## Unemployment Insurance Statistics

Benefits paid to unemployment insurance claimants in November 1980 totalled $\$ 316$ million, up $5 \%$ from October and $27 \%$ more than in November 1979. For 1980-to-date. disbursements reached $\$ 3,995$ million compared with $\$ 3,736$ million in the first 11 months of 1979, an increase of $7 \%$. The: average weekly benefit was up $11 \%$ to $\$ 120.43$ while the number of weeks of benefit paid was down 4\%, based on the cumulative payments.

Claimants qualifying for benefits for the week ended November 15 numbered 631,000 , an increase of $13 \%$ from the previous month and $10 \%$ more than in November 1979. Thirty-eight percent of the heneficiaries resided in Quebec, $27 \%$ in Cuatario, $19 \%$ in the Atlantic provinces. $8 \%$ in British Columbia and $7 \%$ in the Prairie ovinces.
Fersons applying for benefits in NovemDer bubmitted 282.000 claims, up $17 \%$ from Ocluber, but $7 \%$ lewer than in November 1979. Some 2,459,000 claims were filed in the first 11 months of 1980, an increase of $6 \%$ from the January-November period of 1979.

## Radio Broadcasting

Gross national AM and FM radio air-time sales were \$11.3 million in November 1980. an increase of $15.3 \%$ from $\$ 9.8$ million in November 1979. Net national sales after deduction of agency and other commissions amounted to $\$ 9.6$ million, up $15.7 \%$ from $\$ 8.3$ million in the previous year.

Net local air-time sales were up 17.5\% 10 $\$ 27.5$ million in November from $\$ 23.4$ million.

Gross radio air-time sales for JanuaryNovember 1980 were $\$ 375.2$ million comfued to $\$ 336.4$ million in the 1979 period, 5n thicrease of $11.5 \%$. Net sales rose $12.0 \%$ $\$ 350.1$ million from $\$ 312.7$ million.

## Inventories/Shipments/Orders

The seasonally adjusted value of new orders received in Canadian manufacturing industries was at a level of $\$ 14,709.8$ million in November 1980, up $0.7 \%$ from the revised October value of $\$ 14.606 .1$ million New orders for durable goods declined $2.0 \%$ in November to $\$ 6.338 .4$ million from $\$ 6,470.5$ million while those for non-durable goods rose $2.9 \%$ to $\$ 8,371.4$ million from $\$ 8,135.6$ million.
Manufacturers' shipments in November were at an estimated $\$ 14,862.6$ million, seasonally adjusted, $1.6 \%$ higher than the revised October level of $\$ 14,634.4$ million Shipments of durable goods rose $1.1 \%$ to $\$ 6,5408$ million from $\$ 6,468$. million while non-durable goods shipments increased $1.9 \%$ to $\$ 8,321.8$ million from $\$ 8,165.8$ million.

The total backlog of unfilled orders for all manufacturing, seasonally adjusted, was estimated at $\$ 19.042 .6$ million in November. down $0.8 \%$ from $\$ 19,195.4$ million (revised) in October.
The seasonally adjusted value of total inventory owned by manufacturers decreased $0.1 \%$ to $\$ 28,803.9$ million from the revised October figure of $\$ 28,838.3$ million

The seasonally adjusted ratio of total inventory owned to shipments at the end of November was down to 1.94:1 from 1.97:1 (revised) in October while the finished products to shipments ratio declined 10 0.66:1 from 0.67:1

Without seasonal adjustment, manufacturers' shipments in November totalled an estimated $\$ 14,746.7$ mittion. Shipments during the first 11 months of 1980 reached $\$ 151.572 .9$ million, up $8.6 \%$ from the corresponding 1979 value of $\$ 139,606.3$ million.

## Marriages and Rates, 1979

The number of marriages in Canada during 1979 totalled 187.811, up $1.2 \%$ from 185,523 in 1978. The increase marked a reversal in the declining trend in the number of marriages which began in 1973. The rate per 1,000 population in 1979, however, remained at 7.9 , unchanged from the preceding year. Alberta registered the highest marriage rate among the provinces (9.4), followed by British Columbia at 8.6 .

## Department Store Sales/Stocks

Department store sales were $\$ 993.6$ million in November 1980, up 8.0\% over November 1979. Sales rose in all departments except women's and misses' coals and suits $(-2.2 \%)$ and piece goods ( $-2.3 \%$ ). The largest increases were in furs ( $+48.7 \%$ ). women's and girls' gloves, mitts and accessories ( $+14.8 \%$ ) and boys' clothing and furnishings ( $+14.8 \%$ ). Sales increased in all provinces except Prince Edward Island ( $-0.8 \%$ ), gains ranging from $12.3 \%$ for British Columbia. the Yukon and Northwest Territories to 0.8\% for Manitoba. Sales and percentage increases for melropolitan areas were: Montreal, $\$ 112.6$ million, $7.6 \%$; Toronto, $\$ 151.5$ million, $10.0 \%$, Winnipeg. $\$ 46.3$ million, $1.4 \%$ and Vancouver, $\$ 104.6$ million, 10.9\%.
The selling value of stocks held in November 1980 at $\$ 3.070 .6$ million showed an increase of $5.5 \%$ over November 1979. Inventories were higher in 32 of the 40 departments.

