## Gross National Product

The Gross National Product. seasonally adjusted at annual rates, rose $1.9 \%$ in the fourth quarter to a level of $\$ 214.7$ billion. In real terms GNP grew 0.8\%. Exports rose $4.7 \%$ in volume terms and real imports fell 1.5\%.

The drop in import volume was caused in part by a $0.6 \%$ decline in final domestic demand, with declines in personal expenditure, government current expenditure and gross fixed capital formation.
Fourth quarter movements lett 1977 up 9.3\% trom 1976. This translates into a real increase of $2.6 \%$ compared with $4.9 \%$ in 1976.

The changes from the fourth quarter of 1976 illustrate the extent to which the real sei tor of the economy was dominated in 1077 by the decline in the international ratue of the Canadian dollar and the price movements which resulted from it.

## Labour Income

December labour income rose $6.0 \%$ from 1976's $\$ 9,565.2$ million to $\$ 10,140.4$ million and at annual levels labour income rose $\$ 10.7$ billion (almost $10 \%$ ) from $\$ 107.6$ billion in 1976 to $\$ 118.3$ biltion in 1977.
Preliminary estimates for wages and salaries were: service, $\$ 2,402.4$ million; manufacturing, $\$ 2.097 .4$ million: trade. \$1.288.6 million; transportation, communication and other utilities, $\$ 977.3$ million; public administration and defence, $\$ 870.3$ million; construction, $\$ 701.4$ million; finance, insurance and real estate, $\$ 608.8$ million; mining. $\$ 244.6$ million; torestry. $\$ 103.6$ million: and agriculture, $\$ 66.4$ million.
Supplementary income for December reached $\$ 767.7$ million.

## Statement of Trade

Exports and imports, seasonally adjusted on a balance-of-payments basis, fell sharply in January compared with the substantial increases in the preceding month. Unusually severe winter weather conditions in Canada and abroad contributed to the decline. Exports dropped $16.9 \%$ to $\$ 3,525$ million (slightly higher than the November total) and imports declined $15.5 \%$ to $\$ 3,219$ million (a shade under November). At $\$ 306$ million, the merchandise trade surplus stood $29.7 \%$ below the revised surplus of $\$ 435$ million for December.

Following a rise of some $17.5 \%$ in December, January exports to the United States, on a Customs basis and seasonallyadjusted, declined nearly $8 \%$ to $\$ 2.747$ million. This total corresponded with about the average level for the final quarter of 1977. Value of shipments at $\$ 8,267$ million for the three months ending in January was, however, $6 \%$ higher than exports for the August-October period.

After a sharp recovery in December. seasonally-adjusted exports to overseas countries fell some $38.5 \%$ to $\$ 779.5$ million, the smallest total in the past 12 months. The relative drop in exports for the months of November-January to $\$ 2,888$ million was about half as great. This decline was distributed $10.5 \%$ to the European Economic Community, $21.5 \%$ to Japan and $68 \%$ to the remaining countries.
Following an increase of $11 \%$ in December, Customs basis, seasonally-adjusted imports from the U.S. dropped roughly $12.5 \%$ to $\$ 2,280$ million in January, which was a shade below the total for the same month in 1977. Imports for the latest threemonth period declined more moderately: to $\$ 7.233$ million from $\$ 7,380$ million in the months of August-October.

At $\$ 948$ million, seasonally-adjusted imports from overseas countries stood about $23.5 \%$ below the high December total and also slightly under the November rate. Imports in the months of NovemberJanuary fellless drastically to $\$ 3,143$ million from $\$ 3.310$ million in the preceding threemonth period.

Exports and imports for the three months ending in January dropped from the period preceding but much less sharply than in the latest single month. Exports declined $2.2 \%$ to $\$ 11,234$ million, and imports $3.3 \%$ to $\$ 10,283$ million. The surplus rose $10.3 \%$ to $\$ 951$ million from $\$ 862$ million in AugustOctober

## Inventorles/Shipments / Orders

Shipments (manufacturing) for 1977 reached an estimated $\$ 109,798.3$ million, up $11.4 \%$ from 1976's $\$ 98,597.3$ million. December's shipments fell $6.6 \%$ from the revised November value of $\$ 9,828.4$ million to $\$ 9,181.2$ million.

Seasonally-adjusted shipments reached a level of $\$ 9,688.7$ million, $4.1 \%$ above the revised November level of $\$ 9,307.8$ million. Durable goods industries' shipments rose $2.8 \%$ to $\$ 4,412.6$ million from $\$ 4,290.5$ million and those of non-durable goods industries increased $5.2 \%$ to $\$ 5,276.1$ million from $\$ 5,017.3$ million. New orders in all manufacturing industries, seasonally adjusted, rose $2.1 \%$ to $\$ 9,681.0$ million from $\$ 9,482.4$ million in November. Durable goods new orders dropped $1.6 \%$ to $\$ 4,370.2$ million from $\$ 4.442 .7$ million and non-durable goods new orders increased $5.4 \%$ to $\$ 5,310.8$ million from $\$ 5,039.7$ million.

Unfilled orders, seasonally adjusted, fell to $\$ 10.815 .6$ million, $0.1 \%$ below the revised November level of $\$ 10,823.3$ million. Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted, fell to $\$ 18,510.2$ million, $0.3 \%$ below the revised November level of $\$ 18,573.1$ million. Total inventory held, seasonally adjusted, estimated at $\$ 19,672.9$ million, fractionally below the revised November level of $\$ 19,702.9$ million, saw decreases of $0.4 \%$ and $1.6 \%$ in raw materials and finished products and an increase of $2.0 \%$ in goods in process.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned to shipments stood at 1.91:1 against 2.00:1 as revised for November.

