## Inventories / Shipments / Orders

Manulacturers' shipments in April, estmated at \$13.332 5 miltion, declined $5.4 \%$ from revised March's \$14,089.2 million.

Shipments seasonally adjusted fell $4.4 \%$ to $\$ 12,989.4$ million from $\$ 13,590.4$ million. Shipments of durable goods decreasedt $4.5 \%$ to $\$ 5.689 .8$ million from $\$ 5.960 .4$ million and non-durable goods shipments dropped $4.3 \%$ 10 $\$ 7.299 .6$ million from $\$ 7.630 .0$ million.

New orders in all manufacturing indus tries. seasonally adjusted, were estimated at $\$ 12.707 .6$ milfion, down $7.2 \%$ from $\$ 13,697.9$ mittion. New orders for durable goods decreased $11.0 \%$ to $\$ 5,413.5$ million from $\$ 6,079.9$ million and non-durable goods new orders dropped $4.3 \%$ to 5. 7.294 .1 million from $\$ 7.618 .0$ million.

Untilled orders in all manufacluring noustries, seasonally adjusted, decreased $1.5 \%$ to $\$ 17.957 .7$ million from $\$ 18.239 .5$ million. Unfilled orders for durable goods cocreased $1.7 \%$ to $\$ 15,991.9$ million from $\$ 16,268.2$ million. Those for non-durable goods dropped $0.3 \%$ to $\$ 1.965 .8$ million from \$1.971.3 million
Total inventory owned by manufacturers, seasonally adjusted, was estimated at \$27.078.2 million, 2.2\% higher than March's $\$ 26.502 .5$ million

Total inventory held rose $2.0 \%$ to $\$ 28.182 .0$ million from $\$ 27.621 .3$ million with increases of $3.3 \%$ in raw materials. $0.9 \%$ in goods in process and $1.3 \%$ in finished products.

The seasonally-adjusted ratio of total inventory owned to shipments was $208: 1$ compared with 1.95 .1 for March. The finished products to shipments ratio was $0.71: 1$ (0.67:1).

## Building Permits

Construction intentions portended by the value of building permits issued fell 9.3\% for the third consecutive month in April to a seasonally-adjusted $\$ 1,060.3$ million from a revised $\$ 1,138.8$ million in March. The April performance also marked a $6.0 \%$ decline from a year earlier when building permits were estimated at $\$ 1,127.8$ million.

Residential permits: construction work estimated at a seasonally-adjusted $\$ 526.4$ million consists of 5,945 single-detached homes and 5,267 multiple dwellings compared with 6,494 single and 4,682 multiple units for a value of $\$ 553.0$ million in March.
Non-residential building permits held a seasonally-adjusted value of $\$ 533.9$ million consisting of $\$ 124.3$ million of industrial installations, \$269.6 million of commercial construction and $\$ 140.0$ million of various public buildings. In March, proposed nonresidential construction was estimated at $\$ 585.8$ million - $\$ 142.3$ million of industrial projects, $\$ 290.1$ million of commercial and $\$ 153.4$ million of public buildings.

At the end of April, municipalities had issued permits for $\$ 3,805.2$ million of construction compared with $\$ 3.442 .5$ million for four months of 1979. Housing developments fell $6.3 \%$ but non-residential projects value stood $31.4 \%$ higher than in 1979.

## Unemployment Insurance Statistics

Some 801.000 claimants qualified for benefits for the week ending April 19, down $3 \%$ from the previous month and $9 \%$ from April 1979. Beneficiaries under 25 totalled $34 \%$ with $45 \%$ between 25 and 44 and $21 \%$ 45 and up

Payments made to unemployment insurance claimants in April amounted to \$446 million, up $2 \%$ from March and $8 \%$ from a year earlier. For four months, benefits reached $\$ 1.774$ million, down $1 \%$ from 1979. The average weekly benefit increased $10 \%$ to $\$ 120.41$; the number of weeks of benefit dropped by a similar rate

Claims submitted by persons applying for benefits rose to 211.000 , up $11 \%$ from March and 12\% from 1979. January-April claims totalled 958,000 , up $8 \%$ from 1979. All regions except Newfoundland, Manitoba and the territories reported more claims than in the previous year

## Government Finance, 1977

Consolidated revenue for all levels of government for the fiscal year ending nearest to December 31, 1977 totalled $\$ 82.515$ million, $\$ 6.766$ million ( $8.9 \%$ ) over 1976. Income taxes, property and related taxes and consumption taxes amounted to $\$ 55,023$ million. $\$ 3,258$ million ( $6.3 \%$ ) over 1976.

