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New Motor Vehicle Sales

New motor vehicles sold in April rose 7.6% to 136,990 from April 1977. Automobiles made in the United States and Canada rose 6.8% to 82,147 and Canadian and U.S. commercial vehicles 17.6% to 34,683.

Automobiles from overseas fell 3.5% to 18,857 from 1977 and overseas-made commercial vehicles fell 3.7% to 1.303. Value of the cars rose 12.2% to \$103.4 million and the commercial vehicles were worth \$7.4 million, up 14.4%. Value of U.S. and Canadian cars sold rose 14.4% to \$531.1 million: commercial vehicles rose 28.3% to \$289.2 million.

Sales value of all vehicles increased 18.1% to \$931.0 million, including 303 coaches and buses valued at \$8.4 million

Seasonally-adjusted sales of automocities manufactured in Canada and the U.S. 1-11.5% from March to 66,578 and those of cars from overseas rose 3.6% to 16,942. Beasonally-adjusted sales of all commercial vehicles rose 12.2% to 33,056.

For four months of 1978 sales reached 439,005 units (446,991 in 1977), value \$2,997.5 million, up 6.9% from 1977.


Unemployment Insurance Statistics

Some 983,000 persons received unemployment insurance benefits in the week of March 12, down 3% from the previous month but 8% more than in 1977. Thirty-six percent of beneficiaries were under 25 and proportions of males/females in this group were about equal.

Total benefits reached \$471 million, up 2% from February and 10% from 1977. First quarter payout totalled \$1,446 million, up 20% (more weeks of benefit paid and a rise in the average weekly payment contributed equally to the increase). Persons applying in March for benefits numbered 207,000, down 2% from the previous month and a year earlier. The first quarter claim load totalled 718,000, up 6% from a year earlier.

Building Permits, Adjusted

Building permits improved slightly in March to a level of \$972 million from a revised \$961 million in February but still 11.2% lower than in 1977 (\$1,094 million).

Non-residential permits rose to a level of \$406 million (\$378 million in February) but residential permits continued their prolonged drop to a level of \$566 million (\$583 million in February). Decrease in residential construction was caused by a further drop in the level of multiple dwellings — 6,793 compared with 8,523 in February (however, the level of single-detached homes increased — 7,626 in February to 9,058). Translated into annual rates, the March performance suggests an annual total of 190,200 dwellings against 193,800 in February and 226,400 in January.

In the non-residential sector, commercial projects' level rose to \$251 million from \$166 million but new industrial projects' level decreased from \$89 million to \$77 million. Government-sponsored projects: \$78 million against \$123 million in February.

Preliminary returns for April reflect improvements in both residential and non-residential building permits, indicating new authorized dwellings might reach an annual rate of 220,000 units.


Department Store Sales

April sales totalled \$560.0 million. Increased 4.9% from a year earlier, sales were up in all regions except Québec, down 0.8% to \$106.2 million.

Department stores by regions, with percentage changes from 1977 in brackets:

- Ontario, \$207.8 million (4.6%)
- British Columbia, \$89.6 million (16.0%)
- Alberta, \$73.2 million (4.9%)
- Atlantic Provinces, \$34.7 million (1.8%)
- Manitoba, \$32.9 million (3.9%)
- Saskatchewan, \$15.6 million (1.3%)

Balance of Payments, Adjusted

First quarter 1978 saw the current account deficit fall to \$637 million from \$803 million in October-December. (Unadjusted for seasonal variations: \$1,417 million). Estimated capital movements (not seasonally adjusted) led to a net inflow of \$216 million. The balancing item representing net errors and omissions in the recorded estimates of the current and capital accounts equalled a net outflow of \$393 million. Thus, the overall deficit financed by net official monetary movements reached \$1,594 million.

Main quarterly movements were: the seasonally adjusted surplus on merchandise trade widened by \$274 million to \$1,383 million as the value of exports rose at a faster pace than imports; the travel account rose by one third to a deficit of \$471 million; a 50% rise in the net inflow from capital movements in long-term forms to \$673 million from \$441 million in the previous quarter; rises in Canadian new issues abroad and foreign direct investment in Canada and declines in export credits and Canadian government advances to non-residents, which also had the effect of increasing the balance on long-term capital inflows; reduction by nonresidents in their holdings of outstanding long-term Canadian bonds and increase in Canadian direct investment abroad, both having the effect of reducing the balance on long-term capital inflows; a swing in shortterm capital movements of \$1,560 million to an outflow of \$457 million, which, in addition to entries associated with the Government's foreign currency borrowing from Canadian chartered banks largely reflected a decline in non-resident holdings of Canadian money market paper and Canadian dollar deposit; and official financing of \$1,594 million which reflected a decline in reserve assets of \$750 million even after the absorption into the reserves of \$844 million representing the Canadian dollar equivalent of the U.S. \$750 million borrowed from Canadian chartered banks.

Electric Power

March net generation increased to 30.7 TW.h from 27.5 TW.h in 1977. Hydro generation: 8.3%; thermal production, 19.8%.

Iron Ore

Mines shipped 2,033,086 short tons of iron ore in April compared with 4,021,668 a year earlier bringing four months output to 6,892,391 from 9,386,776.

