## Consumer Price Index

From March's 170.8, the Consumer Price Index advanced 0.2\% to 171.2 in April. The rise from April 1977 to April 1978 at $8.4 \%$ fell from $8.8 \%$ in the previous month.

Food prices, up $1.7 \%$ were largely responsible for the monthly rise. Increase impact of the food index on total CPI was in large measure dampened, however, by a $0.4 \%$ decrease in the index for all-items-excluding-food attributable 10 provincial sales tax reductions.

Prices for beel cuts, up $8.9 \%$, and prices for many fresh fruits and vegetables were mainly responsible for the $2.0 \%$ rise in the lood-at-home index. Other notable contributors: chicken, other meats and certain dairy products. Prices for many pork cuts enslined.
Tax reductions particularly affectect clowing ( $-2.7 \%$ ) and transportation ( $-0.4 \%$ ) components. Partially offsetting the reducliont: increases for tobacco and alcohol products in many provinces, higher postal tatès, air fares and automobile labour repair charges April to April, all-items-excludinglood advanced $6.1 \%$, down from $7.0 \%$ in March.

Viewed in terms of goods and services the price level of goods, including food. increased $0.2 \%$ and services $0.4 \%$. Aprit to April, goods increased $9.2 \%$, services $7.0 \%$.

Seasonally-adjusted levels advanced 0.4\% March 10 April: 2.0\% up in the food index and $0.2 \%$ down in all-items. excluding-food. The current annual rate of change based on the seasonally-adjusted movement in the latest three-month period. 8.3\%

## SURVEY TESTS HEALTH

A health survey starts in the Atlantic provinces May 15, Québec and Ontario June 12, the Prairie provinces and British Columbia July 3 Annually, approximately 38,000 persons in 12,000 households in 78 communities are to be surveyed withhouseholds chosen at random by Statistics Canada, co-operating with the Department of Health and Welfare. A questionnaire focussing on exercise, smoking, alcohol use and driving will be left for each person age 15 and over. In one-third of the households a nurse will make physical measurements and tests, including blood pressure, height, weight, skinfold thickness and fitness (heart/ lung efficiency). Results of the tests will be mailed to parlicipants, and, if they wish, to family doctors. Participation in the physical and tests is entirely voluntary.

The Canada Health Survey is unique:

- in its contents and design
- in emphasis on lifestyle and positive health
- in range of information collected
- in convenience - measurements tests are obtained from people in their homes.
