Retail Trade

Retail trade. September, reached \$6.054.7 million, up 16.8% from 1977. Sales increased in all groups, largest gains being recorded by motor vehicle dealers (27.4%), household furniture stores (25.8%) and automotive parts and accessories stores (22.8%). All provinces recorded increased sales ranging from 23.6% for Manitoba to 13.7% for British Columbia. Montréal sales rose 12.1%, Toronto 18.5%, Winnipeg 13.5% and Vancouver 15.6%.

Seasonally-adjusted sales rose 6.0% to \$6,155.9 million from \$5,808.2 million in August. Sales increased in 26 of 28 groups. Motor vehicle dealers (12.1%), garages (9.0%) and specialty shoe stores (8.7%) recorded the largest increases. Book and the largest increased 6.1% and sporting goods and accessories stores. All provinces reported increased sales ranging from 11.5% for Manitoba to 32% for Québec.

Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from January-September farming operations totalled \$8,583.0 million compared with \$7.507.1 million in 1977. Receipts from farming operations by province with 1977 comparisons in brackets: Prince Edward Island \$70.3 million (\$68.4 million), Nova Scotia \$103.5 million (\$95.1 million), New Brunswick \$83.9 million (\$83.4 million), Québec \$1,195.9 million (\$1,056.5 million), Ontario \$2,400.4 million (\$632.3 million), Manitoba \$784.0 million (\$632.3 million), Saskatchewan \$1,915.0 million (\$1,652.4 million), Alberta \$1,645.3 million (\$1,488.4 million). British Columbia \$384.7 million (\$355.5 million).





Refined Petroleum


Refineries produced 49.616,000 barrels of refined petroleum products in September, an increase of 6.9% from 46,415,000 a year earlier. Net sales amounted to 48,732,000 barrels, up 5.9% (46,016,000).

Cheques Cashed

Value of cheques cashed in 50 clearing centres in September totalled \$256,636 million, up 9.6% from 1977. Payments in eight of the provinces rose in comparison. Debits increased in Prince Edward Island 12.0%, Nova Scotia 8.5%, New Brunswick 9.0%, Ontario 19.1%, Manitoba 5.9%, Saskatchewan 20.0%, Alberta 25.3% and British Columbia 3.9%. Debits decreased in Newfoundland 0.7% and Québec 12.2%.

Thirty-seven of the centres showed a higher value of cheques cashed than in September of 1977. In the major centres, payments increased in Toronto 21.4%, Winnipeg 6.0% and Vancouver 2.7%. Debits decreased in Montréal 16.0%.

The turnover ratio of current deposits (compiled on an annual basis) was 180.32 compared with 179.67 for September 1977. The turnover ratio of savings accounts was 1.07 compared with the September 1977 ratio of 1.14.

HOW TO ORDER Statistics Canada Publications

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Security Transactions, Non-residents

Transactions with non-residents in outstanding Canadian and foreign securities produced a net inflow of \$2 million in July a swing of \$46 million from the outlier of \$44 million in June.

Trading with non residents in Canadian securities gave rise to a net mile of \$17 million in July, compared with a net outflow of \$65 million in June. There was a net turnaround of over \$130 million from transactions in common and preferred stock, changing a net outflow of \$117 million in July. This followed the unusually large level of repurchases from residents of the United Stales in June associated with the acquisition of a substantial interest in Husky Oil Ltd. by Alberta Gas Trunk Line Company Ltd.

The net inflow from transactions in outstanding Canadian bonds and debentures declined from over \$50 million in June to \$3 million in July. The value of gross transactions in these instruments was at the lowest level since May 1975. Sales of debt issues to residents of the United Kingdom fell sharply, from \$49 million to \$11 million.

Dealings in foreign securities resulted in a net outflow of \$15 million in July, as opposed to a net inflow of \$21 million in June. Gross trading in United States stock fell substantially, reflecting the drop in trading activity in New York, to produce a net outflow of some \$13 million, compared with a net inflow of \$19 million in June

For the first seven months of the year, security transactions with non-residents gave rise to a net outflow of \$140 million. Trading in Canadian securities produced a net outflow of \$201 million which was partially offset by a net inflow of \$61 million from dealings in foreign securities.

General Wholesale Index

The General Wholesale Index rose 1.2% to 618.2 in September from its revised August level of 611.0 and 9.4% from 565.0 in 1977. The major groups with most effect:

- Vegetable products, up 1.8%, attributable in part to increases of 8.1% for sugar and its products, 1.7% for grains and 2.9% for tea, coffee and cocoa; potatoes decreased (12.0%)
- Animal products: up 1.8%, due largely to increases in the indexes for livestock (2.5%), fresh meats (2.9%), cured meats (2.3%), leather (3.7%) and fish (1.0%)
- The gain of 1.1% for wood products stemmed mainly from 1.3% for new print and wrapping paper, 1.6% for cedar 2.1% for wood pulp and 0.8% for fir



Restaurant Statistics

Restaurants throughout Canada increased their January-September receipts a total of 9.6% to \$2,037.9 million from a year earlier. Breakdown per province: Ontario \$773.5 million (10.6%), Québec \$612.3 million (7.7%), British Columbia, Yukon and Territories \$222.4 million (12.0%), Alberta \$181.4 million (12.7%), Manitoba \$98.6 million (6.4%), Saskatchewan \$54.5 million (6.3%), New Brunswick \$37.1 million (7.2%), Nova Scotia \$37.1 million (7.4%), Newfoundland \$16.0 million (7.2%) and Prince Edward Island \$5.0 million (8.5%).

September over September 1977: Canada increased receipts 9.4% to \$255.2 million, Ontario \$92.9 million (7.6%), Québec \$81.3 million (10.2%), British Columbia, Yukon and Territories \$31.2 million (12.3%). Alberta \$18.4 million (11.9%), Manitoba \$14.3 million (8.9%), Saskatchewan \$6.2 million (7.9%), \$ Nova Scotia 4.6 million (7.9%), New Brunswick \$4.0 million (7.4%). New Joundland \$1.7 million (12.3%) and Prince Edward Island \$506,000 (9.3%).

Telephone Statistics


Thirteen major telephone systems' September revenues rose 16.9% to \$388.5 million in September from 1977. Operating expenses: \$235.2 million, up 8.5%; net operating revenue, \$153.3 million, up 32.6%. Telephone toll messages rose 7.9% to 92.4 million.
