Canadian Trade/Preliminary Statement From preliminary results, it is estimated that on a seasonally adjusted balance-ofpayments basis, Canada's exports decreased 0.4% or \$29 million to \$6,889 million in May 1981 following a 5.9% increase in April and a 2.8% decrease in March. Imports declined more steeply than exports in May. with a decrease of 5.7% or \$390 million to \$6,519 million following a 14.4% increase in April and a 3.3% decrease in March. As a result, the merchandise trade surplus increased \$361 million to \$370 million in May, after surpluses of \$9 million in April and about \$500 million in both March and February


The short term trend for exports peaked in December 1980 and decreased marginally by 0.1% in January, 0.2% in February and 0.1% to \$6,785 million in March 1981. the import short term trend continued to row with increases of 1.9% in January. 2.1% in February and 2.2% to \$6,361 million in March. Consequently the short term trend for the merchandise trade balance continued to decline from a peak surplus of \$930 million in October 1980, with decreases of \$23 million in November, \$71 million in December, \$122 million in January, \$147 million in February and \$143 million to a surplus of \$424 million in March

# **Commodity Analysis**

On a customs basis, for seasonally adjusted domestic exports the largest increases in value in May 1981 were for cereals (including wheat) and cereal preparations (up \$215 million to \$560 million following a \$120 million decrease in April), motor vehicle products (up \$50 million to \$1,120 million), and fish and fish products (up \$40 million to \$115 million following a \$65 million decrease in April). The largest decreases occurred for non-ferrous metals (down \$110 million to \$395 million following a \$120 million increase in April) and chemicals products (down \$85 million to \$340 million following a \$60 million increase in April).

Declines were widespread amongst melor import commodity components for tay 1981, but none of the declines was articularly large, apart from aircraft imports which decreased \$55 million to \$160 million Motor vehicle parts imports, a considerable proportion of which are assembled into vehicles for export, rose (continued on next page)

**Trading Partner Analysis** 

Exports to the United States, seasonally adjusted and on a customs basis, were down by 3.3% or \$155 million to \$4.61 billion, following a 12.5% increase in April. Exports to the United Kingdom decreased 34% to \$225 million and exports to "Other EEC" countries were down 29% to \$410 million. Exports to Japan increased 26.5% to \$325 million after decreasing 37.4% in the previous month. Exports to "Other America" were up 12.4% to \$365 million, following an 8.0% drop in April.

Main contributors to the decline in imports in May were imports from Japan which dropped 27% or \$110 million to \$295 million following a 27% increase in April, imports from "Other EEC" countries, down 20% or \$75 million to \$290 million following a 23% increase in April, and imports from "Other America", down for the second consecutive month with a 16% or \$60 million decrease to \$310 million. Imports from the U.S. increased 1.5% or \$70 million to \$4.72 billion.


#### Market Research Handbook

A total of \$458 million was paid to unemployment insurance claimants in April 1981 down 14% from March but 3% more than the \$446 million disbursed in April 1980. For January to April 1981, payments reaches \$1,952 million, an increase of 10% over the same period in 1980. Thirty-seven percent of the cumulative payments went to residents of Quebec, 26% to Ontario, 19% to the Atlantic provinces and 9% each to British Columbia and the Prairie provinces.

For the week ended April 18, claimants qualifying for unemployment insurance benefits totalled 796,000, a decrease of 6% from March and 2% fewer than in April 1980. Thirty-three percent of the beneficiaries were under 25 years of age, 46% were between 25 and 44 years and 21% were 45 years or older.

Applicants for benefits in April filed 192,000 claims, 3% fewer than in March and 9% fewer than in April 1980. Claims received for 1981 to date totalled 902,000, down 6% from the January-April period last year.

The Dairy Review

Milk sold off Canadian farms for all purposes in April 1981 totalled an estimated 634 362 kilolitres, 3.5% more than in April 1980.

This brought the total estimate of milk sold off farms during the first four months of 1981 to 2 227 415 kilolitres, an increase 3.3% over the January-April 1980 period.

#### **New Prices**

Retroactive to the start of the new fiscal year in April 1981, *Informat* will be priced at \$25 a year in Canada, reduced from \$60, and \$30 a year buside Canada, reduced from \$72.

The Statistics Canada Daily, the vehicle of first release for most of the bureau's information, will be \$75 a year instead of \$120. Outside Canada, the price will be \$90 instead of \$144.

In addition, school boards, schools, colleges, universities and public libraries will receive a 30% discount on the purchase of Statistics Canada publications.

#### Cable Television, 1980

Preliminary results show cable television revenues for the year ended August 31, 1980 were \$352 million, up 12% from \$314 million in the previous fiscal year.

Programming, technical, sales and administrative expenses increased 10% to \$202 million from \$183 million. Depreciation was estimated at \$64 million, interest at \$34 million and other income was \$2 million, an increase of 6% or \$3 million over the proceeding year.

## Road Motor Vehicles: Fuel Sales

Total gross sales of gasoline in Canada during 1980 were reported at 33 526 million litres, down 14.3% from 38 319 million litres in 1979.


Reported net sales\* of gasoline increased 0.2% to 31 898 million litres in 1980 from 31 847 million litres reported in 1979.

Reported net sales\* of diesel fuel rose 2.7% to 5.314 million litres in 1980 from 5.172 million litres in 1979.

Measured in terms of barrels, the sales figures for 1980 were as follows: gasoline (net), 201 million barrels; gasoline (gross), 211 million barrels; diesel fuel, 33 million barrels.

\* Data users should note that on April 1, 1978 the road-use tax on motive fuels was removed in Alberta. Since that time the province has not reported "net" sales of fuel.

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## Labour Income

Labour income for the month of April 1981 was estimated at \$14,591.4 million, an increase of \$1,617.7 million or 12.5% over April 1980.

Adjusted for seasonal variation, wages and salaries increased by \$224.7 million between March and April 1981 to \$13,746.6 million.

# Radio/Television Broadcasting, 1980

Preliminary results indicate privately-owned radio broadcasting revenues for the year ended August 31, 1980 were up 12% from the previous year to \$397 million. Programming, technical, sales and administrative expenses rose 13% to \$336 million Depreciation was \$12 million and interest expense was \$15 million; other adjustments produced revenues of \$12 million. Net profit before tax was \$45 million, up from \$43 million in 1979.

Television broadcasting revenues increased 19% from the previous year to \$562 million in 1980. Programming, technical, sales and administrative expenses rose 19% to \$433 million. Depreciation was \$20 million and interest expense \$17 million; other adjustments produced income of \$11 million. Net profit before tax was estimated at \$103 million, an increase of 7% over the 1979 fiscal year.

In addition, CBC operations produced revenues of \$101 million in 1980 from sale of air-time, up from \$87 million in 1979. Net cost of operating the CBC was \$543 million, \$3 million more than in the previous period.
