



#### Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index increased 0.8% from 179.3 in October to 180.8 in November, with the 12-month rise 8.8% (8.7% in October).

The 0.3% increase in the food index was largely attributable to higher prices for restaurant meals. The food-at-home index rose 0.1% as lower prices for selected beef and pork cuts and fresh fruit dampened the impact of higher prices for turkey and selected fresh vegetables.

Higher 1979 new car retail purchase prices (which, on average, after adjustment for quality changes, rose 5.7% over the October prices for 1978 model cars) were largely responsible for the 0.9% rise in the index for all-items-excluding-food. Other notable price increases were also registered for dental care, haircuts and hairdressing services and for alcoholic beverages consumed in licensed premises.

the price level for goods and services, advanced 0.8%, that for services 0.7%. Between November 1977 and November 1978 the price level for goods increased 10.3%, that for services 6.6%.


On a seasonally-adjusted basis, the Consumer Price Index advanced 0.7% between October and November with a 0.6% increase in the food index and a 0.7% increase in the all-items-excluding-food index.

City highlights demonstrate that consumer prices rose in 15 cities for which separate indexes are published, increases ranging from 0.4% in Winnipeg to 1.2% in St. John's. All cities registered an increase in new car purchase prices. Factors which contributed to the variation in city price movements included differing rates of price movements for food, automobile maintenance and recreational items.

Percentage increases with annual change in brackets: St. John's 1.2% (9.6%), Charlottetown/Summerside 0.6% (8.2%), Halifax 0.7% (8.1%), Saint John 0.7% (8.3%), Québec 1.0% (7.9%), Montréal 0.9% (7.9%), Ottawa 0.7% (8.3%), Toronto 0.8% (8.5%), Thunder Bay 0.7% (7.7%), Winnipeg 0.4% (8.3%). # **Real Domestic Product**

The seasonally-adjusted Index of Real Domestic Product for October was unchanged from September's level of 135.0. The Index of Industrial Production recorded a slight change to 134.3 from 134.4. Goodsproducing industries declined 0.1%; service-producing industries were relatively unchanged.

In goods-producing industries, agriculture, construction, manufacturing and utilities fell, forestry, mining and fishing and trapping rose. Agriculture's decline stemmed from lower production levels for grain and livestock. Construction: housing starts down and further weakness in nonresidential building activity. Manufacturing output declined slightly (but remained high compared with July and August). Nondurable manufacturing: down 0.3%. Durable manufacturing: unchanged. Most substantial decline: transportation equipment output of motor vehicle manufacturers dropped about 9%. A slight decline in electric power output accounted for the decrease in utilities. Forestry output rose sharply for the second consecutive month, reflecting strength in logging activity and pulpwood production. Mining output increased for the third consecutive month with continued growth in metal mines.

Relatively little growth among serviceproducing industries saw increases confined to finance, insurance and real estate services and community, business and personal services. Transportation, storage and communication, trade and public administration and defence services recorded declines. In finance, insurance and real estate most of the growth was attributable to security brokers and dealers, and insurance agencies and real estate services. In community, business and personal services moderate gains came in education, services to business management and accommodation and food services. Transportation, storage and communication services declined for the first time since May. In water transport, shipping was disrupted by a week-long strike involving major lake-carriers. This strike indirectly affected the operations of grain elevators which declined substantially. Communication services were affected by a postal strike which involved some 23,000 employees for approximately ten days. The water transport strike affected railway transport, especially in movement of grain. Air transport increased following a strike in late August and part of September. Pipeline transport advancing sharply reflected increased movement of domestic crude petroleum to eastern refineries. Decline in trade was due to a sharp drop in retail trade (the end of provincial retail sales tax reductions curtailed retail trade activity). Wholesale trade increased slightly during the month.

# Inventories/Shipments/Orders

Manufacturers' shipments, October: \$12,081.5 million, up 3.0% from revised September's \$11,734.7 million, Shipments for 10 months: \$106,592.2 million, up 17.2% from \$90,915.3 million a year earlier.

Manufacturers' shipments, seasonally adjusted: \$11,666.2 million, up 1.2% from revised September's \$11,525.6 million. Durable goods shipments rose 0.5% to \$5,425.8 million from \$5,399.9 million and non-durable goods shipments 1.9% to \$6,240.4 million from \$6,125.7 million.

