#### Labour Force

Employment level, January 9.812,000 compared with 9.365,000 in 1978. Unemployment: 977,000, the same as last year. The unemployment rate: 9.1 (9.4 in January 1978). The participation rate was 61.5 against 60.0 and the employment/population ratio 55.9 compared with 54.3.

Seasonally-adjusted, employment rose to 10,232,000 from 10,142,000 in December. The increase occurred in all four main age/sex groups: men 15-24, 21,000; women 15-24, 23,000; men 25 and over, 22,000; women 25 and over, 24,000.

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment level: 897,000, virtually unchanged from December. The level increased by 10,000 among men 25 years and over and showed small decreases in the three remaining mein groupings. Unemployment increased in Ouébec (10,000) and Nova Scotia (5,000) and decreased in British Columbia (9,000) and Alberta (3,000). Other provinces showed little or no change.

The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate remained at 8.1 between December 1978 and January 1979. The rate decreased by 0.3 for both men and women 15-24 and by 0.2 for women 25 and over, increasing by 0.2 for men 25 years and over.

#### Crude Petroleum/Natural Gas

Crude petroleum production, October, averaged 1,479,000 barrels/day (235 000 cubic metres/day), up 7.9% from 1,370,400 (217 700) in 1977. Net new production of natural gas averaged 9,276,700 Mcf./day (262 800 000 cubic metres/day), down 3.9% from 9,651,100 (273 400 000).



#### International Travel

Preliminary statistics for 1978 have 31.6 million United States visitors counted (down 0.6% from 1977) and 1.7 million from other countries (up 17.5). Residents returning from the U.S. fell 1.6% to 37.3 million and those returning from other countries rose 1.8% to 1.8 million. Long-term traffic from the U.S. declined only slightly (0.5%) to 12.0 million and long-term visitors from elsewhere increased 15.7% to 1.4 million. U.S. long-term automobile traffic decreased 2.5% to 8.7 million due to a drop of 3.1% to 7.0 million in the two-or-more-nights category. Non-automobile traffic rose 4.9% to 3.4 million (plane traffic: 1.7 million, up 4.6%). Canadian long-term traffic from the U.S. fell 1.2% to 11.9 million re-entries. An increase of 6.3% to 3.6 million in long-term Canadian non-automobile traffic accompanied a decrease of 4.1% to 8.3 million in long-term automobile traffic.

December 1978 saw 1.6 million U.S. visitors, up 5.8% from 1977, and 2.2 million residents returning from the U.S., up 1.4%. Visitors from elsewhere totalled 78,700, up 14.7%, and residents returning rose 15.3% to 94,300.

### Federal Government Expenditure on Culture 1976-77

Out of a total expenditure of \$817 million by the federal government on cultural activities, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation accounts for \$542.0 million (66.3%). Expenditures on cultural activities take about 2.1% of the total budgetary expenditures of the federal government compared with expenditures on transportation and communications of 6.5%, on health and welfare of 35.4% and education 2.2%.

With the exclusion of the expenditures of the CBC, "other" and "administration" expenditures account for 33.1%, leaving \$184.1 million (66.9%) for cultural activities. Expenditures on current grants for performing arts account for 37.7% of the total current grants of the federal government for cultural activities. The entire expenditure for literary arts is devoted to current grants. Current operating expenditures (\$640.8 million) account for 78.4% of the total expenditures of the federal government on cultural activities, capital expenditures account for (\$117.8 million) 14.4% and current grants (\$53.7 million) 6.6%.

#### **Provincial Economic Accounts**



#### Farm Cash Receipts

Farmers' cash receipts from 1978 farming operations totalled \$11,879.5 million compared with \$10.136.6 million in 1977. Receipts from farming operations by province with 1977 comparisons in brackets: Prince Edward Island \$96.9 million (\$88.5 million), Nova Scotia \$143.9 million (\$127.5 million), New Brunswick \$118.2 million (\$109.2 million), Québec \$1,647.7 million (\$1,425.7 million), Ontario \$3,349.3 million (\$2,857.9 million), Manitoba \$1,129.6 mil-(\$898.9 million), Saskatchewan \$2,509.9 million (\$2,141.0 million), Alberta \$2,236.1 million (\$1,986.1 million), British Columbia \$557.9 million (\$501.8 million).

