## Retail Trade

Seasonally adjusted relail sales for July were $\$ 6.967 .0$ million, an increase of $3.5 \%$ from the $\$ 6.734 .3$ milion recorded in June

Total retail trade without seasonal adjustment reached $\$ 7.026 .2$ million, an increase of $10.2 \%$ over July 1979. Sales advanced in all of the 28 trade groups with the biggest gains for used car dealers ( $+38.4 \%$ ). book and stationery slores $(+257 \%)$ and specialty shoe stores ( $+24.4 \%$ ). Sales were higher in all the provinces with increases ranging from 18.3\% in Alberta to 3.0\% in Prince Edward Island. Sales advanced $9.9 \%$ in Montreal, $9.6 \%$ in Toronto, 10.3\% in Winnipeg and $19.6 \%$ in Vancouver

Revised total retail trade, without seasonal adjustment, for June 1980 was $\$ 6,9296$ imillion, a decrease of $0.6 \%$ from June 1979.

Cumulative sales for January 10 July 1980 were $\$ 45,382.1$ million, an increase of 370 over the same period last year.

## Farm Cash Receipts

Preliminary estimates indicate that during the January to July period of 1980 farmers total cash receipts from farming operations in all provinces except Newfoundiand totalled $\$ 8.692 .0$ million, up $11.7 \%$ from the $\$ 7.783 .7$ million realized during the same period of 1979 .

Total estimates include: cash receipts from the sale of farm products; Canadian Wheat Board participation payments on previous years' grain crops; cash advances on farm-stored grains in Western Canada; and deficiency payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board. No deduction is made for the cost incurred by farmers in the production of the commodities sold. Cash receipts by province for JanuaryJuly 1980 were as follows, with 1979 figures in brackets:

- Ontario, $\$ 2,155.1$ million ( $\$ 2,152.8$ million).
- Saskatchewan, \$2,068.7 million ( $\$ 1.700 .5$ million).
- Alberta, $\$ 1,868.3$ million $(\$ 1,601.8$ million).

- Manitoba, $\$ 788.6$ million ( $\$ 692.5$ million).
- British Columbia, $\$ 366.9$ million ( $\$ 316.9$ million).
- Nova Scotia. $\$ 109.7$ million) ( $\$ 95.4$ milfion).
- New Brunswick, $\$ 78.0$ million ( $\$ 79.2$ million).
- Prince Edward Island, \$74.6 million ( $\$ 73.0$ million).

## Farm Prices/Agricultural Products

The Canada index number of farm prices of agricultural products $(1971=100)$ for July 1980 increased by $3.2 \%$ to 253.5 from the revised June level of 245.7 .

## Consumer Price Index

The All-items Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Canada ( $1971=100$ ) increased by 0.9\% in August to a level of 213.5, up from the level of 211.5 registered in July. As a rasulli of this latest monthly rise, the August 1930 index level stood 10.7\% above its level 8 August 1979, up from the $10.1 \%$ experienced between July 1979 and July 1980. The acceleration in the rates of growth in both the over-all monthly and annual CPI was largely attributable to the food index. This index, which in the past two years has registered a decline between the months of July and August and which increased by $0.9 \%$ between early June 1980 and early July 1980 . advanced by $1.4 \%$ in the latest month. The index for all items excluding food rose by $0.8 \%$ in Augusi, unchanged from the advance registered in July.

Higher prices for beef, pork and poultry were largely responsible for the $1.6 \%$ increase in the lood-for-homeconsumption index. In August, the index slood $12.1 \%$ above its level of August 1979. The food-away-from-home index advanced by $0.8 \%$ in August, representing an increase of $8.5 \%$ over the same month of 1979. As a result, the aggregate food index stood 11.4\% over its level of August 1979.

Higher housing charges were the major contributing factor to the $0.8 \%$ increase in the index for all items excluding food. Within the housing component. higher rent charges, especially in the provinces of Quebec and Alberta. increased owned accommodation charges and higher household furnishing and equipment pioes were registered. As well, in several cities, advances were recorded in fuel oil priss. while in the province of Saskatchewan. higher electricity and telephone charges were registered. Between August 1979 and Augusi 1980. the index for all items excluding food advanced by $10.6 \%$.

Viewed in terms of goods and services. the price level of goods advanced by $1.0 \%$ in the latest month. while that for services increased by $0.9 \%$. As a result, between August 1979 and August 1980, the price level for goods advanced by $12.2 \%$ while that for services rose by $8.5 \%$.
On a seasonally adjusted basis, the allitems CPI rose by $1.0 \%$ between July and August: this comprised a $1.9 \%$ increase in the food index and a 0.8\% increase in the index for all items excluding food.

## City Highlights

Between July and August, consumer prices rose in all cities for which CPIs are produced with increases ranging from 0.6\% in Saskatoon to $1.6 \%$ in St. John's. The major factor contributing to the variation in city price movements was the diffewing rates of movement for food prices which ranged from a slight decline in Saskwionn .- due largely to a decline in beel pric.as to an increase of $3.3 \%$ in St. johns s, the latter largely reflecting increases in tresh vegetable prices.

## Department Store Saies and Stocks

Department store sales totalled $\$ 708.2$ million in July 1980, up 14 1\% from July 1979 Sales rose in 39 of the 40 departments with only millinery showing a decline -7.5\%). The largest increases were reporded for furs ( $+29.9 \%$ ), boys' clothing and iurnishings ( $+22.0 \%$ ), women's and girls' Gives, mitts and accessories ( $+21.2 \%$ ) and tamps, pictures, mirrors and all other home furnishings ( $+21.0 \%$ ). Sales rose in all 10 provinces with gains ranging from $22.0 \%$ for British Columbia (including the Yukon and Northwest Territories) to 4.5\% for Prince Edward island. Sales and percentage changes for metropolitan areas were: Montreal, $\$ 81.0$ million, $+15.8 \%$; Toronto, $\$ 98.3$ million, $+11.3 \%$; Winnopeg. $\$ 32.3$ million, $+6.7 \%$ : and Vancouver, $\$ 76.4$ million. $+23.6 \%$.

The selling value of stocks held in July 1980 was $\$ 2.629 .9$ million, an increase of 10.3\% over July 1979. Inventories were higher in 37 of the 40 departments.

## Preliminary Crime Statistics

When comparing preliminary first quarters of 1979 and 1980 crime statistics, deGeases were reported in all crime categofies with the exception of drugs. The rather sharp decrease ( $15.5 \%$ ) in the number of Criminal code affences reported between the first quarters of 1979 (382.074) and 1980 330.699) is also reflected in the 13.150 decrease in the crime rate (number of Criminal code affences per 100,000 of the total estimated population) for this same period which fell from $1,614.1$ to $1,397.0$.
Nationally, violent crimes which totalled 26,524 or $8.0 \%$ of the 330,699 Criminal code offences reported during the first quarter of 1980 recorded a significant decrease of $23.1 \%$ over the first quarter of 1979 (32,646)

Net operating revenue at $\$ 127.4$ million showed a decrease of $10.7 \%$ from July 1979. Telephone toll messages increased $12.8 \%$ to 115.2 million.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 13,852.0$ million at July 31, an increase of $21.5 \%$ from slocks of $\$ 11.399 .9$ million on hand at the end of July last year

In the first seven months of 1980, tolal sales by wholesale merchants reached $\$ 44.964 .1$ million, an increase of $11.1 \%$ over the accurnulated sales of $\$ 40.486 .9$ million for January-July 1979.
