Retail Trade

Retail trade, December: \$7,435.8 million, up 9.7% from 1977. Sales increased in 24 of 28 trade groups with the largest gains recorded by used car dealers (35.8%), household furniture stores (15.5%) and pharmacies, patent medicine and cosmetics stores (14.5%). All provinces reported increased sales ranging from 16.7% for Saskatchewan to 3.9% for Manitoba. Montréal sales rose 8.4%, Toronto 9.1%, Vancouver 8.8% (Winnipeg, no change).

Seasonally-adjusted retail sales \$5,979.6 million, up 2.6% from the \$5,828.1 million in November. General stores (8.7%), sporting goods and accessories stores (8.7%) and specialty shoe stores (8.0%) recorded the largest increases. Largest decreases: florist (14.3%) and garages (12.1%). Seven provinces reported increated sales ranging from 5.8% for Ontario to 1.8% for Alberta. Prince Edward Island (2.0%), Québec (0.6%) and British Columbia (1.2%) reported decreased sales from November.

Revised November total retail trade, unadjusted for seasonal influences: \$6,193.6 million, up 10.6% from November 1977.



Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index increased 0.8% from 181.3 in December to 182.7 in January, with the twelve-month rise from January 1978, 8.9%, up from 8.4% in the previous twelve-month period. Food and household operation charges accounted for most of the rise in January, prices increasing 1.9% between December 1978 and January 1979 and the index for all-items-excluding-food rose 0.5%.

Higher prices for fresh vegetables, up on average 16.1%, and bread, up 13.1%, were largely responsible for the 2.3% increase in the food-at-home index. Other notable contributors included higher prices for selected beef cuts, chicken and butter. Prices for fresh fruit showed a marginal decline.

Selected Clothing Costs Fall

Increased electricity charges in several cities in Québec and Ontario and higher prices for new cars were the major contributing factors to the 0.5% increase in the all-items-excluding-food index. Increased shelter and household services charges and higher gasoline prices were also recorded. Impact of these price increases was cushioned by lower prices for selected clothing items. Between January 1978 and January 1979 the index for all-items-excluding-food advanced 6.9%.

In terms of goods and services, the price level for goods, including food, advanced 1.1% and that for services increased 0.3%. Between January 1978 and January 1979 the price level for goods advanced 10.4%, that for services 6.3%.

On a seasonally-adjusted basis, the Consumer Price Index advanced 0.7% between December 1978 and January 1979, with a 2.0% increase in the food index and a 0.3% increase in the all-items-excluding-food index.

Big Rise After Sales Tax Up

City highlights include consumer prices rising in all 15 published indexes. Advances ranged from 0.3% in St. John's to 1.3% in Regina. Major factors contributing to this variation in city retail price movements were the differing rates of price movements for food and housing charges. The elimination of the temporary retail sales tax reductions in Saskatchewan was largely responsible for consumer prices increasing over 1.0% in Regina and Saskatoon.

Percentage increases with annual change in brackets: St. John's 0.3% (9.0%), Charlottetown/Summerside 0.6% (8.6%), Halifax 0.3% (8.0%), Saint John 0.7% (8.6%), Québec 0.8% (8.5%), Montréal 0.7% (8.1%), Ottawa 0.7% (8.2%), Toronto 1.0% (8.2%), Thunder Bay 0.4% (7.1%), Winnipeg 0.4% (8.4%), Saskatoon 1.2% (7.3%), Regina 1.3% (7.9%), Edmonton 0.4% (8.0%), Calgary 0.8% (8.2%), and Vancouver 0.6% (7.7%).

Inventories/Shipments/Orders

Manufacturers' shipments in December fell 7.6% to \$11,366.1 million from revised November's \$12,307.6 million. Shipments for 1978 rose 18.8% to \$130,352.7 million from 1977's \$109,747.0. Seasonally-adjusted shipments rose 4.0% to \$12,282.6 million from revised November's \$11,804.8 million. Durable goods shipments increased 5.1% to \$5,764.6 million from \$5,483.6 million and non-durable goods shipments rose 3.1% to \$6,518.0 million from \$6,321.2 million.

New orders in all manufacturing industries, seasonally adjusted, rose 4.1% to \$12,472.8 million from \$11,977.4 million, durable goods new orders increasing 5.6%

Capital Flows/Stocks

Seasonally-adjusted unfilled orders in all manufacturing industries increased 1.4% to \$13,563.3 million from revised November's \$13,373.1 million. Total inventory owned: \$20,718.0 million, up 1.3% from \$20,449.8 million. Total inventory held: up 1.4% to \$21,721.6 million from \$21,424.1 million with increases of 1.2%, 2.6% and 0.6% in raw materials, goods in process and finished products.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned to shipments: 1.69:1 in December compared with 1.73:1 in November. Finished products to shipments: 0.57:1 against 0.59:1.

