**Building Permits (Seasonally Adjusted)** 

Value of second quarter permits issued rose 8.5% over the first quarter but the level of new construction authorized during both quarters (\$6,015 million) showed little change from 1977 (\$6,010 million). Value of residential permits fell 4.2% and new dwellings decreased 17.7%. Non-residential permits (\$2,257 million, first half 1977) rose 7.2% to \$2,420 million, Industrial and commercial projects associated with the business sector improved; industrial projects rose 2.1% and commercial projects 18.1% higher, Government initiated projects (\$635 million) fell 7.2% from 1977 (\$685 million).

Based on nearly complete results, permits in June totalled \$1,051 million (revised \$1,072 million in May). June 1977 saw \$1,085 million. Residential permits totalling \$590 million (\$629 million in May) were issued for 8,829 single-detached homes (8,795 in May) and 8,256 multiple dwellings (11,14). New industrial installations reached \$100 million (\$77 million) and commercial projects \$229 million (\$265 million). Publicly-initiated projects including schools, hospitals, and welfare buildings rose from \$101 million in May to \$132 million in June.




# **Electric Power Statistics**

#### Labour Force

August employment reached 10,635,000 against 10,260,000 a year earlier. The 392,000 unemployed rose 6.4% from 338,000 a year earlier, with an unemployment rate of 7.7 against 7.5.

The seasonally-adjusted level of employment reached 10,145,000, marking the ninth consecutive month of increase. For men and women 25 and over the levels increased by 12,000 and 11,000. Levels decreased by 2,000 and 8,000 for men and for women 15 to 24.

The seasonally-adjusted level of unemployment was 941,000, up 14,000 from July. The level increased by 4,000 for men 15 to 24 and by 10,000 for men 25 and over. The level increased by 7,000 for women 15 to 24 and decreased by 7,000 for women 25 and over. The level decreased in Ontario (6,000) and increased in Québec (15,000) and British Columbia (9,000). It showed little or no change in the remaining provinces.

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate was 8.5 in August, up 0.1 over July. On a provincial basis, rates decreased 0.2 to 16.5 in Newfoundland, 0.3 to 8.8 in Prince Edward Island, 0.5 to 10.4 in Nova Scotia and 0.2 to 7.1 in Ontario. The rate increased 0.7 to 13.6 in New Brunswick, 0.5 to 11.0 in Québec, 0.7 to 4.6 in Saskatchewan, 0.1 to 4.9 in Alberta and 0.7 to 8.4 in British Columbia. The rate remained at 6.7 in Manitoba.

# **Domestic Refrigerators/Freezers**

## **Unemployment Insurance Statistics**

Claimants receiving unemployment insurance benefits for the week of June 11 reached 713,000, down 16% from May but up 9% from 1977; 38% were under 25. Benefits totalled \$334 million, down 26% from May but up 18% from a year earlier. Six months' payments rose 21% to \$2,669 million over 1977 and — based on year-to-date figures — the average weekly benefit rose 9% to \$109.57.

Claims filed in June by persons seeking benefit: 191,000, down 11% from May and 4% from 1977. Claims received, year-to-date: 1,342,000, up 5%.

# Radio Broadcasting

Gross April radio air-time sales: \$8.9 million, up 27.1% from \$7.0 million in 1977. After deduction of agency and other commissions: \$7.5 million, up 25.0% from \$6.0 million. Net local air-time sales rose 13.0% to \$18.2 million from \$16.1 million.

Gross radio air-time sales to date: \$93.5 million (\$81.3 million in 1977), up 15.0%. Net sales rose 14.3% to \$87.0 million from \$76.1 million.

### **Shorn Wool Production**

The 1978 wool clip is estimated at 2,034,100lbs.. down 2% from 1977's 2,068,900. Sheep shorn: 293,300 against 1977's 292,800. Average fleece weight: 6.9 lbs.. down 3% from 7.1.

### Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index advanced 0.1% from 177.7 in July to 177.8 in August. This smallest recorded monthly increase since December 1975 brought the twelve-month rise to 9.4%, down from 9.8% registered in July. The food index declined 1.4%, the all-items-excluding-food index increased 0.7% and lower prices for fresh vegetables and beef (down 19.4% and 4.3%) were largely responsible for the 2.0% decline in the food-at-home index. Impact of these decreases was countered by higher prices for selected pork products, wieners and canned salmon as well as a 2.0% rise in the food-away-from-home index.

Higher gasoline prices and rent charges were the largest contributing factors in the 0.7% increase in the all-items-excluding-food index. Other notable increases included higher homeownership costs, increased telephone rates — especially in Québec and Ontario — higher automobile insurance premiums, increased prices for selected imported model cars, higher prices for many clothing items, men's haircuts and women's hairdressing services. Between August 1977 and August 1978 the index for all-items-excluding-food advanced 6.2%.

Viewed in terms of goods and services the price level of goods, including food, declined 0.3%, that for services was up 0.6%. August 1977 to August 1978, goods increased 10.9%, services 6.7%.

On a seasonally-adjusted basis the Consumer Price Index showed no change between July and August with a 1.0% decline in the food index and a 0.4% increase in the index for all-items excluding-food. The current annual rate of change based on seasonally-adjusted movements in the latest three-month period: 7.6%.

# Federal Government Employment

Including armed forces, the federal government and its enterprises had 596,616 employees as of June, up t 6.594 from 1977 (departments hired some 13.000 more employees for Federal Labour Intensive Projects). Payroll including overtime and retroactive payments, second quarter 1978; \$2,292.8 million, up \$33.3 million from 1977.

# Coal Coke Statistics

June coal production increased 2.6% to 2.476,759 tons (2.246.878 metric tonnes) from 2,541,325 (2.305.451) a year earlier. Imports decreased to 1,839,318 tons (1.668.601 metric tonnes) from 2,044,510 (1.854.748). Industrial consumers used 1,473,621 tons (1.336.846 metric tonnes) of coal, down 3,203 (2.906) and 456,354 tons (413.997 metric tonnes) of coke, up 1,735 (1.573).




#### Note to Readers