**Corporation Taxation Statistics** 

Preliminary 1977 estimates of taxable income show a marginal increase of 1% to \$17,235 million, reflecting the slowdown in economic activity and effects of new legislation. Alberta recorded the highest rate of growth as taxable income rose 13% to \$3,672 million, mainly attributable to higher prices and production in the mineral fuels industry (up \$273 million). British Columbia climbed 6% to \$1,966 million led by increases in forestry and wood products stemming from increased housing starts in the United States. The Atlantic provinces rose 4% with Newfoundland up 12%, Nova Scotia 6%, New Brunswick down 2% and Prince Edward Island unchanged. Ontario and Québec recorded declines of 3% and 4%. Ontario's most significant decrease in metal mining (down 50%) lay in nickel mining. In Québec, decreases in most manufacturing industries contributed. Taxable income in Manitoba and Saskatchewan fell 8%.

Income taxes declared by corporations

in Canada (excluding insurance carriers and credit unions) declined to \$6,757 million in 1976 from \$7,007 million in 1975. The main reason for the decline in income taxes was the continuing lacklustre performance of corporation book profits before taxes which, in 1976, grew only 3% after a drop of 2% in the preceding year. The federal budgets of June 1975 and May 1976 provided for several important changes affecting the taxation of corporations in 1976, especially corporations in the source industries. Small businesses benefitted from a change which raised the small business deduction limit to \$150,000 from \$100,000. This, in effect, extended the 25% tax rate to the first \$150,000 of taxable income. It was instrumental in increasing the small business deduction by \$58 million bringing the total tax relief to small Canadian-controlled private businesses to \$738 million in 1976. For large firms, in sectors other than mining and manufacturing, the general rate of taxation was reduced one percentage point to 46% of taxable income. As well, 1976 marked the first full year of the 5% investment tax credit introduced in June 1975. This tax credit generally enabled firms to deduct from tax otherwise payable an amount equal to 5% of their capital cost of new buildings, machinery and equipment used in manufacturing and processing operations. In 1976 this incentive eased the burden of taxation by some \$113 million. Taxable income (the tax base) fell 2% to \$17.091 million in 1976 with individual industries varying widely. Decreases were experienced in just under one-third of the industries with the largest occurring in metal mining (49%) and in petroleum and coal products (43%), primarily due to changing tax legislation. Notable increases were posted

October gross national radio air-time sales: \$10.3 million, up 14.4% from \$9.0 million in 1977 (after deductions of agency and other commissions: \$8.7 million, up 14.5% from \$7.6 million). Net local air-time sales rose 14.3% to \$20.0 million from \$17.5 million.


Gross radio air-time sales, January-October: \$261.3 million against \$225.3 million a year earlier, up 16.0% (net sales: up 15.7% to \$243.0 million from \$210.0 million).

Shipments of salt and salt content of brine ricce ised to 827,336 short tons in December 1978 from 747,289 a year earlier, cringing 12 months' output to 7,112,422 hart tons from 1977's 657,390.

Oil Pipeline Transport

Oil pipelines received 2,633,400 B/D (418 474 m3D) of crude oil, condensate, pentanes plus and refined petroleum product in November, up 1.4% from 2,595,900 (412 514) a year earlier. Domestic petroleum and products: up 4.0% to 2,375,900 B/D (377 554 m3D). Imported petroleum and products: down 17.4% to 257,400 B/D (40 903 m3D).

**Industry Seiling Price** 

December's Industry Selling Price Index, manufacturing, rose 0.3% to 195.8 from revised November's 195.3, up 9.8% from 1977 (178.3). Major groups with most effect:

 Food and beverage group index rose 0.4% (3.1% for the fish products industry, 9.7% vegetable oil mills and 1.3% feed industry with a partially offsetting 0.5% decrease for slaughtering and meat processors)

 An increase of 0.6% in pulp and paper mills was mainly responsible for a rise of 0.5% in the paper and allied group index

 Primary metal group index rose 0.3% (0.5% for smelting and refining, 1.5% aluminum rolling, casting and extruding and 0.1% iron and steel mills).

Construction/Special Trades, 1977


