## Foreign Trade, Automotive

Exports to the United States rose $15 \%$ from $\$ 5,148$ million in the first half of 1977 to $\$ 5.946$ million in 1978 . More than half this increase originated from truck shipments which advanced $44 \%$ to $\$ 1,335$ million Automobiles were up by close to $3 \%$ to $\$ 2.325$ million. Most of some $\{7 \%$ increase in parts shipments was attributable to other than motor vehicle engines and parts. Tire exports rose $13 \%$ to $\$ 87$ million.

At $\$ 435$ million, exports to overseas countries gained $9 \%$ from $\$ 399$ million in tirsi half 1977. (Cars $\$ 192$ million and trucks $\$ 146$ million). Shipments of tires and re exports rose slightly; exports of parts weclined moderately.
imports of automotive goods expanded Tiroie substantially than exports - by 44.5\% fiom $\$ 471$ million to $\$ 680$ million is January-June 1978. Most of this increase origh ated from a $75.5 \%$ advance from $\$ 251$ million to $\$ 441$ million in the value of cat imports. The automotive deficit more than :npied to $\$ 245$ million. already exceeding the deficit of $\$ 111$ million for 1977. The U.S share of imports contracted from $79.8 \%$ to $719 \%$. Automobiles arriving from Japan and West Germany each rose nearly $40 \%$. (The proportion of Japanese cars expanded from 14\% 10 19\% and the West German share from 4\% to nearly 6\%). Average price of imported cars rose $11.4 \%$ matching the price change for American cars. Unit values of Japanese and West German cars recorded higher increases of $34 \%$ and $24 \%$.
