Family Expenditure, 1976, will be published early next year. ## Railway Operating Statistics

Six major railways July net income of $\$ 13.0$ million rose $55.3 \%$ from July 1977. Operating revenues increased $8.6 \%$ to $\$ 288.4$ million and operating expenses at $\$ 275.4$ million held to a $7.0 \%$ gain.

Revenue freight ton-miles fell $5.7 \%$, freight train-miles $0.5 \%$ and freight carmiles $3.0 \%$ from a year earlier. Average revenue per ton-mile of freight reached 2.034 cents against 1.798 cents. Passenger-miles (GO Transit excluded) rose $24.4 \%$ with commuter travel advancing $3.9 \%$ and intercity movements up $25.1 \%$ (a sharp rise in intercity passengermiles results in part from a 9.8\% downward adjustment by Canadian National in figures reported for July 1977).

Seven months' operating revenues rose 8.0\% from a year earlier, expenses 7.6\% and net income (at \$127.2 million) 15.3\%. Cumulative ton-miles were off $2.0 \%$ and passenger-miles showed a $5.5 \%$ gain.

## Building Permits

Preliminary estimates indicate building intentions remained stable during July in the residential and the non-residentei sectors - value of authorized constriction reached a seasonally-adjusted rate of $\$ 1.098$ million against $\$ 1.090$ million in June (in July 1977 the value reached $\$ 959$ million).
Residential permits estimated at \$613 miltion ( $\$ 616$ million in June) were issued for 16.880 dwellings units comprising 9,380 single detached homes and 7,500 multiple dwellings In June, construction was authorized for 17,807 dwellings of which 9,296 were single detached homes and 8.511 were collective dwellings. On the basis of these figures, starts of single detached nomes are projected as stabilizing at an annual rate of approximately 115,000 in the coming months with starts of multiple dwellings decreasing to a rate much below 100,000 units.
Value of non-residential permits (\$473 million in June) rose to $\$ 486$ million reflecting increased activily in the commercial sector with projects estimated at \$293 million against $\$ 237$ million in June. Permits activity in the industrial sector: $\$ 86$ million in July from \$102 miltion in June. In the public sector: \$106 million in July from \$134 million.

Value of permits for seven months rose only $1.8 \%$ from the corresponding period of 1977. The relative share of permits issued in the Atlantic region rose from 4.9\% Qtite national total in 1977 to $5.8 \%$ and in the Prairies $24.0 \%$ to $30.1 \%$. In Queber ithe share fell from $20.8 \%$ to $17.8 \%$, in Oilario the share went to $33.2 \%$ from $35.7 \%$ aid in British Columbia $12.8 \%$ from $14.4 \%$.

The Industry Selling Price index for manu lacturing rose $0.6 \%$ to 189.2 in August from tevised July's 188.1 and $7.7 \%$ from 1977 (175.5). Major groups with most effect:

- Increase of $2.7 \%$ in wood industries matinly attributed 10 sawmills and planing mills 3.9\% increase

## Average Earnings

Average weekly earnings rose $6.0 \%$ to $\$ 266.77$ in July from $\$ 251.62$ in 1977. Average hourly earnings in manufacturing reached $\$ 6.83$ (from $\$ 6.40$ ). in construction $\$ 10.09(\$ 9.75)$ and in mining $\$ 8.77$ (\$8.05).