Finished products to shipments ratio was $0.66: 1$ compared with the revised November ratio, 0.70:1

## Automobile Fabric Accessories

The automobile fabric accessories industry shipped $\$ 305.5$ million worth of products of own manufacture in 1976, up $34.5 \%$ from 1975. Value added increased $39.0 \%$ to $\$ 138.2$ million, employees increased 14.7\% to 5,557 and total salaries and wages increased $29.8 \%$ to $\$ 73.4$ million.

## FAMILIES AND PERSONS IN FAMILIES IN PRIVATE HOUSEHOLDS

On June 1. 1976, the total of families in private households stood at 5.727.895, up $13.4 \%$ from 1971 's $5,053,170$. The number of persons in families increased $5.3 \%$ from 18.8 million to 19.8 million. This increase was accompanied by a decrease in the average number of persons per family - from 3.7 to 3.5. ## Unemployment Insurance Statistics

Some 824,000 persons paid unemployment insurance benefits for week ending December 10 rose 20\% from November, 13\% from a year earlier. Beneficiaries reporting some work earnings during December totatled 7\%.

Net benefit paid amounted to $\$ 318$ million, up $1 \%$ from the previous month, and 17\% from 1976. Net coverage for 1977 rose 1部 over 1976 to $\$ 3,885$ miltion.

Average weekly benefit rose $9 \%$ from jocember 1976 to $\$ 101.00$ and the number $t$ weeks of benefit increased 7\%.
Slairns filed reached 317.000 in Decemher, down marginally from November. Normally, the claim load rises in Oecember: percentage increases from 1971 to 1976 ranged from $3 \%$ to $31 \%$ between these two months. Compared with a year earlier, a 4\% rise was recorded. Claims for the calendar year 1977 reached $2,806,000$. up $5 \%$ over 1976.

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## Real Domestic Product

In 1977, Real Domestic Product increased $2.8 \%$ from 124.2 to 127.7. The Index of Industrial Production rose $3.3 \%$ to 124.5 . Real Domestic Product less agriculture recorded an increase of $3.0 \%$. Goodsproducing industries advanced $2.0 \%$ against a $3.3 \%$ increase in serviceproducing industries.

The seasonally-adjusted Index of Real Domestic Product increased 0.7\% to 128.7 in the fourth quarter of 1977 from 127.8 in the third quarter. The Index of Industrial Production increased $0.7 \%$ in the fourth quarter. Goods-producing industries were up $0.4 \%$, while service-producing industries advanced 0.9\%.

The seasonally-adjusted index of Real Domestic Product advanced $0.1 \%$ to 129.0 in December from 128.9 in November. The Index of Industrial Production increased $0.2 \%$ in December. Goods-producing industries were up $0.2 \%$ and serviceproducing industries were unchanged from the November tevel.

## Import/Export, Price/Volume

Fourth quarter 1977 saw the Import Price Index (current weighted) increase 1.5\% over the third quarter, down significantly from $6.8 \%$ and $3.0 \%$ increases in first and second quarters of the year.

As a result of weight shifts the Export Price Index showed no change in the fourth quarter. (Excluding weight-shift effects the index rose significantly less than in the first iwo quarters.)

For the year import prices increased $10 \%$, export prices $6 \%$.

Import volume was at about the same level as the third quarter, still substantially lower than in the first half year. Export volume increased 4\% over the third quarter, its highest level since 1971.

Volume of imports for the year was $2 \%$ higher than 1976 and export volume increased 9\%.

## Average Earnings

Average weekly earnings rose $8.6 \% 10$ $\$ 254.06$ in December from $\$ 233.99$ in 1976. Average hourly earnings in manufacturing reached $\$ 6.62$ (from $\$ 6.02$ ), in construction $\$ 10.09(\$ 8.96)$ and in mining $\$ 8.51$ ( $\$ 7.85$ ).

First estimates show average weekly earnings were highest in British Columbia ( $\$ 28467$ ) and followed by Alberta $(\$ 263.13)$, Ontario (\$254.41), Québec (\$249.87), Newfoundland (\$242.65), Saskatchewan (\$241.84). Manitoba (\$229.77), New Brunswick (\$227.56), Nova Scotia (\$214.88) and Prince Edward Island (\$196.10).

Average weekly earnings by industry division were: construction, $\$ 355.65$, mining. $\$ 359.73$ : forestry. $\$ 252.01$ : transportation, communication and other utilities, \$297.69; manufacturing, \$274.04; finance, insurance and real estate, $\$ 236.20$; trade, $\$ 197.60$; and service, $\$ 175.38$.

## Rallway Carloadings

Railways loaded 18.3 million short tons ( 16.6 million t) of revenue freight in January, up $8.0 \%$ from a year earlier. Traffic from the United States totalled 1.4 million short tons ( 1.3 million t), a drop of $19.8 \%$. Commodity loadings recording significant percentage increases in volume nclude coke ( $96.9 \%$ ). grains other than wheat ( $66.6 \%$ ), fuel oil $(21.3 \%)$, potash $(18.0 \%)$ and iron ore (14.9\%). Loadings of alumina again showed a sharp advance reflecting the lingering effects of the 1976-1977 strike in that industry. Significant decreases came in potatoes $(56.7 \%)$, other vegetables ( $46.7 \%$ ) and livestock ( $26.9 \%$ ).
