Employment/Population Ratio Starting this month, an Employment/Population Ratio — the percentage of the working age population employed at a particular time — is published in the Labour Force Information and in The Labour Force (Cat. No. 71-001). A more complete definition and historical data are provided in an article in the January 1978 issue of The Labour Force.

Employment in January reached 9,478,000 compared with 9,255,000 in January 1977. Unemployment was 991,000 and the unemployment rate was 9.5 (889,000 and 8.8 in January 1977). The participation rate was 60.0 (59.4) and the employment/population ratio 54.3 (54.2).

The seasonally-adjusted level of employment: 9,866,000, an increase of 24,000 from December 1977. The level increased by 26,000 for women (15,000 for women 15-24 and 11,000 for women 25 and over). That for men showed little change. The 524sonally-adjusted level increased in Ontario (14,000), New Brunswick (6,000) and British Columbia (5,000) and decreased in Québec (13,000). The level showed little or no change in other provinces.


The seasonally-adjusted unemployment level: 891,000 in January, a decrease of 20,000 from December. The level declined for men 15-24 (9,000), for men 25 and over (4,000) and for women 25 and over (8,000). The level increased slightly for women 15-24.

The seasonally-adjusted level of unemployment decreased in Ontario (7,000), New Brunswick (3,000), Alberta (3,000) and Newtoundland (2,000) and increased by 2,000 in Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan. The level showed little or no change in the remaining provinces.

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate decreased 0.2 to 8.3. This is the first decline in the rate since May 1977. The rate declined 0.4 to 15.8 for men 15-24, 0.3 to 7.5 for women 25 and over and 0.1 to 13.9 for women 15-24. The rate for men 25 and over remained at 5.0. By province, the rate decreased 1.3 to 12.7 in New Brunswick, 1.0 to 16.0 in Newfoundland, 0.4 to 10.7 in Prince Edward Island, 0.3 to 4.2 in Alberta and 0.1 to 6.9 in Ontario. It increased 0.5 to 10.7 in Nova Scotia, 0.4 to 5.4 in Saskatchewan, 0.1 to 11.4 in Québec and 0.1 to 8.7 in British Columbia. The rate remained at 6.2 in Manitoba.

population ratio was 56.5, the same as December. The ratio declined by 0.2 to 57.4 for men 15-24 and by 0.2 to 76.8 for men 25 and over. It increased by 0.7 to 49.4 for women 15-24 and remained at 39.4 for women 25 and over.



Radio Air Time Sales

Gross national radio air-time sales rose 16.1% to \$6.5 million in September from \$5.6 million in 1976. Agency and other commissions reduced sales to \$5.5 million, up 14.6% from \$4.8 million. Net local sales rose 10.7% to \$15.5 million from \$14.0 million.

Gross sales, January-September, were \$195.9 million, up 11.6% from \$175.5 million for 1976 and net sales rose 7.5% to \$181.9 million from \$169.2 million.

Railway Freight, 3rd Quarter

Railways hauled 71.5 million short tons (64.8 million t) of revenue freight in July-September, 1977, up 1.6% over the corresponding 1976 quarter. Increased traffic came in three of seven major categories: food/feed/beverages/tobacco up 16.2%, fabricated materials, up 5.8% and less-than-carload goods/small package freight 0.2%. Small live animals registered the largest percentage decrease, 41.3%, end products were off 13.3%, special traffic 3.7% and crude materials 2.2%.

Loadings, bar receipts from all foreign connections, gained 2.0%. Provinces registered decreases in volume were: Newfoundland (8.0%), Prince Edward Island (36.6%), Québec (2.2%), Ontario (5.3%), Manitoba (1.3%) and British Columbia (1.1%). Nova Scotia rose 36.8%, New Brunswick 1.1%, Saskatchewan 24.7%, Alberta 6.7% and the Territories 32.4%.



Egg production decreased 0.7% to 36.5 million dozen in December from 36.7 million a year earlier.

Railway Carloadings

Railways loaded 17.8 million short tons (16.2 million t) of revenue freight in December, down 0.6% from a year earlier. Goods from the United States, 1.5 million short tons (1.4 million t), were down 16.7%. Loadings for the year totalled 251.1 million short tons (227.8 million t) up 4.1% from 1976. Rail receipts from U.S. connections were down 5.6%.

