



Foreign Trade, Automotive

Exports to the United States rose 15% from \$5,148 million in the first half of 1977 to \$5,946 million in 1978. More than half this increase originated from truck shipments which advanced 44% to \$1,335 million. Automobiles were up by close to 3% to \$2,325 million. Most of some 17% increase in parts shipments was attributable to other than motor vehicle engines and parts. Tire exports rose 13% to \$87 million.

At \$435 million, exports to overseas countries gained 9% from \$399 million in first half 1977. (Cars \$192 million and trucks \$146 million). Shipments of tires and reexports rose slightly; exports of parts declined moderately

Imports of automotive goods expanded more substantially than exports — by 44.5% from \$471 million to \$680 million in January-June 1978. Most of this increase originated from a 75.5% advance from \$251 million to \$441 million in the value of car imports. The automotive deficit more than inplied to \$245 million, already exceeding the deficit of \$111 million for 1977. The U.S. share of imports contracted from 79.8% to 71.9%. Automobiles arriving from Japan and West Germany each rose nearly 40%. (The proportion of Japanese cars expanded from 14% to 19% and the West German share from 4% to nearly 6%). Average price of imported cars rose 11.4% matching the price change for American cars. Unit values of Japanese and West German cars recorded higher increases of 34% and 24%.


Consumer Price Indexes Regionally

Between July and August consumer price indexes rose in 10 cities and fell in the remaining four with price movements ranging from declines of 0.2% in Ottawa. Toronto and Calgary to an increase of 0.6% in Thunder Bay.

Percentage increases with annual change in brackets: St.John's 0.3% (8.2%), Halifax 0.5% (7.8%), Saint John 0.5% (8.3%), Québec 0.4% (8.4%), Montréal 0.2% (9.0%), Ottawa 0.2% (8.6%), Toronto 0.2% (9.1%), Thunder Bay 0.6% (8.0%), Winnipeg 0.5% (8.6%), Saskatoon 0.1% (7.6%), Regina 0.1% (8.9%), Edmonton 0.2% (8.7%), Calgary 0.2% (8.2%), and Vancou-Var 0.2% (8.0%).

Consumer Credit

July consumer credit outstanding with credit holders reporting monthly: \$27,092 million, up 14.4% from a year earlier. Outstanding balances with percentage change from 1977:

- Chartered banks' personal loans: \$20,928 million, up 16.7%
- Québec savings banks' personal loans: \$100 million, up 20.5%
- Life insurance companies' policy loans: \$1,310 million, up 3.4%
- Sales financing and consumer loan companies' loans: small \$184 million, down 13.2%; large \$1,487 million, up 1.1%; instalment sales paper \$1,112 million, up 0.4%
- Department, furniture, TV, radio and household appliance stores: \$1,391 million, up 8,3%
- Trust and mortgage loan companies personal loans: \$580 million, up 74.2%

Credit holders reporting quarterly: \$6,735 million at end of second quarter 1978, up 15.2% from a year earlier. (Credit unions and caisses populaires: \$4,977 million, up 17.6%). Including quarterly reporters, outstanding second quarter balances totalled \$33,364 million, up 13.8%.

Direct Selling

Direct selling to household consumers by manufacturers and specialist direct-sellers in 1977 increased 6.9% to \$1,683.0 million from revised 1976's \$1,574.5 million (2.7% of \$.651.3 million in 1977 retail sales). Door-to-door canvassing accounted for 62.1% of direct sales, mail-order sales for 16.9%, counter sales (at manufacturing premises) for 15.6% with the remaining 5.4% through other channels.

Retail Trade

July retail trade reached \$5,691.0 million, up 11.2% from 1977. Sales increased in 27 of 28 trade groups. Largest gains: motor vehicle dealers (20.5%) and sporting goods and accessories stores (20.4%). Furniture, TV, radio and appliance stores declined 3.6%. All provinces gained ranging from 14.9% in Nova Scotia to 9.1% in Manitoba. Montréal sales rose 8.1%, Toronto 10.6%, Winnipeg 8.3% and Vancouver 13.8%. Revised total for June was \$6,216.3 million, up 16.0% from 1977.

Seasonally-adjusted retail sales level. \$5,758.1 million, up 0.5% from \$5,731.4 million in June. Sales increased in 16 of 28 trade groups. Specialty shoe stores (16.0%), sporting goods and accessories stores (8.5%) and family shoe stores (8.1%) gained most. General stores (11.7%) recorded the largest decrease. Six provinces recorded increased sales over June, from 2.4% in Québec to 0.1% in British Columbia.

Telephone Statistics, 1977


In 1977 telephone industry operating revenues rose 14.6% to \$3,854 million (1976: \$3,364 million). Operating expenses — \$2.639 million (\$2,274 million) — rose 16.1%. Net profit after income tax, up 3.3%: \$384,990,000 (\$372,685,000). Telephones totalled 14,488,000 (13,885,000), up 4.3%.

