



New Motor Vehicle Sales

New motor vehicles sold in December fell 7.2% to 74,010 from 1977. Automobiles made in the United States and Canada rose 1.6% to 45,373 and Canadian and U.S. commercial vehicles 0.5% to 21,676.

Automobiles from overseas fell 48.6% to 6,433 from 1977 and overseas-made commercial vehicles fell 48.9% to 528. Value of the cars fell 29.9% to \$45.0 million and the commercial vehicles 37.6% to \$3.5 million. Value of U.S. and Canadian cars sold rose 11.6% to \$317.9 million: commercial vehicles rose 16.1% to \$214.7 million.

Sales value of all vehicles increased 7.7% to \$581.1 million, including 264 coaches and buses valued at \$8.2 million. Seasonally-adjusted sales of automobiles manufactured in Canada and the U.S. rose 7.8% from November to 61.846 and those of cars from overseas decreased 9.9% to 0.092 Seasonally-adjusted sales of all commercial vehicles rose 3.2% to 30.480.

Total 1978 sales reached 1,366,456 units (1,344,959 in 1977), value \$9,648.5 million, up 12.9% from 1977.


General Wholesale index


The December General Wholesale Index rose 0.5% to 643.3 from revised November's 639.9, up 12.5% from 1977 (571.7). Major groups with most effect:

- Vegetable group, up 1.3%; increases due largely to 3.5% for tobacco, 1.0% for grains, 4.8% for vegetable oil products and 1.9% for sugar and its products (tea, coffee and cocoa registered a partially offsetting decrease of 1.5%)
- Increases of 3.9% for fish and 1.4% for livestock were mainly responsible for an 0.8% rise in the animal products group (fresh meats decreased 0.8)
- A rise of 0.6% in non-terrous metals (18.2% for gold and 1.3% for silver); tin decreased 5.2%.

Farm Input Price Indexes

The Farm Input Price Index increased 2.9% in the fourth quarter of 1978 to 205.5 from (revised) 199.7 in the preceding quarter, the eastern index rising 3.5% to 203.1 from 196.2 and the western 2.2% to 207.6 from 203.2.

Over the last 12 months the Index rose 13.0%, the eastern index 13.0% and the western 12.8%.

Apparent Per Capita Food Consumption in Canada 1977


This publication contains a summary of the amounts of major food commodities available for consumption by Canadians in 1976 and 1977. The per capita values (in pounds) in the examples reproduced here (1977 in brackets) do not represent total food supplies actually consumed by an individual or a specific group of individuals but rather what is available on average to the total population:

- Fruits (fresh equivalent weight) 307.17 (295.99)
- Vegetables (fresh equivalent weight) 127.89 (127.11)
- Meat (carcass weight) 177.03 (171.37)
- Poultry (eviscerated weight) 44.69 (45.47)
- Fish (edible weight) 16.09 (16.97)
- Fluid milk production (retail weight) 261.20 (260.33)
- Eggs (fresh equivalent weight) 28.72 (27.86)
- Oils and fats (fat content) 45.01 (44.87)
- Cereals (retail weight) 156.91 (154.17)
- Sugars and syrups (sugar content) 95.38 (95.82).

No attempt is made to account for waste occurring in retail stores, households, private institutions and restaurants and the nutritional data contained in this publication provide information on what nutrients are available to Canadians on the average — not the nutritional adequacy of food consumed by individuals or specific groups.

School Age Population — Canada, 1961-2001



Fluctuations in the school-age population, which have plagued education planners throughout the 1970s, are going to get worse, not better. This is the conclusion of a new study based on just-available 1976 Census data.

The Class of 2001, a noncatalogued 143-page publication, gives four alternative projections of the school-age population, nationally and by province, The report includes charts and tables containing basic historical and projected data. Coal/Coke Statistics

November coal production increased 15.9% to 3,073,449 tons (2 788 186 metric tonnes) from 2,651,225 (2 405 151) a year earlier. Year-to-date production rose 6.1% to 30,416,090 tons (27 593 013 metric tonnes). Imports increased to 2,353,924 tons (2 135 444 metric tonnes) from 1,444,032 (1 310 004). Industrial consumers used 2,371,504 tons (2 151 392 metric tonnes) of coal, up 107,585 (97 599) and 453,475 tons (411 386 metric tonnes) of coke, down 42,260 (38 338) from a year earlier.

Financial characteristics reported by corporations in 1976 reflected the continuation of the lower rates of economic growth prevailing since 1974. Total assets of all industries rose from \$483 billion in 1975 to \$547 billion in 1976, up 13% as in 1975. At the 182 industry level the fastest rate of growth again took place in the fertilizer industry where assets jumped from \$120 million to \$218 million, up 82%. In services, other recreational services reported an increase in assets of 66% from the \$1.0 billion recorded in 1975. Total non-financial corporations disclosed total revenue of \$323 billion in 1976, up from \$286 billion in the previous year and an increase of 13% compared with 11% in 1975 and 27% in 1974. The largest percentage increase in revenue occurred in retail tobacconists (up 45% to \$183 million) closely followed by pipelines (44% to \$2,756 million) and gas distribution (43% to \$2,114 million).

In the financial sector, 1976 saw a \$457 million increase in pretax profits compared with \$354 million in 1975. In the nonfinancial sector, a \$606 million turn-around in profitability brought a 3% gain against a \$878 million decline in 1975. Total pretax profits in all industries amounted to \$24.4 billion, up \$1,063 million from 1975 and representing a 5% increase compared with a 2% decrease in 1975. Some of the losing industries in the previous year showed the greatest recovery: sawmills (\$121 million, \$9 million loss in 1975) and manufacturers of fish products (\$16 million, \$5 million loss in 1975). Synthetics textiles continued to decline, however, with losses in 1976 increasing to \$34 million from \$3 million. In the transportation sector, air transport again reported a further decrease in profitability with losses up from \$18 million in 1975 to \$34 million. Although profitability increased from \$84 million in railroads to \$132 million reversing 1975's decline. water transport showed a decrease in profits from \$61 million to \$10 million. One of the highest ratios of net profit after tax to equity in 1976 was 33.9% in the bakery products industry (17.4% in 1975)