Restaurant Statistics

Restaurants throughout Canada increased their December 1978 receipts a total of 9.7% to \$218.2 million from a year earlier. Breakdown per province: Ontario 385. million (9.7%), Québec \$65.7 million (7.2%), British Columbia, Yukon and Territories \$20.3 million (14.6%), Alberta \$19.5 million (16.0%), Manitoba \$10.2 million (5.2%), Saskatchewan \$6.7 million (10.1%), New Brunswick \$3.7 million (5.9%), Nova Scotia \$4.9 million (9.3%), Newfoundland \$1.5 million (13.0%) and Prince Edward Island \$577,000 (19.7%).



Wholesale sales, December, rose 12.7% to \$4,952.879,000 from \$4,395,972,000 in 1977. Wholesale inventories: \$8,894.801,000, up 17.7% from \$7,558.596,000 a year earlier.

Consumer Credit

Consumer credit outstanding, selected credit holders reporting monthly, reached 328,288 million at the end of December, up 14,1% from a year earlier. Outstanding belances with percentage changes from 1977.

- Chartered banks' personal loans: \$21,621 million, up 15.4%
- Québec savings banks' personal loans: \$104 million, up 19.5%
- Life insurance companies' policy toans: \$1,346 million, up 5.0%
- Sales finance and consumer loan companies' loans; small \$183 million, down 12.0%; large \$1,488 million, up 1.9%; instalment sales paper \$1,176 million, up 8.3%
- Department, furniture, TV, radio and household appliance stores: \$1,729 million, up 10.3%
- Trust and mortgage companies' personal loans: \$639 million, up 73.6%.

Credit holders reporting quarterly fourth quarter balances: \$7,474 million, up 17.3% from a year earlier. Credit unions and caisses populaires, the largest quarterly reporters: \$5,468 million, up 21.2% (also included in the quarterly total: other retail stores, other credit-card issuers and public utilities).

Including quarterly reporters, consumer credit outstanding at the end of 1978 totalled \$35,762 million, up 14.8% from December 31, 1977.

Crude Petroleum/Natural Gas

Crude petroleum production, November, averaged 1,610,900 barrels/day (256 000 cubic metres/day), up 1.2% from 1,591,200 (252 900) in 1977. Net new production of natural gas for the same period averaged 10,765,100 Mcf./day (305 000 000 cubic metres/day), up 1.5% from 10,601,700 (300 000 000).

Department Store Sales

Department store sales rose 11.9% to \$1,178.3 million in December from \$1,053.3 million in 1977. Sales rose in 38 of 40 departments, the largest sales increases being recorded by plumbing, heating and building materials (31.6%), and women's and misses' coats and suits (24.0%). All provinces reported increased sales ranging from 16.1% for Alberta to 3.4% for Manitoba. Sales and percentage increases for metropolitan areas were: Montréal \$143.8 million (16.9%), Toronto \$181.4 million (10.8%), Winnipeg \$55.3 million (2.8%) and Vancouver \$113.9 million (14.4%).

Selling value of stocks: \$1,930.6 million, up 15.3% from 1977. Inventories increased in 38 of 40 departments. Largest increases were recorded by food and kindred products (76.8%) and furs (36.4%).



Refineries produced 60,785,000 barrels of refined petroleum products in December, a decrease of 1.6% (61,793,900) in 1977. Net sales of all refined petroleum products amounted to 60,371,000 barrels, a decrease of 0.6% (60,741,000).




Local Government Finance, 1976

Actual general revenue raised by local governments in 1976 from their own sources rose 19.9% from 1975's \$8,854 million. Transfers from other governments amounted to \$8,201 million or 48.1% of total general revenue. Significant were the specific purpose transfers from provincial and territorial governments: \$7,153 million, up 11.7% from 1975. Total general revenue, \$17.055 million, rose \$2,333 million or 15.8%.

General expenditure, \$18,508 million, rose 15.8%: education expenditure, up 15.4% to \$7,797 million, represented 42.2% of total expenditure. Transportation and communications represented 11.5% of general expenditure, fiscal services 9.2%, environment 9%, protection of persons and property 7.7% and other functions of expenditure slightly smaller percentages.