July wholesale sales: \$5,046,210,000, up 12.9% from \$4,469,343,000 a year earlier. Inventories: \$8,251,770,000, up 9.7% from \$7,523,388,000.

General Wholesale Index

July's General Wholesale Index fell 0.2% to 603.4 from the revised June level of 604.7. The Index was 7.0% higher than a year earlier (563.8). Major groups with anost effect:

- Vegetable products declined 1.5% due mainly to decreases of 5.8% for sugar and products, 7.9% for tea, coffee and cocoa.
- Animal products declined 1.5% reflecting decreases of 7.2% for livestock and 1.0% for fresh meats.
- The index of textile products showed an offsetting increase of 1.2% attributable largely to increases of 2.7% for cotton yarns, 2.3% for cotton fabrics, 2.3% for worsted yarn and 3.7% for woolen hoisery and knit goods.

Oil Pipeline Transport


Pipelines received 2,619,316 B/D (416 235 m3D) of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum product in June, 2.9% more than the 2,543,400 B/D (404 172 m3D) a year earlier. Receipts of domestic petroleum and products rose 4.2% to 2,319,732 B/D (368 629 m3D). Imports tell 5.8% to 299,583 B/D (47 607 m3D).

Refineries produced 59,976,000 barrels of refined petroleum products in July, an increase of 6.9% (56,130,000 in 1977). Preliminary data, net sales of all refined petroleum products: 48,160,000 barrels (46,487,000; 3.6%).

Index of Industrial Production

The seasonally-adjusted Index of Industrial Production rose 1.1% to 132.0 in July from 130.5 in June. Mining and utilities decreased, manufacturing increased.

Changes, with percentages and June indexes in brackets: mines 95.5 (130.5, -10.4%), manufacturing 136.2 (132.2, 3.0%), electric power, gas, water utilities 148.2 (150.2, -1.3%), non-durable manufacturing 133.9 (131.0, 2.2%) and durable manufacturing 138.5 (133.5, 3.7%).

Length of public roads and streets rose 1.3% in 1975 to 541,649 miles.

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Manufacturers' shipments, July, fell 13.6% to \$10,084.8 million from revised June's \$11,674.1 million. Shipments, seven months, were estimated at \$72,286.9 million, up 15.5% from \$62,593.6 million a year earlier.

The preliminary level of shipments, seasonally adjusted, was \$11,106.3 million in July. up 2.1% from revised June's \$10,882.9 million. Durable goods rose 2.2% to \$5,207.5 million from \$5,096.3 million and non-durables 1.9% to \$5,898.8 million from \$5,786.6 million.

Seasonally-adjusted new orders in all manufacturing industries dropped 0.8% to \$11.058.1 million from \$11,142.0 million. Durable goods new orders fell 3.3% to \$5,139.0 million from \$5,312.2 million and non-durable rose 1.5% to \$5,919.1 million from \$5,829.8 million.

Seasonally-adjusted unfilled orders: \$11,890.6 million, 0.4% below the revised June estimate of \$11,938.8 million.

Total inventory owned, seasonally adjusted: \$19,532.8 million, fractionally below the revised June level of \$19,565.8 million. Total inventory held, seasonally adjusted: \$20,583.7 million (0.1%, \$20,599.7 million). Goods in process and finished products rose 1.3% and 0.2%. Raw materials decreased 1.2%.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned to shipments: 1.76:1 compared with the revised June ratio of 1.80:1. Finished products to shipments: 0.60:1 against 0.62:1.

Vending Machines, 1977


Sales through 105,587 vending machines reported by 622 operators for 1977 reached \$286,478,100. up 6.3% from 1976. Cigarette (28,913) sales expanded 1.2% to \$122,306,800; coffee (12,656), 16.1% to \$52,407,100; soft drink (20,773), 8.9% to \$44,177,600; fresh food (4,177), 27.2% to \$20,053,700; packaged milk and juice (2,086), 13.4% to \$10,244,300; hot canned food and soup (2,264), 2.9% to \$4,613,100.

Restaurant Statistics

Restaurants throughout Canada increased their January July receipts a total of 9.6% to \$1,517.4 million from a year earlier. Breakdown per province: Ontario \$577.6 million (11.4%), Quebec \$451.6 million (6.8%), British Columbia, Yukon and Territories \$163.2 million (12.8%), Alberta \$142.1 million (12.7%), Manitoba \$71.3 million (6.4%), Saskatchewan \$40.9 million (6.2%), New Brunswick \$29.2 million (6.7%), Nova Scotia \$26.5 million (7.3%), Newfoundland \$11.4 million (7.4%) and Prince Edward Island \$3.7 million (8.5%).
