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Job Vacancies

November, December, January saw the average number of vacant jobs drop from the previous three-month period and from the comparable period a year earlier. Vacancies for full-time, part-time and casual jobs declined 29% to 35,700 from 50,500 in August-October and 5% (2,000) from the three-month period a year ago.

Vacancies for full-time jobs decreased 26% to 32,300 from the preceding period. Vacancies of four weeks and more declined 24% to 11,700.

For every 1,000 existing jobs four were vacant, down two from August-October (no change from a year ago). Highest vacancy rates came in Alberta (eight per 1,000) and Manitoba (five per 1,000) with the lowest rate (three per 1,000) bedevilling Newfoundland and New Brunswick.


GNP: Expenditures

Major source of strength in Gross National Product, 1977, was external demand. Real exports were 7.7% higher than in 1976 and. with real imports increasing only 2.0%, real net exports (real exports less real imports) contributed more than one percentage point to the increase in real GNP. Real personal expenditure and real government current expenditure on goods and services grew at rates well below their long-term averages, real gross fixed capital formation declined and inventory investment fell substanially.

In real terms, personal expenditure increased 2.8% in 1977 with the largest percentage increase (5.2%) in spending on services, reflecting higher net expenditure abroad and a large increase in spending on financial and legal services. Growth in durable expenditure fell to 2.4% from 5.4% in 1976 with the largest decline in spending on household appliances. Expenditure on semi-durable goods increased 1.0% as real expenditure on household furnishings was unchanged from the previous year and spending on clothing and footwear decliled Expenditure on non-durables was up 17% reflecting marginal growth in energy products as well as food, beverages and tobacco.

December's seasonally-adjusted value of cuilding permits issued by municipalities tose 17.3% to \$1,168 million from \$996 million in 1976, the highest level ever attained. Reflecting the residential permit activity in western Canada, December exceeded November's \$1,120 million level by 4.4%.

The year 1977 closed with current-dollar value of permits rising 1.8% to \$12,423 million from \$12,200 million in 1976. Moderate increases marked the housing and institutional sectors (both benefitting from government intervention) but the private business sector remained weak.

During December, building permits issued for single, detached homes levelled off at a seasonally-adjusted rate of 8,514 (8,601 in November) and the number of authorized multiple dwellings rose to 17,323, a substantial increase over 14,744 approved in November. The value of residential permits totalled a record \$810 million (\$727 million in November). Nonresidential permits, however, were down again, dropping 8.7% to \$359 million from \$393 million in November, a moderate increase in new industrial building projects from \$83 million to \$90 million) being more than offset by decreases in the commercial sector (from \$202 million to \$190 million) and the public sector (from \$108 million to \$78 million).

Regionally, only Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and Alberta enjoyed increased building permit (real) activity during 1977. In the other provinces moderate increases in the value of new construction were offset by price changes (Nova Scotia, Ontario, Saskatchewan) or the value of permits issued in effect decreased (New Brunswick, Québec, Manitoba, British Columbia).

Residential Building Construction Input Price Indexes, January 1978

Input Price Indexes for residential building construction in January 1978 saw the December level of 180.8 rise 0.6% to 181.9 with an 8.2% increase from the 169.7 level a year earlier.

Regionally, the Atlantic provinces level rose 1.2% to 192.0 from December's 189.8, Québec's rose the same to 184.7 from 182.6, Ontario's sank marginally to 175.6 from 175.9, the Prairie provinces went up 1.1% to 192.0 from 189.9 and British Columbia sustained the biggest increase, 1.3% to 181.7 from 179.4

Number of Children at Home by Age Groups, 1976


Census 1976 found 8,886,745 children in families in private households, a decrease of 276,355 from Census 1971. Distribution of children living at home by age group showed that, nationally, 41.4% were 6 to 14, 23.0% were under 6, 16.6% were 18 to 24, 14.9% were 15 to 17 and 4.1% were 25 and over. This ranking of age groups is comparable at the provincial level. However, in Saskatchewan, Alberta and the Yukon and Northwest Territories there were more children in the 15-17 year age group than the 18-24 year age group.



Manufacturers' December domestic sales of "Made in Canada" TVs reached 21,673 sets, little more than half the 40,485 sold in December 1976.

Sales Financing

Sales finance companies purchased \$227.0 million of retail finance paper during December, down 3.7% from \$235.8 million in December 1976. Total purchases comprised \$35.6 million for automobiles, \$36.9 million for other consumer goods, \$86.1 million for commercial vehicles and \$68.4 million for other commercial and industrial goods. Wholesale financing undertaken during the third quarter totalled \$1,706.8 million, up 13.2% from \$1,507.2 million a year earlier.

Oil Pipeline Transport

Lines received 2.820,100 B/D (448 142 m3D) of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum product in December, up 0.2% from 2,813,200 B/D (447 062 m3D) a year earlier. Receipts of domestic petroleum and products decreased 0.4% to 2,488,500 B/D (395 448 m3D) and imported petroleum and products receipts increased 5.3% to 331,600 B/D (52 695 m3D).