Consolidated expenditure for all levels of government amounted to $\$ 90.850$ million for the fiscal year ending nearest to December 31, 1977, a rise of $\$ 10,270$ or $12.7 \%$. Largest expenditures: social services $\$ 20.736$ million ( $22.8 \%$ of total). education $\$ 13.848$ million ( $15.2 \%$ ) and health $\$ 10,995$ million ( $12.1 \%$ ). By comparison. these functions were $19.2 \%, 19.0 \%$. $13.5 \%$ respectively of total consolidated government expenditure in 1970

## Capital Expenditures (By Control)

It is estimated that American-controlled establishments will account for $42.8 \%$ of capital expenditures in manufacturing during 1980, an increase of $44.8 \%$ ( $\$ 1.200 .5$ million) compared with $15.4 \%$ ( $\$ 357$ million) in 1979. Other foreign countries will be responsible for $9.3 \%$ of the manufacturing capital expenditures, up $\$ 10.7$ million ( $1.3 \%$ ). Canadian-controlled establishments will contribute $47.9 \%$ of capital expenditures, up $14.2 \%$ ( $\$ 540.7$ million). The gain in 1979: 18.6\%, \$595.7 million

In mining, the share of Americancontrolled establishments will reach $45.6 \%$. a rise of $\$ 825.4$ million ( $33.8 \%$ ) over 1979 . outdoing the $\$ 6418$ million ( $35.6 \%$ ) of 1978-79. Canadian-controlled establishments will register a similar expansion $\$ 895.3$ million ( $42.9 \%$ ), $41.7 \%$ of capital expendifures in 1980. In 1979, these establishments represented only $39.6 \%$ of capital expenditures following an increase of $\$ 462.5$ million ( $28.4 \%$ ) Capital expenditures controlled by the other foreign establishments will reach $12.7 \%$ up $\$ 170.9$ million (23.0\%).
In the forest industry, Americancontrolled establishments are responsible for $34.6 \%$ of capital expenditures and Canadian-controlled establishments for $58.4 \%$. In terms of growth, the respective figures are $\$ 9.4$ million $(9.1 \%)$ and $\$ 5.1$ million ( $2.8 \%$ ) against $\$ 26.8$ million ( $35.2 \%$ ) and $\$ 33.1$ million ( $21.9 \%$ ) in 1979. Other foreign countries: $7.0 \%$, a rise of $\$ 7.2$ million (46.5\%).

## Domestic/Foreign Control

 Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories, 1978 Special annual tabulations of motor vehicle parts and accessories manufacturers (S.I.C. 325) show that foreign control has remained at substantially the same high level over recent years. The percentage of the value of shipments of goods of own manulacture accounted for by foreigncontrolled establishments was $89.6 \%$ in 1978 compared with $90.4 \%$ in 1977 and 1976 and $89.8 \%$ in 1975 and 1974. Earlier biennial data indicated that foreign control accounted for $92.6 \%$ of shipments in 1972 and $90.2 \%$ in 1970.The 1978 rise in Canadian control has been influenced by increased coverage of small establishments in that year's Census of Manufactures

## Retirement Research

A study has been published documenting and evaluating data relevant to the economic conditions of the post-retirement population using differences in expenditure patterns between the pre- and post-retirement age groups for unattached individuals and for married couples.

Main data base is the Family Expenditure Surveys carried out by Statistics Canada for 1969, 1972. 1974 and 1976. These were mainly urban surveys confined to selected major cities. An appendix provides a more comprehensive picture of the living arrangenients and wealth position of the elderly, based on the Survey of Consumer Finance for 1977 and 1978.