Gains in the year were recorded in agricultural products (up 9.8%), forest products (6.3%), mine products (3.6%) and manufactured and miscellaneous goods (0.8%). Animal products fell 17.4%.

Mental Health Statistics

Psychiatric inpatient facilities reported 129,397 admissions in 1977, up 2% from 1976. Separations rose 2% to 131,650. Patients still registered at year's end totalled 48,238. Males accounted for 51% of admissions and 58% of those still registered.

TV/Radio Production

Manufacturers of household radio and TV receivers shipped \$253.6 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1976, down 7.3% from 1975. Value added decreased 16.0% to \$111.5 million, employees decreased 9.8% to 6,347 and salaries and wages increased 3.4% to \$68.4 million.

An estimated 1,201,564,000lbs. of milk were produced in November, 9.5% more than 1976. Production during eleven months rose 0.3% to 15,875,637,000lbs. from a year earlier.

Industry Selling Price Index

The Industry Selling Price Index for Manufacturing rose 0.2% to 177.8 in December from November's 177.5. The Index rose 7.4% from December 1976 (165.6). Commonents:

The 0.8% rise in the food and beverage index was due largely to increases of 1.8% for slaughtering and meat processors, 8.1% for cane and beet sugar processors, 0.7% for dairy products, 1.2% for feed and 1.2% for fish products.

 A decrease of 1.4% for pulp and paper mills was mainly responsible for a 1.1% decline in the paper and allied products index.

 Increase of 1.2% in the wood products index came largely from a 2.2% rise in sawmills and planing mills.

 The 0.3% decline in the primary metals index was attributable primarily to a decrease of 1.1% for smelting and refining.

Motor Vehicle Manufacturers

Motor vehicle manufacturers shipped \$7,071.0 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1976, up 17.4% from 1975. Total value added increased 3.9% to \$1,826.1 million. Employees increased 4.0% to 47,078 and total salaries and wages 17.3% to \$783.9 million.

Sales of farm implements and equipment dropped 5.1% to \$1,076.7 million in 1977 from \$1,134.1 million in 1976. Repair part sales rose 2.7% to \$160.4 million from \$154.7 million

Manufacturers of major appliances shipped \$546.8 million worth of products of own manufacture in 1976, up 8.5% from 1975 Value added increased 22.4% to \$292.0 million, employees increased 1.1% to 11,888 and salaries and wages increased 1.3% to \$138.0 million.

Salt

Shipments of salt and salt content of brine decreased to 746,403 short tons in December from 806,326 a year earlier bringing the 12 months' output to 6,656,504 short tons 5,607,275 in 1976.

Corporation Taxes, 1975

Income taxes declared by corporations (bar insurance carriers and credit unions) rose 7% to \$7,003 million for the 1975 taxation year from \$6,559 million for 1974. Regionally, fastest growth of taxable income came in Alberta, up 57%.

Preliminary estimates based on partial data are now available for 1976 taxable income and its provincial allocation. These show a decrease of \$217 million to \$17,240 million and reflect in large part sluggish corporation profits and influence of the 25% resource allowance (effective January 1976).

Farm Input Price Indexes

The Farm Input Price Index rose 0.4% in the fourth quarter to 248.2 from 247.2 (revised) in the third quarter (the 1977 rise: 5.5%). The eastern index declined 0.4% to 241.8 from 242.7 (revised) and the western index rose 1.2% to 255.6 from 252.5 (revised). In the latest 12 months the Index rose 5.4% in the east and 5.6% in the west.

Attomobile production totalled 82,173 in December (89,588 in December 1976). January-to-December: 1,162,519 against 1,137,313. Commercial vehicles totalled 49,294 (41,522). Year-to-date: 612,926 against 502,799.

International Travel, 1977

December saw 1.5 million United States visitors, almost at December 1976's rate. Residents returning from the U.S. decreased 1.4% to 2.2 million. Visitors from other countries decreased 1.9% to 68,600. Residents returning from these countries rose 7.0% to 81,800.

U.S. visitors in 1977 totalled 31.8 million, down 1.4% from 1976. Residents returning from the U.S. increased to 37.9 million, up 5.5%. Visitors from other countries decreased 9.7% to 1.4 million and residents returning from these countries rose 12.3% to 1.8 million.