New orders in all manufacturing industries, seasonally adjusted, reached a level of \$12,053.8 million, 0.5% below revised September's \$12,114.7 million. Durable goods new orders fell 0.8% to \$5,859.4 million from \$5,908.3 million and nondurable goods new orders to \$6,194.4 million from \$6,206.4 million. Seasonally-adjusted unfilled orders rose 3.1% to \$12,992.0 million from \$12,604.4 million.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted: \$20,144.9 million, up 1.2% from \$19,904.9 million. Total inventory held, seasonally adjusted, rose 1.1% to \$21,155.3 million from \$20,933.5 million with increases of 1.2%, 1.1% and 0.2% in raw materials, goods in process and finished products.

The seasonally-adjusted October ratio of total inventory owned to shipments was 1.73:1, as in September, and the finished products to shipments ratio also matched September's 0.59:1.

# Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from January-October farming operations totalled \$9,872.5 million compared with \$8,546.8 million in 1977. October wholesale trading rose 21.0% to \$5,518,454,000 from \$4,560,867,000 in 1977. Wholesale inventories: \$8,261,992,000, up 11.3% from \$7,422,833,000.

#### Consumer Credit

October consumer credit, holders reporting monthly, rose 5.7% to \$28,091 million from a year earlier. Outstanding balances with percentage changes:

- Chartered banks' personal loans: \$21,706 million, up 17.8%.
- Québec savings banks' personal leaves \$102 million, up 17.2%.
- Life insurance companies' policy loans' \$1,329 million, up 4.2%.
- Sales finance and consumer loan companies' loans: small \$174 million, down 13.0%; large \$1,486 million, up 1.9%; instalment sales paper, \$1,157 million, up 5.2%.
- Department stores and turniture, TV, radio and household appliance stores: \$1,525 million, up 11.5%.
- Trust and mortgage companies' personal loans: \$612 million, up 70.5%.

Credit holders reporting quarterly: \$6,940 million at end of third quarter 1978, up 15.5% from a year earlier. Credit unions and caisses populaires, the largest quarterly reporters, had balances outstanding of \$5,232 million, up 18.1% (also included in the quarterly total: other retail stores, other credit-card issuers and public utilities).

Including quarterly reporters, consumer credit outstanding at the end of third quarter 1978 totalled \$34,496 million, up 14.7% from July-September 1977.

# Coal/Coke Statistics

September coal production increased 4.7% to 2,761,876 tons (2 505 532 metric tonnes) from 2,636,612 (2 391 894) a year earlier. Year-to-date production: 24,485,115 tons (22 212 523 metric tonnes), up 4.0%. Imports decreased to 1,328,379 tons (1 205 176 metric tonnes) from 2,176,733 (1 974 699). Industrial consumers used 1,845,237 tons (1 673 971 metric tonnes) of coal, up 111,189 (100 869) from 1977, and 502,547 tons (455 903 metric tonnes) of coke, up 187,019 (169 661).

#### Radio Broadcasting

Gross August radio air-time sales: \$6.5 million, up 20.4% from \$5.4 million in 1977. After deduction of agency and other commissions sales totalled \$5.5 million, up 19.6% from \$4.6 million. Net local sales rose 21.8% to \$17.3 million from \$14.2 million.

Over eight months gross sales rose 15.3% to \$201.9 million from \$175.1 million in 1977. Net sales: 14.9% to \$187.9 million from \$163.5 million.

Restaurants throughout Canada increased their October receipts a total of 8.7% to \$235.2 million from a year earlier. Breakdown per province: Ontario \$84.5 million 46 Québec \$73.6 million (8.1%), British Columbia, Yukon and Territories \$29.4 million (13.3%), Alberta \$18.6 million (15.0%), Manitoba \$13.1 million (3.2%), Saskatchewan \$6.7 million (5.8%), New Brunswick \$2.9 million (10.8%), Nova Scotia \$4.8 million (8.0%), Newfoundland \$1.2 million (14.2%) and Prince Edward Island \$419,000 (1.0%).

#### **Department Store Sales**

Department store sales rose 12.3% to \$649.7 million in October from \$578.6 million in 1977. Sales rose in 37 of 40 departments, largest increases coming in fur stores (33.1%), plumbing, heating and building materials (24.2%) and men's and boys' footwear (23.9%). All provinces reported increased sales ranging from 16.5% for Nova Scotia to 2.7% for Prince Edward Island. Sales and percentage increases for metropolitan areas were: Montréal \$76.6 million (13.8%), Toronto \$99.4 million (13.3%), Winnipeg \$30.9 million (6.1%) and Vancouver \$61.6 million (12.3%).

# Sales Financing

# Marriages/Divorces, 1977
