Average Earnings

Average weekly earnings rose 6.7% to \$255.47 in January from \$239.34 in 1977. Average hourly earnings in manufacturing reached \$6.63 (from \$6.11), in construction \$10.21 (\$9.44) and in mining \$8.38 (\$7.84).

First estimates show average weekly earnings were highest in British Columbia (\$290.27) and followed by Alberta (\$268.59), Québec (\$253.78), Ontario (\$252.87), Newfoundland (\$248.24), Saskatchewan (\$240.55), New Brunswick (\$232.43), Manitoba (\$229.95), Nova Scotia (\$218.02) and Prince Edward Island (\$192.29)

Average weekly earnings by industry division were: construction, \$365.89, mining, \$364.21; forestry, \$346.92; transportation, communication and other utilities, \$300.83; manufacturing, \$273.98; finance, surance and real estate, \$238.37; trade, \$195.41; and service, \$174.93.

Labour Income

January labour income rose 8.1% from January 1977's \$9,171.6 million to \$9,910.5

Preliminary estimates for wages and salaries were: manufacturing, \$2,083.3 million; trade, \$1,218.4 million; transportation, communication and other utilities, \$971.7 million; public administration and defence, \$862.7 million; service, \$771.8 million; finance, insurance and real estate, \$614.0 million; construction, \$611.2 million; mining, \$242.2 million; forestry, \$93.2 million; and agriculture, \$57.7 million.

Supplementary income for January reached \$750.9 million.



Social Security

Health insurance costs per capita of the insured population rose from \$164 in 1971-72 to \$273 in 1975-76. As a proportion of per capita personal income, however, these costs dropped from 4.8% to 4.7%.

More than half our senior citizens need the Guaranteed Income Supplement. (In March 1977, 2,014,301 received old-age pensions, 55.3% also receiving GIS.) Over one third of pensioners are eligible for Canada or Québec pension plan payments. Average payment under both plans came to \$80.00


Through the Canada Assistance Plan in March 1976, 1,499,855 Canadians, 6.5% of the population, received help. In March 1972, assistance went to 1,533,295 (7%).

Family allowance payments in March 1977 went to 3,561,457 families and made up 2.9% of average family income.

Social security program cost figures vary considerably depending on provinces or territory: in 1975-76, health insurance costs as a proportion of personal income was 5.6% in Newfoundland, 4.0% in Saskatchewan, 4.3% in Ontario, the Yukon and Northwest Territories; the Guaranteed Income Supplement in 1976-77 went to 81.9% of pensioners in Newfoundland, 74.3% in Prince Edward Island, 71.6% in the two territories and 46.6% in Ontario; in 1975-76, Newfoundland topped other provinces in the proportion of population receiving social welfare help cost-shared through the Canada Assistance Plan at 12.2%, with Ontario 5.1% and Alberta 5.2%; in the Prairie provinces, unemployment insurance payments constituted 0.8% of personal income in contrast to 1.5% in Ontario, 3.2% in Québec, 2.2% in British Columbia and 5.0% in the Atlantic provinces.

Unemployment Insurance Commission Benefit Payments Millions of Dollars



Unemployment Insurance

Claimants receiving unemployment insurance benefit for the week of January 8 increased 21% to 995,000 from December and 11% from January 1977. In the latest month, 10% of beneficiaries were paid other than regular benefits, such as sickness, maternity, fishing and training benefits.

Net payments in January reached \$512 million, up 61% from December. A substantial rise is normally recorded between December and January — a year earlier the advance was 46%. Persons seeking benefit filed 300,000 claims in January, down 5% from December but 12% more than in January 1977.

Statement of Trade

February exports and imports rebounded smartly from January's sharp declines associated with worse-than-usual dislocations due to bad weather. Seasonallyadjusted exports on a balance-ofpayments basis rose 23% to \$4,369 million. up 3% from the previous high level in December. At \$4,124 million, imports seasonally-adjusted on a balance-ofpayments basis were 25.5% above January and more than 8% above 1977's highest total in December. The merchandise trade surplus of \$245 million was some 8.5% smaller than the revised January balance. In a three-month comparison, seasonallyadjusted exports gained roughly 9% to \$12,160 million after a marginal rise in September-November. Imports increased 8.5% to \$11,212 million in December-February following slight declines in the two previous quarters. The merchandise trade surplus expanded 18% to \$948 million from \$803 million following a rise of 20% from June-August.

