### Retall Trade


Seasonally-adjusted retail sales, January, totalled \$5,537.4 million, up 2.1% from \$5,421.6 million in December, Sales increased in 17 of 28 trade groups. Household appliance stores (15.2%), grocery, confectionery and sundries stores (11.9%) and florists (11.3%) recorded largest increases and general stores (7.9%) the largest decrease. Eight provinces recorded increased sales ranging from 10.8% for Newfoundland to 0.2% for Nova Scotia. The only decreases were in Ontario (0.3%) and New Brunswick (0.1%).

Retail trade without seasonal adjustment reached \$4,487.9 million, 9.7% over January 1977. Sates increased in 25 of 28 trade groups. Largest gains: book and stationery stores (24.2%) and florists (23.3%). All provinces recorded increased sales over January, 1977, ranging from 16.9% for Alberta to 7.9% for Saskatchewan. Montréal sales rose 5.5%; Toronto, 11.1%; Winnipeg, 10.8%; and Vancouver, 12.4%.

Revised total trade, unadjusted for decisional influences for December 1977 \$8,835.6 million, up 8.3% from December 1976.

#### Real Domestic Product

The .seasonally-adjusted index of real domestic product declined 0.3% to 128.6 in January from a level of 129.0 in December. The index of industrial production declined 1.1% in December. Goods-producing industries decreased 1.4%, service-producing industries rose 0.4%.

In goods-producing, substantial decreases came in agriculture, forestry, construction, mining and manufacturing. Most significant declines hit the manufacturing sector where, although non-durable manufacturing industries were unchanged from the December level, durable manufacturing industries dropped 2.2%. In nondurable manufacturing, increases were recorded by manufacturers of food and beverage products, leather products, petroleum and coal products, chemicals and chemical products and by printing, publisning and allied industries. Durable manufacturing's decrease was attributable to a sharp decline in transportation equipment, electrical products and non-metallic mineral products. A major factor was reduced production of motor vehicles.

In service-producing, transportation, storage and communication, trade, community, business and personal services, and public administration and defence services all recorded increases; finance, insurance and real estate services declined slightly. In trade, both wholesale and retail registered substantial gains — retail trade almost recovered to the high November level with increases in food stores, motor vehicle dealers, clothing stores and furniture, television, radio and appliance stores.



## Gold Production, Canada



#### Mineral Production

January silver production rose to 3,326,673 troy ounces from 3,119,831 in January 1977. Production of refined lead decreased to 15,955 short tons from 17,903. Refined zinc: 37,824 short tons (53,374). Primary copper: 62,605 short tons (79,174). Primary nickel: 17,786 short tons (24,196). Gold: 134,207 troy ounces (137,710).

### Radio Air-Time Sales

Gross national radio air-time sales were \$7.3 million in November, a decrease of 1.4% from \$7.4 million in 1976. Agency and other commissions reduced sales to \$6.2 million, down 1.6% from \$6.3 million a year earlier. Net local sales rose 3.1% to \$16.4 million from \$15.9 million.

Gross sales for 1977 rose 20.3% to \$246.8 million from \$223.8 million in 1976. Net sales: 10.1% to \$229.1 million from \$208.0 million.

#### Wholesale Index

The General Wholesale Index rose 1.4% to 580.0 in January from its revised December level of 571.9 and was 8.8% higher than in January 1977 (532.9).

The wood products index rose 1.7% due mainly to increases of 4.3% for fir and 3.6% for cedar.

The animal products index showed an increase of 2.1% attributable largely to advances of 3.3% for livestock, 1.5% for milk and its products, 1.9% for fish, and 1.6% for fresh meats.

# Consumer Price Index Regional Cities

January to February, consumer price index increases rose from 0.1% in Thunder Bay to 1.1% in Winnipeg. Prices for food, notably fresh produce, pork products, bread and soft drinks, with prices for new cars, were largely responsible for the advances. Other important contributing factors: shelter charges, automobile registration fees in some cities and clothing prices. Prices for beef and chicken generally declined.