Industry Selling Price Index

The Industry Selling Price Index, for manufacturing, rose 1.2% in April to 185.0 from its revised March level of 182.8. The Index stands 7.1% higher than in April 1977 (172.7). The food and beverage industries group rose 1.6% due largely to increases of 3.9% for slaughtering and meat processors, 3.3% for feeds and 3.6% for breweries. Paper and allied industries: a 3.3% increase as pulp and paper mills rose 4.4%. Increases of 3.1% for iron and steel mills and 2.1% for smelting and refining were mainly responsible for a rise of 2.2% in the primary metal industries group index.

Radio Broadcasting

Gross national radio air-time sales rose 7.8% to \$5.5 million in February from \$5.1 million in 1977. Agency and other commissions reduced sales to \$4.7 million, up 6.8% from \$4.4 million. Net local air-time sales: 3.1% to \$13.3 million.

Two months gross sales rose 9.6% to \$39.0 million from \$35.6 million and net sales rose 9.6% to \$36.4 million from \$33.3 million in the comparable 1977 period.

International Travel

April saw 1.8 million United States visitors, down 9.8% from 1977. Residents returning from the U.S. numbered 3.0 million, down 7.4%. Visitors from other than the U.S. rose 8% to 78,100. Residents returning from countries increased 13.8% to 188,500.

million. Residents returning from the U.S. declined 0.7% to 10.5 million. Visitors from other countries increased 6.3% to 213,200; and residents returning totalled 713,000. up 5.6% from 1977.

Appliances

Canadian manufacturers' domestic sales of refrigerators rose to 42,530 in April from 39,512 a year earlier. Domestic sales of home and farm freezers increased to 19,477 from 17,956. Washing machines rose to 29,851 (29,243). Conventional washing machine sales reached 4,989 (4,304). Electric clothes dryers: 24,578, up from 22,728.

million at end of fourth quarterly: \$6,493 million at end of fourth quarter 1977, up 16.0% from a year earlier. (Credit unions and caisses populaires report \$4,627 million, up 19.1%). Other retail stores, other credit-card issuers and public utilities are part of the quarterly total.

Outstanding fourth quarter balances totalled (with monthly reporters) \$31,292 million, up 12.8% from a year earlier.

Import/Export, Price and Volume

Current weighted price indexes increased strongly in the first quarter over fourth quarter 1977 — 4% for imports and 3% for exports. Against first quarter 1977, increases reached 14% and 8%. Import volume fell 1.7%, a continuing decline from second quarter 1977. Export volume increased 4.4% following a 4% rise in the fourth quarter.

Manufacturers' Markets Destination of Shipments

Almost half of all shipments for which manufacturers reported destinations in a special inquiry relating to 1974 were sent outside the province of origin. About 27% of shipments for which data were reported were shown as moving in interprovincial trade and 21% were reported shipped to other countries.

The purpose of the question, asked only once before (1967) of manufacturers, was to produce as comprehensive a picture as possible of the flow of shipments between provinces and to destinations outside Canada. Such data find important applications in provincial economic accounting as well as in market research and other studies. A recently published report summarizing these results also examines certain limitations to the data and apparent changes in patterns of interprovincial shipments of manufacturers since 1967.

The Atlantic provinces and British Columbia showed a relatively low dependence on interprovincial markets and relatively high shipments to other countries compared with the central regions of Canada in the tatest data. Each region of origin was its own source of greatest supply but the second greatest supplier of all regions save itself was Ontario. This province alone accounted for more than half of all Canadian shipments.

Of 4.414 manufacturers reporting shipments outside the country, 2,092 were located in Ontario, 1,276 in Québec, 501 in British Columbia, 316 in the Prairie provinces and 229 in the Atlantic provinces. Some additional exports may have been made by manufacturers not reporting or selling through intermediaries.

Selected Leisure Activities

Preliminary estimates are now available from the February 1978 Labour Force Survey supplement on Selected Leisure Time Activities: Reading Habits. The survey was oriented towards arts and culture involvement. About 60% reported engaging in some form of physical recreation or exercise. A third were involved with community or volunteer activity. One in three respondents indicated some involvement with each of: museums, public libraries, and art or craft fairs. One in four had attended each of: live theatre, tolk/rock/jazz/popular music performances, and art galleries. About one in five reported attending a classical music or dance performance.


The survey was jointly sponsored by the Education, Science and Culture Division of Statistics Canada and the Arts and Culture Branch of the Secretary of State. More detailed statistical information will be available later this summer; a comprehensive study has been commissioned and is expected in the spring of 1979.

Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from January-April farming operations totalled \$3.661.2 million compared with \$3,332.7 million in 1977. Receipts from farming operations by province, January-April, with 1977 comparisons in brackets: Prince Edward Island \$33.0 million (\$38.9 million), Nova Scotia \$41.5 million (\$38.6 million), New Brunswick \$35.7 million (\$40.7 million), Québec \$441.5 million (\$40.7 million), Ontario \$993.6 million (\$821.0 million), Manitoba \$315.4 million (\$269.1 million), Saskatchewan \$865.2 million (\$863.4 million), Alberta \$784.9 million (\$740.4 million), British Columbia \$150.4 million (\$135.4 million).