Following a 7% fall in January, seasonally-adjusted exports on a Customs basis to the United States rebounded 9.3% in February to \$3,036 million, topping the \$3 billion level for the first time. In contrast to a 38.5% drop in January, shipments to overseas countries rose 74% to \$1,355 million with the European Economic Community and Japan accounting for nearly 40% of the rise. Exports to the U.S. advanced nearly 13% to \$8,798 million over three months and exports to overseas markets gained more moderately to \$3,404 million.

At \$2,836 million, seasonally-adjusted imports (Customs basis) from the U.S. stood 24.7% above the unusually-low January rate — a record.

Imports from overseas surpassed the high level of December in rising almost 30% to \$1,294 million. In a three-month comparison, imports from the U.S. rose 5.5% to \$7,715 million and imports from overseas rose 13.5% to \$3,531 million with the E.E.C. and Japan accounting for 43% of the increase.

New Housing Price Indexes

The Canada composite of new housing price indexes covering 22 cities rose 1.7% in February to 104.2 from 102.5 in 1977. January's composite: 104.0.

Corporate Boardroom Relationships "Mapped" Out in Greater Detail

A first for the new edition of *Inter-Corporate Ownership* is the inclusion of Standard Industrial Classifications (SICs) for each active Canadian corporation — a group can be seen to operate within one industry, in several or in many. Some of the more complicated ownership structures are displayed in inter-corporate "maps", including the interests of the following: Little Long Lac Gold Mines, RCA Corp., Williams Bros./Sandwell, Kaiser Industries Corp., Pepsico Inc., C.B.S. Inc., Rothmans, Consolidated Foods Corp., Studebaker-Worthington Inc., International Telephone and Telegraph Corp., the Posluns family, Exxon Corp., Argus Corp., the Bronfman family, the Bentley-Prentice families, Noranda Mines, the Irving family, W. Garfield Weston Charitable Foundation, the Desmarais group and Canadian Pacific Ltd.

The group headed by Montréal's Paul G. Desmarais controls more than 175 corporations. Best-known among them are: Power Corporation of Canada, Canada Steamship Lines, Investors Group, Montréal Trust, Bathurst Paper, Consolidated Bathurst and Voyageur Colonial. The Weston interests (150 corporations) are listed as foreign-controlled since Canadian-born Garfield Weston is now a British citizen resident in the United Kingdom. The group includes: Eddy Paper Company, Loblaw Companies, Weston Bakeries, G. Tamblyn Ltd. and Zehr's Market Ltd.

Other findings: The Rothmans Group of South Africa controls Rothmans of Canada, Rock City Tobacco Company, Carling O'Keefe Ltd. and Jordan Wines among others. R.C.A. Corporation of the United States controls Hertz Canada Ltd., Ballantine Books of Canada, Random House of Canada Ltd. and Banquet Foods Corporation.

Sales Financing

Companies purchased \$201.5 million of retail finance paper in January, up 9.3% from \$184.4 million in 1977 (\$39.5 million for automobiles, \$28.9 million for other consumer goods, \$76.8 million for commercial vehicles and \$58.3 million for other commercial and industrial goods).

Wholesale financing during the fourth quarter 1977 totalled \$2,135.1 million, up 6.0% from \$2.013.9 million in 1977.

Motor Vehicle Shipments

February shipments dropped 1.6% to 236,081 vehicles from 239,948 in 1977. Year to date production fell 5.7% to 455,473 vehicles from 482,999 last year. February automobiles totalled 89,237 compared with 96,363 a year earlier (two months production: 173,391 against 194,649). All commercial vehicles figures: 146,844 (143.585): 282,082 (288,350).

Year 2031 Seniors

By 2031 Canada will have three working-age adults for each senior citizen against seven currently. Due to the smaller number of children however, as a proportion of the population, the combined dependency rate of young and old to the working-age population will be much lower over the next 50 years than ever before in the present century. Nonetheless, there will be a much heavier call on medical, hospital and related services by the older population than by other population groups. The older population, now 9% of the total population, consumed 20% of available "patient days" in 1974. Given the same rate of usage in 2031, older people alone will need 57 million patient days - or 104% of present maximum capacity