International Travel

January United States visitors dropped 7.3% to 1.1 million from January 1977. Canadian residents returning from the U.S. fell 3.3% to 2.2 million. Visitors from other countries rose 1.4% to 40,200 and Canadian residents returning from abroad declined 2.2% to 189,600.

October-December developments decreased the seasonally-adjusted current account deficit to \$692 million from \$1,220 million in the previous quarter. A balance of lymonts deficit measured by net official noneary movements stood at \$291 million which with a net capital inflow of \$443 million, financed a current account deficit (unadjusted for seasonal variations) of \$734 million.

A small increase in the current account deficit to \$4,238 million marked 1977 as a whole. (A \$1.9 billion drop from 1976 in net capital inflow to \$2,817 million required additional financing to meet the deficit through a reduction in official reserves of \$1,421 million.)

Main features of 1977 include:

- The virtual tripling of the merchandise trade surplus to \$2,907 million which was more than offset by a \$2.0 billion increase in the deficit on non-merchandise transactions
- Within the non-merchandise account, increases of \$900 million and about \$500 million in net payments of interest/dividends and on travel account
- New issues sold abroad of \$5,778 million, down \$3.8 billion from a record 1976 level
- Return to a net inflow for long-term direct investment from foreign sources totalling \$410 million
- Not outflow of \$790 million for direct investment abroad, up more than 40% from 1976
- Theofold increase to \$532 million in the cutflow to expand export credits granted directly or indirectly at risk of the federal government
- Sharp reduction to \$422 million in the net inflow from non-residents for the acquisition of Canadian money market instruments
- Doubling of the net outflow, to \$497 million, for the acquisition of non-bank holdings of short-term funds abroad
- Decline of US\$1,236 million in the level of official international reserves to US\$4,607 million at year's end
- Depreciation of the dollar vis-à-vis the U.S. dollar, plus a weighted average of 7.8% and 9.4% of the currencies of our major trading partners as the Canadian dollar proceeded to depreciate even more sharply against overseas currencies than against the U.S. dollar.

YEAR BOOK SPECIAL EDITION BRIDGES CHANGE TO METRIC SYSTEM

Canada Year Book 1976-77 reviews economic, social and political developments. This special issue covers information for two years and bridges our transition to metric measure from imperial measure. Textual and table use of imperial measure is accompanied by the metric equivalents and a special article on the inove to metric is accompanied by a table of factors for conversion of weights and measures in the imperial and United States systems to the International System (SI) of metric measurement. Use of colour coding makes plain the difference between imperial and metric tables. (Future Year Books will carry metric-only measurements concerning the many social and economic areas where conversion has been completed.) The current volume's 1,100 pages also cover two years of change and development in agriculture, banking, culture, communications, education, energy, federal and provincial governments, health, housing, incomes, labour, manufacturing, merchandising, population, resources, scientific reasearch and transportation. Appendices include information on recent legislation, national events, honours, plus a list of books about Canada.

Telecommunication Statistics

Teleglobe Canada, Canadian National Telecommunications and Canadian Pacific (Telecommunications Branch) quarterly revenues rose 3.0% from third quarter 1976 to \$73.8 million in 1977. Operating expenses were \$63.2 million, an increase of 16.4%. Net operating revenue reached \$10.5 million, down 39.2% from the third quarter of 1976.

Gross National Expenditure

The implicit price index for non-residential construction had a relatively modest fourth quarter 1977 increase, largely because of weak building material price increases. The implicit price index for personal expenditure, however, rose 1.8%, with the largest increase in the non-durable goods implicit price index. The implicit price index for GNE rose 1.0%.

Phonograph Records/Tapes

Manufacturers produced 5,033,099 phonograph records in January compared with 4,298,592 in January 1977. Production of pre-recorded tapes (8-track cartridges, cassettes) rose 15.4% to 934,654.

Electric Power

November net generation of electricity increased to 28.4 TW.h from 26.1 TW.h in 1976. Hydro generation increased 14.4%, thermal production decreased 3.9%.

Radio Air-Time Sales

Gross national radio air-time sales rose 4.8% to \$8.8 million in October from \$8.4 million in 1976. Agency and other commissions reduced gross national sales to \$7.4 million, up 4.2% from \$7.1 million. Net local air-time sales rose 7.8% to \$16.6 million from \$15.4 million a year earlier.

Sales 1977 to date reached \$222.2 million, an increase of 11.1%. Net sales rose 11.0% to \$206.2 million.

Provincial Finance

Financial assets of provincial and territorial governments as at March 31, 1975, and as at March 31, 1975, and as at March 31, 1976, amounted to \$24,380 million and \$28,658 million for an increase of \$4,278 million or 17.5% between these dates. Their liabilities amounted to \$25,024 million in 1975 and \$30,964 million in 1976 for an increase of \$5,940 million (23.7%).