Monthly increases, with annual increases in brackets: St. John's 0.6% (7.9%), Halifax 0.6% (8.3%), Saint John 0.7% (8.2%), Québec 0.7% (8.0%), Montréal 0.8% (8.3%), Ottawa 0.5% (8.3%), Toronto 0.2% (8.3%), Thunder Bay 0.1% (8.7%), Winnipeg 1.1% (8.6%), Saskatoon 0.2% (9.2%), Regina 0.7% (10.2%), Edmonton 0.4% (9.3%), Calgary 0.9% (8.5%) and Vancouver 0.4% (7.2%).

#### International Indebtedness, 1975

Canada's balance of international indebtedness rose by \$7 billion to \$42.3 billion at the end of 1975, almost double the growth of \$3.6 billion registered in the previous year. The balance of international indebtedness represents the amount by which Canada's outstanding liabilities or obligations to other countries exceed Canada's assets or claims against other countries. Following increases of 11% and 7% in 1974 and 1973 net indebtedness expanded sharply by 20%. At 1975 year-end, Canada's gross liabilities, the amount owing to other countries in long-term and short-term forms, stood at \$82.8 billion, an increase of 14% over 1974. This was offset partially by \$40.5 billion in gross assets, the total amount owing to Canada by non-residents. which grew by 8% from \$37.5 billion.

### Wholesale Trade

Sales by wholesale in January were estimated at \$4,166,960,000, a 13.7% rise from \$3,665,423,000 in January 1977. Wholesale inventories: \$7,613,493,000, 6,7% over inventories of \$7,137,288,000.

#### Consumer Credit

Consumer credit totalled \$24,750 million at the end of January, 11.6% more than a year earlier. Outstanding balances, selected credit holders, with percentage change from a year earlier:

Chartered banks' personal loans: 518,801 million, up 15.2%.

 Québec savings banks' personal loans: \$87 million, up 20.8%.

 Life insurance companies' policy loans: \$1,285 million, up 4.0%.

Sales finance and consumer loan companies' loans: small \$202 million, down 12.2%; large \$1,445 million, down 3.2%; instalment sales paper \$1,069 million, down 4.8%.

 Department, furniture, TV, radio and household appliance stores: \$1,309 million, up 7.0%.

 Trust and mortgage loan companies' personal loans: \$368 million, up 26.5%.

Quarterly reporters held outstanding balances of \$6,434 million at the end of the fourth quarter of 1977, up 15.0% from a year earlier. The largest, credit unions and caisses populaires: \$4,568 million, up 17.6%. Including quarterly reporters, outstanding balances, fourth quarter, totalled \$31,234 million, up 12.6%.

#### Rubber Products industry, 1976


Value of rubber products shipments-ofown-manufacture rose 20.9% to \$1,200 million in 1976 from 1975. Value added rose 15.3% to \$652.4 million and employees increased 3.0% to 28,255.

#### industry Selling Price

The Industry Selling Price Index for Manufacturing rose to 180.2 in January, a 1.2% increase from its revised December level of 178.0 and 7.6% higher than in January 1977 (167.5). Groups having the most effect were food and beverage industries and wood industries.

The food and beverage industries index rose 0.9% from increases of 1.4% for slaughtering and meat processors, 1.2% for dairy products and 1.8% for the feed industry. The wood industries index rose 3.7% attributable mainly to a rise of 4.7% in the index for sawmills and planing mills.

# Homicide/Murder

Homicide in 1977 rose 3.8% compared with the 1976 rate of incidents. The rate of murder incidents increased 2.5%. Homicide incidents fell from 633 in 1975 to 614 in 1976, rising to 644 last year. The rate of homicide offences rose 6.6% from 1976 and was the same as the 1975 rate. The rate of murder offences (as one component of homicides) increased 1.5%.

#### Index of Industrial Production

The seasonally-adjusted Index of Industrial Production decreased 1.1% in January to 124.2 from 125.6 in December. Mining (5.3% to 105.7) and manufacturing (1.1% to 123.1) declined; utilities (2.5% to 158.1) increased. Non-durable manufacturing saw no change at 120.9 (Durable: down 2.2% to 125.3).