## Railway Operating Statistics

The seven major Canadian railways reported a combined net income from operations of $\$ 34.1$ million in October 1980, a decrease of $23.3 \%$ from a year earlier Operating revenues of $\$ 463.7$ million were up $11.3 \%$ from the 1979 tigure.

Revenue freight ton-miles were down by $2.8 \%$ in October 1980, freight train-miles showed a decrease of $3.5 \%$, and treight car-miles declined $2.4 \%$. Average revenue per ton-mile of freight was 2.70 cents. Passenger-miles increased by $7.8 \%$ to 138.2 million.

## Births / Deaths, 1979

The number of births to Canadian residents totalled 366,064 in 1979, up $16 \%$ from 360,194 in 1978. The rate per 1000 population increased to 15.5 from 15.3 Among the provinces, Alberta registerad the highest birth rate (18.4), followed closely by Saskatchewan (17.7) and IJewfoundland (17.7).

The number of deaths registered for 1979 was 168,183 , little changed from the 1978 level of 168.179 . Newfoundland had the lowest death rate among the provinces (5.5), while Alberta was next at 6.0

## Real Domestic Product

Seasonally adpusted Real Domestic Product $(1971=100$ ) increased by $0.5 \%$ in November 1980 to 140.9 from a level of 1402 in Oclober. The index of industrial pduction recorded its fourth consecutive onthlv increase with a gain of $0.8 \%$ in November, although Output was still 1.5\% beliow the peak level reached in September 1979.

Production increases were widespread among both goods-producing and serviceproducing industries in November. Aboul half the over-all gain originated in trade, with both wholesale and retail trade showing substantial advances. The most significant sales increases were reported by wholesalers of inotor vehicles and parts, and by new motor vehicle dealers. Output of motor vehicle manufacturers advanced due entirely to increased production of automobiles destined for the domestic market
Manufacluring activily continued to be one of the other major contributors to output growth, with significant increases recorded by iron and sleel mills, and pulp and paper mills. The level of production in iron and sleel mills has increased some $10 \%$, with increased exports to markets other than the United States and growing domestic shipments to the automotive industry accourting for most of the growth.
Production levels for pulp and paper mills have remained well above the low point of July 9980 . with increased exports of wsprint and woodpulp and a recovery m tebour disruptions accounting for the higher activity levels regislered since that lime.

Mining activity moved up substantially during November, with most of the growth confined to metal mines, and in particular iron ore mines.

A significant increase in federal administration and defence services in November stemmed mostiy from a return to normal operations in federal government services which had been partly disrupted for several weeks by a labour dispute involving some 40.000 clerical employees. Gains also occurred in air, Iruck, bus and pipeline transport.

## Labour Income

Labour income for the month of November 1980 was estimated at $\$ 14,054.9$ million, an increase of $\$ 1,568.3$ million or $12.6 \%$ from November 1979.

Adjusted for seasonal variation, wages and salaries increased by $\$ 70.6$ million between October and November to a lotal of $\$ 12,935.1$ million.

## Canadian University Enrolment

Preliminary data indicate that the number of students enrolled in Canadian universities increased 4.4\% from the preceding year to a total of 627.422 in 1980-81. Almost all the increase has been at the undergraduate level with a $7 \%$ rise in part-fime and a 4\% gain in full-time enrolment.

## Survey of Volunteer Workers

Results are now available from a survey of volunteer workers which was conducted in February 1980, using one-third of the households included in the Labour Force Survey. The survey showed that some 2.7 million persons did volunteer work in the reference year (which represents $15.2 \%$ of the population 15 years of age and over) and that these persons provided 374 million hours of volunteer work.

## Wholesale Trade

Wholesale merchants' sales for November 1980 totalled an estimated $\$ 6,713.4$ million, up $4.9 \%$ from the $\$ 6.399 .6$ million reported for November 1979

During the first 11 months of 1980, sales by wholesale merchants reached $\$ 73.275 .4$ million, an increase of $9.6 \%$ over the accumulated sales of $\$ 66,887.2$ miltion for the January-November 1979 period.

Wholesale inventories were valued at $\$ 12.720 .5$ million at November 30, 1980, up $13.2 \%$ from slocks of $\$ 11.233 .6$ million on hand at the end of November 1979.

## Operating Results for Businesses in the Merchandising and Services Sector

Statistics Canada reports published 10 assist businesses in measuring their operational performance now number five. The latest is Operating Results - Retail Drug Stores, 1978. Other Operating Results publications previously released include: Men's Retail Clothing Stores, 1974; Independent Women's Retall Clothing Stores, 1975; Independent Retail Hardware Stores. 1976; and Retail Shoe Stores, 1977.

The just-published study on retail drug stores summarizes the results of about 600 unincorporated, 600 incorporated and 15 chain-store firms. The report gives mean and median data on key business cosis and profit-and-loss items as a proportion of net sales, by region and selected sales size for unincorporated and incorporated firms. Data for chain store organizations are reported at the lotal, all-sales size and the national level only. The categories of information reported: net sales; opening inventory: purchases; closing inventory; cost of goods sold; gross profit; a detailed breakdown of all business expenses; and net profit.

These studies should be of particular interest to retail merchants, manufacturers, wholesale suppliers, banks, trust companies and other financial institutions, accounting offices, trustees in bankruptcy, government departments, business schools and those monitoring the operations of businesses in the merchandising and services sector.
