New motor vehicles sold in April rose 7.6\% to 136.990 from April 1977. Automobiles made in the United States and Canada rose $6.8 \%$ to 82.147 and Canadian and U.S commercial vehicles $17.6 \%$ to 34.683
Automobiles from overseas tell 3.5\% to 18,857 from 1977 and overseas-made commercial vehicles fell $3.7 \%$ to 1.303 Value of the cars rose $12.2 \%$ to $\$ 103.4$ million and the commercial vehicles were worth $\$ 7.4$ million, up $14.4 \%$. Value of US, and Canadian cars sold rose $14.4 \%$ to $\$ 531.1$ million: commercial vehicles rose $28.3 \%$ to $\$ 289.2$ million.

Sales value of all vehicles increased $18.1 \%$ to $\$ 931.0$ million, including 303 colaches and buses valued at $\$ 8.4$ million
Seasonally-adjusted sales of automo5ik: s manufactured in Canada and the US 1.11 1.5\% from March to 66.578 and those of car:s from overseas rose $3.6 \%$ to 16,942 Buasonally-adjusted sales of all commercial vehicles rose $12.2 \%$ to 33.056 .

## Unemployment insurance Statistics

Some 983.000 persons received unemployment insurance benefits in the week of March 12. down 3\% from the previous month but $8 \%$ more than in 1977. Thirty-six percent of beneficiaries were under 25 and proportions of males/females in this group were about equal.
Total benefits reached $\$ 471$ million. up $2 \%$ from February and $10 \%$ from 1977. First quarter payout totalled $\$ 1.446$ million, up $20 \%$ (more weeks of benefit paid and a rise in the average weekly payment contributed equally to the increase). Persons applying in March for benefits numbered 207,000. down $2 \%$ from the previous month and a year earlier. The first quarter claim load cralled 718,000, up 6\% from a year earlier

Bullding Permits, Adjusted
Building permits improved slightly in March to a level of $\$ 972$ million from a revised $\$ 961$ million in February but still $11.2 \%$ lower than in 1977 ( $\$ 1,094$ million).
Non-residential permits rose to a level of $\$ 406$ million ( $\$ 378$ million in February) but residential permits continued their prolonged drop to a level of $\$ 566$ million ( $\$ 583$ million in February). Decrease in residential construction was caused by a further drop in the level of multiple dwellings - 6.793 compared with 8,523 in February (however. the level of single-detached homes increased - 7.626 in February to 9,058). Translated into annual rates, the March performance suggests an annual total of 190,200 dwellings against 193,800 in February and 226.400 in January.

In the non-residential sector, commercial projects' level rose to $\$ 251$ million from $\$ 166$ million but new industrial projects' level decreased from $\$ 89$ million to $\$ 77$ million. Government-sponsored projects: $\$ 78$ million agains $\$ 123$ million in February.

Preliminary returns for April reflect improvements in both residential and nonresidential building permits, indicating new authorized dwellings might reach an annual rate of 220,000 units.

## Balance of Payments, Adjusted

First quarter 1978 saw the current account deficit fall $10 \$ 637$ million from $\$ 803$ million in October-December. (Unadjusted for seasonal variations: $\$ 1,417$ million). Estimated capital movements (not seasonally adjusted) led to a net inflow of $\$ 216$ million. The balancing item representing net errors and omissions in the recorded estimates of the current and capital accounts equalled a net outflow of $\$ 393$ million. Thus, the overall deficit financed by net official monetary movements reached $\$ 1.594$ million.
Main quarterly movements were: the seasonally adjusted surplus on merchandise trade widened by $\$ 274$ million to $\$ 1,383$ million as the value of exports rose at a faster pace than imports; the travel account rose by one third to a deficit of $\$ 471$ million: a $50 \%$ rise in the net inflow from capital movements in long-term forms to $\$ 673$ million from $\$ 441$ million in the previous quarter; rises in Canadian new issues abroad and foreign direct investment in Canada and declines in export credits and Canadian government advances to non-residents, which also had the effect of increasing the balance on long-term capital inflows; reduction by nonresidents in their holdings of outstanding long-term Canadian bonds and increase in Canadian direct investment abroad, both having the effect of reducing the balance on long-term capital inflows; a swing in shortterm capital movements of $\$ 1,560$ million to an outlow of $\$ 457$ million, which, in addition to entries associated with the Government's foreign currency borrowing from Canadian chartered banks largely reflected a decline in non-resident holdings of Canadian money market paper and Canadian dollar deposit; and afficial financing of $\$ 1,594$ million which reflected a decline in reserve assets of $\$ 750$ million even after the absorption into the reserves of $\$ 844$ million representing the Canadian dollar equivalent of the U.S. $\$ 750$ million borrowed from Canadian charlered banks.

## Industry Selling Price Index

The Industry Selling Price Index, for manufacturing, rose $1.2 \%$ in April to 185.0 from its revised March level of 182.8. The Index stands $7.1 \%$ higher than in April 1977 (172.7). The food and beverage industries group rose $1.6 \%$ due largely 10 increases of $3.9 \%$ for slaughtering and meat processors, $3.3 \%$ for feeds and $3.6 \%$ for breweries. ## Manufacturers' Markets

 Destination of ShipmentsAlmost half of all shipments for which manufacturers reported destinations in a special inquiry relating to 1974 were sent outside the province of origin. About $27 \%$ of shipments for which data were reported were shown as moving in interprovincial trade and $21 \%$ were reported shipped to other countries.

The purpose of the question, asked only once before (1967) of manufacturers, was 10 produce as comprehensive a picture as possible of the flow of shipments between provinces and to destinations oulside Canada. Such data find important applications in provincial economic accounting as well as in market research and other studies. A recently published report summarizing these results also examines certain limitations to the data and apparent changes in patterns of interprovincial shipments of manufacturers since 1967.

The Atlantic provinces and British Columbia showed a relatively low dependence on interprovincial markets and relatively high shipments to other countries compared with the central regions of Canada in the talest data. Each region of origin was its own source of greatest supply but the second greatest supplier of all regions save itself was Ontario. This province alone accounted for more than half of all Canadian shipments.

Of 4.414 manufaclurers reporting shipments outside the country, 2,092 were located in Ontario, 1,276 in Quebec, 501 in British Columbia. 316 in the Prairie provinces and 229 in the Atlantic provinces. Some additional exports may have been made by manufacturers not reporting or selling through intermediaries.

## Selected Lelsure Activities

Preliminary estimates are now available from the February 1978 Labour Force Survey supplement on Selected Leisure Time Activities: Reading Habits. The survey was oriented towarts arts and culture involvement. About $6(1 \%$ reported engaging in some form of physical recreation or exercise. A third were involved with community or volunteer activity One in three respondents indicated some involvement with each of: museums, public libraries, and art or craft fairs. One in four had attended each of: live theatre, tolk/rock/jazz/popular music performances, and art galleries. About one in five reported attending a classical music or dance performance.

The survey was joirtly sponsored by the Education. Science and Cullure Division of Statistics Canada and the Arts and Culture Branch of the Secretary of State.
