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## New Motor Vehicle Sales

New inotor vehicles sold in November rose $6.0 \%$ 10 101.694 from 1978. Automobiles made in the United States and Canada rose $3.9 \%$ to 60.444 and Canadian and U.S. commercial vehicles $6.3 \%$ to 28.446 .

Auromobiles from overseas rose $14.2 \%$ to 11.598 from 1978 and overseas-made commercial vehicles $38.5 \%$ to 1.206. Value of the cars rose $23.2 \%$ to $\$ 85.0$ million and the commercial vehicles $49.9 \%$ to $\$ 8.4$ million. Value of U.S. and Canadian cars sold rose $15.3 \%$ to $\$ 459.3$ million: commercial vehicles $26.8 \%$ to $\$ 323.3$ million.

Sales value of all vehicles increased $20.4 \%$ to $\$ 876.0$ million, including 231 cuaches and buses valued at $\$ 8.7$ million. Seasonally-adjusted sales of automobiles ind 1 nufactured in Canada and the U.S. rose 2.14 from October 1065.622 and those of Cans Irom overseas $1.2 \%$ to 13.560. Commerclal vehicles fell $1.3 \%$ to 32.796
For 11 months, sales reached $1,316,350$ units (1,292.534 in 1978), value $\$ 10.788 .2$ mittion, up $19.0 \%$ from 1978.

## Trade

On a seasonally-adjusted balance of payments basis, November exports fell $2.7 \%$ to $\$ 5.8$ billion after falling $2.4 \%$ in October. November imports declined even more, falling 6\% to $\$ 5.27$ billion after increasing 4.8\% in Oclober. As a result, the merchandise trade balance increased from a surplus of $\$ 351$ million in October to one of $\$ 528$ million.

The short-term trend cycle for exports has picked up considerably from virtually no growth last April to increases of $2.9 \%$ in July, 3.5\% in August and 3.4\% in September Imports have picked up from an April increase of $0.3 \%$ increases of $2.2 \%$ in daly, 2.5\% in August and 2.2\% in Septem. tar. The trend cycle for the balance has dsen irom a trough of $\$ 186$ million last May to $\$ 246$ million in July. $\$ 309$ million in Augusi and $\$ 380$ million in Septemieer

## Industry Selling Price Index

The Industry Selling Price Index for manufacturing rase $0.3 \%$ to 227.4 in November from revised October's level of 226.7 ( $14.5 \%$ up from a year earlier).
Although the month-to-month change in the Index was the smallest in nearly two years the increases and decreases recorded by its components varied greatly:

- The paper and allied industries index rose $2.0 \%$ due mainly to an increase of $2.3 \%$ in its largest component, pulp and paper mills, with all wood pulp and newsprint commodities showing price increases
- In the chemical group most industry indexes rose, moving the group's price index up $0.7 \%$ and $16.2 \%$ from a year earlier
- The metal fabricating group index rose $0.6 \%$ (six of seven industry indexes increased) with the twelve-month increase, 11.0\%
- Food and beverage rose $0.1 \%$, slaughtering and meat processors declining 2.4\% (price decreases for fresh and frozen pork and beef accounted for about half the change), the feed industry showing the ather decrease ( $2.9 \%$ ) among the food group industries, with notable increases occurring in the cane and beet sugar processors index, up $11.8 \%$, and in the dairy products industry index, up 1.4\%
- Although only two of nine industry indexes in the wood group decreased. they were the two largest and brought the group index down 4.0\%, sawmills and planing mills declining $4.9 \%$ as prices of spruce, Douglas fir, jack pine, cedar and white pine fell and veneer and plywood mills decreasing 6.9\% (twelve-month increase in the wood group: $6.8 \%$, the lowest in more than three years).

## Railway Carloadings

Railways loaded 22.6 million shart tons ( 20.5 millian t) of revenue freight in November. down 0.5\% from 1978. An additional 1.8 millian short tons ( 1.7 million t) entered from the United States.

Commodities recording notable changes include: copper-nickel ores and concentrate (up $1,515.3 \%$ ), grain other than wheat (up $42.8 \%$ ), coal (down 19.3\%) and iron ore and concentrates (down 11.4\%).

In 11 months, rail freight volume loaded increased $9.1 \%$ from 1978 and receipts from the U.S. were $0.6 \%$ higher

StatCan Study Team Named
The Hon. Sinclaik Stevens, Minister responsible for Statistics Canada, has announced Ihat Sir Claus Moiser, recently retired Head of the Central Stalistical Office in the United Kingdom, and four colleagues of similar renown from the United States will conduct a study of the methodology used in the production of certain key statistical series published by Statistics Canada.

The review is to address the statistical practices of Statistics Canada in relation to appropriate international standards The scope of the study is to include the System of National Accounts and its various inputs, international trade statistics, the consumer price index and labour force statistics. The review will be concluded with a report on the matters addressed to be submilted by mid-February 1980

Sir Claus Moser is to initiate, direct and conclude the study while the other team members are each to address specific areas of concern. Dr. Richard Ruggles. Professor Emeritus in Economics at Yale University, will be concentrating on the system of National Accounts with particular reference to the wifficulties experienced in estimating labour income in the 1970s. Mr Joel Popkin, who was Assistant Commissioner of the Bureau of Labour Statistics in charge of price statistics, as well as a senior staff member of the President's Council of Economic Advisers and the National Bureau of Economic Research, will focus on the Consumer Price Index. Dr. Margaret Martin, currently President of the American Statistical Association, who for much of her career was the Co-ordinator of Labor Statistics within the entire U.S. slatistical system, will examine and address issues relating to statistics on the labour force, those produced through both the employment surveys and the household labour force survey. Mi. Joe Waksberg, past Associate Director of the Bureau of Census, in charge of all survey design and methodological work, will review import and export statistics and serve as an adviser on methodology.

Mr. Stevens reiterated earlier statements that although many of Statistics Canada's alleged problems appeared to be concerned with human relationships and attitudes and not with the basic methodologies used by the agency, a full and constructive review is necessary at this time to ensure that users can continue to have the faith and confidence in the agency's products that are critical to so many programs and decisions throughout Canada
